It was good to see the church full for our Harvest Festival Service in mid-September led by our Authorised Lay Minister Sarah Maxwell. The flowers at the entrance of the church, within the church and on the windowsills were absolutely magnificent. Many thanks to all those who helped put the displays together. Several large boxes of food were



donated which were distributed via the foodbank to local needy families. In early October we enjoyed the first participation of and a sermon from our new Assistant Curate Rev Dr Rhona McEune at our regular Holy Communion Service.

Once a year the Diocese holds a 'Churchwardens' Training Day. I attended my third at the end of September. These are always most instructive, with excellent speakers although they remind one of the multitude of tasks required of a churchwarden to comply with the numerous, and it seems, ever increasing tasks required.

As part of our extended ministry, we continue to take a simple service of morning prayer in both Hilton Park and Oaklands care homes once a month. There is a team of four lay persons who rotate to lead these services, which are enjoyed by the residents and staff.

I am pleased to report that following an application, we have been awarded £250 from the Housebuilder Redrow South Midlands Community Fund. This will be used to purchase more wildflower seeds for the Summer Flower area of the Churchyard.

Baptisms are becoming more popular! Following a very well attended one in September, we had a very quiet one in October with just immediate family attending. However we have another booked at our Holy Communion Service on November 3rd at 10.30am which will be led by our Vicar Max Osborne to which all are cordially invited. Following that, on Sunday 17th November at 10.30am Sarah Maxwell will lead our Morning Prayer. Sarah will also lead the short contemplative service C by C at 8pm on Wednesday 6th November on Zoom. Parish Council Report

The next full council meeting will be held by on 4th November 2024, 7.30pm at the Poppy Room, Bottisham Sports and Social Club. All Parish Council meetings are open to the public. Please note that the Clerk to the council does not keep regular office hours. Replies to emails and phone calls will be attended to as soon as is practicable. Details of upcoming meetings and Councillor Details are available from the Parish Council Noticeboard and from the website bottisham-pc.gov.uk.

LOCAL HIGHWAYS SCHEMES

The Parish Council are delighted to announce that they have been successful in both their applications to Highways for improvements in the village. Firstly, the Parish Council applied for additional double yellow lines to complement the lines already in place around the Bell Road/High Street area. Secondly, an application was made to reduce the speed limit to 20mph village wide. Both applications scored highly. As part of the process a public consultation will be held via a survey, where all residents will have the opportunity to voice any opinions on the proposals. More details will be shared with the community as soon as we are advised on the full process.

COMMUNITY MATTERS

- At their last meeting the Parish Council approved the purchase of an additional noticeboard to be placed on the Triangle. The board will be identical to the blue Parish Council board and will replace the current white community noticeboard on the Pharmacy wall which is very tatty. Details will be available in due course on how members of the community are able to gain access to the board. In addition, the map of the village will be redesigned and contained in one half of the board. Anyone wishing to be involved with the development of the new map should contact the Clerk in the first instance.
- The Site Manager of the Lindum Homes development on Bell Road has successfully completed a triathlon to raise funds for the community defibrillator. The new unit will be located on the Pharmacy wall where the white noticeboard is currently located. The Parish Council wishes to thank Lindum Homes and the Pharmacy for their generosity in benefiting the community with such a valuable device.

EXTERNAL AUDIT

The Parish Council have now received notification from the External Auditor, that they are satisfied that the Parish Council have fulfilled their obligations for the Financial Year 23/24 and that audit is now concluded. Details of the closure are displayed on the website and the noticeboard.

PRIDE OF PLACE GRANT

The Environmental working group have been looking at ways to improve the triangle area at the shops. Plans include additional seating, planting and the placement of the community noticeboard. The Parish Council will be making an application to ECDC's Pride of Place scheme to seek help with funding of the redevelopment. In addition, this year

District Councillors' Report

Operational Services Committee agreed that the Council implements the Waste Collection and Street Cleansing proposals, to wit:

- 1. collect food waste in a separate container, on a weekly basis by 31 March 2026,
- 2. the collection of residual waste in a 180lt wheeled bin fortnightly,
- 3. a free fortnightly garden waste collection service and the possibility of a second garden waste bin for free,
- 4. fortnightly collection of recycling as at present,

The aim is to increase the re-cycling by residents; we pay for waste taken to the waste depot, but receive a rebate for that which is re-cycled. Exceptions will be made for larger households and those houses that have no storage facilities which will be given coloured bags as for now. Provision has been built into the budget to pay for the extra bins. Comprehensive information will be disseminated to all residents well in advance to help with a smooth transition.

It was also agreed to retain the current street cleansing service specification, and review it in one year's time, and to proceed with using East Cambs Street Scene Ltd (ECSS) even though it was still not performing to target.

