
At the time of writing this information, the implementation (change over) date has not been confirmed. The A to B1102 Group has therefore created a webpage where we will publish all the information you need to

TRIANGLE

As many of you may have noticed, the triangle at the shops has undergone a transformation over the last few weeks.

- Firstly, we would like to thank East Cambridge District Council (ECDC) for their Pride of Place grant, which has enabled us to install new benches and planters. We would also like to thank all those who were involved with the planning and installation of the project.
- You may also have noticed we have a new Community Notice Board. Anyone wishing to have an advertisement on the board should contact me at my details below in the first instance. We are currently reviewing a new map for installation on one side of the board, which will assist visitors to the village.

NP CONSULTATION

• The Parish Council were provided with an update from Cllr Morrison about the status of the draft Neighbourhood plan. The document has been submitted for informal review by ECDC and the Working Group will shortly be meeting to review the feedback. Once this has been completed and the Plan amended, it will be submitted to the Parish Council for approval before entering the Regulation 14 formal public consultation process. This concludes with a review by an independent inspector and a resident's referendum before it is adopted.

YEAR END FINANCES

- I am pleased to report that the finances for the year end have now been completed and are ready for Internal Audit, which this year is being carried out by Cambridge and Peterborough Association of Local Councils.
- We are expected to submit all paperwork for External Audit by 30th June 2025, so we are planning to commence our public rights to inspection early June. Details of this will be published on our website along with the Annual Governance and Accountability Return (AGAR) and associated paperwork. If anyone is interested in reviewing the accounts for the financial year end 24/25 then this will be your opportunity to make an appointment to inspect the accounts. The period only lasts 6 weeks, so I would appreciate early notice from anyone wishing to do so. Please feel free to contact me on my details below.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

Thank you to all who attended the Annual Parish Meeting on 29th April. While turnout was lower than hoped, especially given the local interest shown on social media, the new breakout group format encouraged open, focused discussions.

Key issues raised included:

- Planning & Development: Concerns were raised around the Budgens application for a license to sell alcohol. Updates were requested on progress with the new cemetery, the retirement village and Six Oaks solar park. The challenges with utility and fibre companies were also discussed. It should be noted that all planning applications are visible on the ECDC planning portal.
- Environment & Community: There was positive feedback on the new Copse Close play area; ongoing parking problems were raised; tree and hedge maintenance; unsafe footpath steps; and ownership questions about undeveloped land in Lysander Close land. Anti-social behaviour is currently minimal thanks to strong PC, police and BVC collaboration. BVC students are involved in local projects and Duke of Edinburgh volunteering.
- Highways & Transport: Speeding concerns and an update on the 20mph scheme were discussed. Other issues discussed were potholes; poor road markings; and calls for pedestrian crossings; new bus timetables for Tiger 4 & 5.

We encourage all residents to attend future meetings — it's your chance to be heard and help shape your village.


THE 80TH ANNIVERSARY OF VE DAY - A COMMUNITY CELEBRATION

Cambridgeshire County Council Report

I am delighted to have been elected to represent the residents of the Woodditton Division and really look forward to supporting this diverse set of communities, from Lode in the northwest to Kirtling & Upend in the southeast.

Firstly, a huge thank you to Alan Sharp, for years of service as a hardworking councillor for our community. There are so many that will appreciate everything you have done to support them.

I have met many residents over the past few months and look forward to meeting more of you moving forward. I am very approachable, so please do stop me for a chat if you see me in the village.

QUALITY OF LIFE SURVEY

The County Council's third annual countywide Quality of Life survey has launched this month and will help the council understand and track residents' views across Cambridgeshire.

The survey asks residents about their views on topics such as life and community, transport, health and wellbeing, children and young people, and the council and its services.

The information gathered from previous surveys has already been used to inform the council's Business Plan and Budget processes. This year there are two questions to help introduce the concept of Local Government Reorganisation to residents and provide an early indication of awareness.

Even if you are not one of the 1,100 people in this district contacted by the market research company, you can still take part. The survey is available at www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/quality-of-life-survey until Monday, 21 July. The responses will then be collated and published to councillors and the public in the autumn. The results will help inform council meetings and priorities for the years ahead.

ENVIRONMENT

Cambridgeshire Council has been re-accredited as a Bronze 'Carbon Literate Organisation', highlighting the organisation's dedication towards tackling climate change, working towards a zero-carbon future, and reducing its organisational carbon emissions.

This is a nationally recognised scheme which helps organisations reach 'an awareness of the carbon costs and impacts of everyday activities and the ability and motivation to reduce emissions on an individual, community and organisational basis'.

BUSES

From 27 May, the Tiger Bus Network will be delivering two new services that will support our area, Tiger 4 (Newmarket to Addenbrookes) and Tiger 5 (Soham to Cambridge). Though this is an improvement for some, it will not be for all, and I will continue to work to see what can be done to make the improvements residents have been asking for.

District Councillors' Report

Because of pre-election period restrictions due to the imminent County Council elections, there was no significant activity by the Council since the last report.

The by-election at Stretham ward, caused by the resignation of a Lib Dem Councillor for reasons of ill health, was won by a Lib Dem, so ECDC remains evenly balanced with fourteen each of Conservatives and the Lib Dem & Independent Group.

Members have had a seminar from Sanctuary Housing, and it was reported that many more houses have been renovated, and, now, occupied. If any one is aware of unoccupied Sanctuary Houses, please let us know so that we can check with Sanctuary. Sometimes major renovations must be done after a tenant leaves a house, particularly when they have been in residence for a long time.

Members have also had a seminar with the Police about Community policing, and John is discussing with the Area Police sergeant some of the problems that villages in this ward are facing. Please direct any further concerns or matters about policing to John.

We have also had a seminar about the Mepal Crematorium for which the building costs have escalated. Although it is possible to find the money from existing and expected CIL contributions, it will curtail other community projects.

Spring Report from Charlotte Cane MP

It