FINANCE & ASSETS COMMITTEE

The following decisions were made at the meeting on Thursday 26 September:

- introduction of a £70 fine for misdeclaration of Council Tax discounts,
- Net Zero Villages Grant Scheme was approved; £150,000 to be allocated to villages for improving community premises; applications for up to £30,000 to be sent in by the end of the year,

• Council Officers now predict an 'overall increase in costs' for the planned crematorium at Mepal, and an attempt by Liberal Democrats on the committee to refer the cost rises to a Full Council meeting next month was rejected by a block vote of Conservative Councillors;

The details of the increased costs were in a confidential report, but the published papers state that the rise is 'largely made up of a gap in the projects contingency budget and an increase in build costs'; the escalating costs for the crematorium, already predicted to cost over £9 million, have substantial implications for the project, and further work is being undertaken and further costs are being incurred without this coming back to the Full Council for consideration of the new information; Charlotte pointed out that the tight timescale and restricted times of year for working on a biodiverse site would also lead to cost increases; John said that changing the scheme to keep it within the budget would not deliver the graceful project the Council had approved.

At the forthcoming Council meeting the creation of the new Local Plan (the document that defines where new housing, industrial and recreational buildings can be built within the District) is proposed. Our current Local Plan is almost ten years old, and it must be replaced by an up-to-date version within two years.

The East Cambridgeshire Community Fund will be open to applications between the 28 October to 9 December 2024. The aim of this small community grants scheme is to support local community groups to provide new or develop existing community services and initiatives that improve the quality of life for residents living in East Cambridgeshire. Highways and Byways: A Cambridge Light Rail System

The organisation 'Cambridge Connect' is asking the Government to help fund a detailed design for its proposal for an electric light railway system in and around Cambridge. This 'Cambridge Light Rail' may be the only hope left to improve public transport that would not get held up in road traffic, which will only get worse. Light railways use standard rail track but their lighter carriages can negotiate bridges, tunnels and sharper curves more easily, such as those in Croydon and Nottingham.

A line is proposed from the relocated Newmarket Road Park and Ride, then across the forthcoming Airport Development, with stops there and at Coldhams Lane. It would then go under ground to Cambridge Station. Another line would be from Cambourne, Madingley and the Science Park via another tunnel, starting west of Grange Road, to Cambridge Station with stops at Mill Road, Parkside and the City Centre. Only 4km of tunnelling in total would be needed. Overground routes to Trumpington and towards Haverhill would use old railway alignments and there could be an extension from the Newmarket Road Park and Ride running east of Bottisham and the Swaffhams to Burwell.

The north-south connection would use the stations at Waterbeach, Cambridge North, Cambridge, and the new Cambridge South. Complementing this eastwards would be two new stops before Dullingham, the line re-doubled to Chippenham Junction, and the curve reinstated to link to Soham and Ely.

Obviously, this will cost a large amount, but with funds from the City Deal, high-tech industries, Cambridge University and levies on new housing developments, surely something could be done? *Robert Stevens*

REMEMBER, REMEMBER TO CELEBRATE SAFELY!

Bonfire Night is a very popular fixture in the calendar where people come together to enjoy fireworks. While it can be fun for all of the family to enjoy, there are lots of potential hazards so it's really important to keep you and your family safe. Help support your local community this year and go to an organised firework display instead of holding one at home.

While most people enjoy fireworks responsibly, in the wrong hands they can cause injury and damage to property. Fireworks are explosives and as such should be treated with respect and only used in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions and the firework safety code.

Also lighting bonfires in back gardens presents significant risks to residents, so would encourage residents across the county to think twice before having their own displays and lighting bonfires.

FIREWORK SAFETY TIPS

- Only buy fireworks with a CE mark
- Light fireworks at arm's length using a taper, stand well back and never go back to a lit firework
- Never throw fireworks or put them in your pockets or clothing
- Light sparklers one at a time wearing gloves, and place used sparklers in a bucket of water
- Never give sparklers to children under five
- · Keep your pets indoors throughout the evening
- It is illegal to sell fireworks to someone under the age of 18 or to light fireworks in a public place
- Respect your neighbours don't let off fireworks late at night and remember there are laws to follow.

BONFIRE SAFETY

We would urge people to think twice about having a bonfire.

Lighting a bonfire in a garden presents significant risks to residents if they get out of hand. Not only this, but the smoke can also aggravate neighbours with respiratory problems.

If you do decide to have a bonfire, please follow our top five tips:

- 1. Build your bonfire well clear of buildings, garden sheds, fences and hedges
- 2. Never use flammable liquids to start a bonfire, and never burn dangerous items such as aerosol cans, paint tins, foam furniture, or batteries
- 3. Don't leave bonfires unattended. An adult should supervise it until it has burnt out. If it has to be left, damp it down with plenty of water
- 4. Always keep a bucket of water or a hosepipe nearby in case of fire
- 5. Check the weather avoid lighting bonfires in high winds.

Every Veteran was born a civilian, growing up through childhood and being educated for life in the big wide world that lay ahead for him or her, and upon signing up to their chosen service, Army, RAF or the Navy, none of us truly knew what we would endure in the days, months and years ahead.

One fact that every Veteran will tell you is this, civilian life was no more, our civilian thinking removed from our young minds and our minds were brainwashed, our bodies pushed to extremes of physical and mental fatigue, but we got on with it, not realising until we served our time that our civilian brain was forgotten about and no one thought about trying to get us back to the civilian way of thinking, the growing up years a distant memory, civvy street becomes bewildering.

Many Veterans make the transition ok whilst many find civilian life daunting and alien and for many of these unlucky Veterans, life just spirals with little to no hope of a bright future.

I'm limited for space so I will finish with this. Reaching out is very difficult, It can be difficult for anyone but Veterans find it extremely difficult, difficult to ask for help and perhaps not even recognising they need help but help is on our doorstep.

NAAFI Break is a coffee morning where there are no barriers and peer support is available without shame or judgement so whether you're a sufferer or not, we welcome you to come along because we get it, we understand each other.

No Veteran should feel alone within their community, my small step has gone a long, long way. Coffee morning 1st Wednesday of every month 10am at Angelsey Abbey. Brew and cake, what's not to like?

Bottisham Broadband Relief as Village Connected

Broadband relief for around 1,800 rural residents and business owners in Bottisham, Swaffham Bulbeck, Stow cum Quy and Lode is now a reality with engineers set to complete work to extend a full fibre connection to them next month.

Work to connect the villages began in spring 2023 when engineers from telecoms company Gigaclear began extending its network using fibre optic cables. They have been going street-to-street either digging new trenches or using existing infrastructure such as poles and ducting in order to reach each property.

Senior Project Manager Ben Robertson said Gigaclear is working hard to ensure rural, often hard to reach villages such as Bottisham as well as its smaller, neighbouring communities can access the same fast and reliable full fibre broadband enjoyed by larger urban areas.

He said: "Taking our full fibre to rural communities that might otherwise have copper or an inferior part fibre broadband connection fundamentally changes them for the better because it creates choice for the people in those communities about how they work and how they live their lives."

Rank Brothers Ltd - The end of an era?

As many of you will have seen, my brother Geoff and I have sold the site at 56 High Street and we are now both retired.

My father Edmund and my uncle Albert had the garage built in 1957 on the site of a row of five cottages. Dad was a machinist and Albert a mechanic. The original building finished at the back of the current MOT bay with the front part for the garage and the MOT bay was a machine shop. The garage sold Esso petrol for most of the time but switched to Murco fuel for the last few years the filling station was trading.

The building has had two extensions during its life, the first ending roughly where the rear double green doors to the machine shop ended, then a third part which was where we had the machine shop. The last building work was the erection of the machine shop at the rear used by Geoff for his mower repair business.

Many of you may not have been aware of the business we ran behind the garage workshop. Rank Bros. manufactured and exported scientific instruments mainly used in research by universities and larger multinationals. We also carried out precision machining for many local companies both large and small. We had a well-equipped machine shop with two CNC (Computer Numerical Control) milling machining centres and one CNC turning centre, plus several manually operated machines. Using the latest CADCAM software (Computer Aided Design/Computer Aided Manufacture) we were able to machine parts for local customers from their three-dimensional computer models.

We first started making scientific instruments in the 1960s when a professor from USA was at MRC Babraham doing research for a year and wanted a copy of the instrument MRC had made in their workshop to take back with him. After contacting several local companies to no avail somebody suggested speaking to 'Ed Rank'. Dad agreed to make a replica and then agreed to pay a royalty on every instrument Rank Brothers sold. The instrument was a 'Microelectrophoresis Apparatus' to enable the surface charges of blood cells to be measured. The research was looking into the possibility of early detection of illnesses. We then started producing a whole range of instruments for research.

The company name has now been purchased by BWB Technologies and they are producing our instruments while retaining the Rank Brothers Ltd name, so our instruments and the Rank name are continuing to be sold worldwide. While quite technical, I'm proud that we manufactured these in our small rural location.

Bottisham Bird Brain

My last two articles featuring large birds of prey got me thinking about another large predator that can often be seen flying over our villages and fens, but is perhaps more often observed waiting patiently at the edge of a dyke or shoreline: the Heron (or Grey Heron), Ardea cinerea.

Our Heron, native throughout Europe, Asia and temperate parts of Africa, is one of 72 species in the family Ardeidae, which also includes the Egrets and Bitterns. A resident bird in the UK (as opposed to a migrant), the Heron is a creature of wetlands, lakes, rivers, ponds, marshes, margins and the coast. It has even been known to fish in garden ponds when food is otherwise particularly scarce!

Herons are perfectly physically structured for their lifestyle and diet. Standing a metre tall, they wade in shallow waters and watch mainly for passing fish, frogs or invertebrates, but will take any creature that isn't fast enough to escape its strike, including eels, voles and other rodents. Once picked-off in a single lightning strike, small prey will be swallowed whole, head first, but larger creatures may need to be stabbed repeatedly with the Heron's fearsome, dagger-like bill before being taken to the bank to be devoured piece-meal.

Ardea cinerea has been pretty successful in the UK over the last half a century and currently number up to 13,000 pairs, a population swelled in the winter months by perhaps 50,000 European migrants seeking the milder climate. And it seems to be setting the pace for a number of distant relatives to establish colonies in the UK. Already the Little Egret is common enough in the fens to warrant its own Bird Brain page in the near future; Great White Egrets are seen every winter now within East Anglia; Cattle Egrets are becoming more frequent visitors and showing signs of interest in breeding; Spoonbills are now breeding at a number of RSPB sites around the country; and Bitterns – driven out of the UK by the draining of marshes in the 19th Century – are again booming in carefully managed reserves, particularly in Suffolk and Norfolk. I wonder how long it will be before we can enjoy breeding pairs of Purple Herons around here...? This stunning bird

- Ardea purpurea – is currently resident in France and Holland and is hotly tipped to follow in the wingbeats of their relatives mentione above!

Back to the Grey: one of the most surprising – and impressive – sights in birding is the heronry. You might think a wading bird of this stature would be out of place in a tree, but they have the same ability to perch as smaller birds and build their nests,

in noisy colonies, in deciduous trees – favouring elms and oaks. I understand the UK's largest heronry is at RSPB Northward Hill in Kent, which houses up to 200 pairs. A pair will use the same nest year on year,

repairing and adding twigs and foliage until it eventually fails through the weight of its own construction. Herons will be seeking to breed at two or three years old and, once paired, will indulge in formal greeting displays to their partner on arrival at the nest. There is a protracted breeding season with an almost three-month fledging time and two broods of 3-4 eggs are common. The first eggs appear in mid-February and the last young fly in September, many of which head south after fledging, returning when it's time to breed. British ringed birds have even been known to reach Morocco.

The Heron's plumage does not sport much in the way of colour, being largely grey with a light, speckled throat and yellowish legs and bill, but one cannot deny it's a handsome creature and, in flight, you may be forgiven for thinking 'bird of prey', such is the Heron's menacing size, long wings and languid wing beat. With its neck tucked in and its feet extended beyond the tail, even other birds are uncomfortable with its presence and Corvids, in particular, will chase off Herons just as they would Buzzards or Kites. I'll always remember, as a kid in the 1960s, when introducing my Dad to the delights of birdwatching in Woodbridge, Suffolk, he took in the magnificent sight of a Heron flying low over the Deben towards us, exclaiming "Wow, this one looks like a four-engined bomber"! Not a description you might expect to hear these days, but he was a man of his time and I am forever grateful for his encouragement of my new-found – and now life-long – passion.





Bottisham and District Gardening Club

Our speaker at the September meeting was Colin Smith, who talked to us about Yuccas in the garden. He has held a Heritage National Collection since 1993 and his passion for yuccas started when he moved to Burwell.

Coming from the tropical climes of Devon to rain starved East Anglia, other plants he had grown in the West Country were quick to show their dislike of our local climate. There was nothing for it but to ship them back to Devon and look for more drought tolerant ones. The result was his passion for yuccas which hate to have wet feet and prefer sandy or gravelly soil. Yuccas are native to North America and can be found from the southern tip of Canada down to Mexico. They range from alpines to tall trees and larger specimens such as the Joshua tree and can live for 100 years.

It is not unusual for a yucca to take 20 years before it flowers and most appreciate a sunny position. Nearly all of them have sharp spines and weeding around them needs to be done with care. They are easy to propagate but rarely set seed in this country as they rely on the yucca moth for pollination, which is only found in America. Colin opens his garden in Burwell under the National Garden Scheme and ensures that he cuts off the lethal spines on his yuccas before the visitors arrive.

The Club had a very successful plant stall with Lode WI and the Community Library which added £57 to our funds.

We held out AGM on the 22nd October, but it's not too late to renew your membership and join us for the November meeting on the 26th when Barry Gayton will be talking about Cacti and Succulents.

Join us every Tuesday for our Coffee Mornings, treat yourself.


This is a little reminder that there are many ways to get involved through volunteering, fundraising, and even job vacancies for anyone looking to join the team.
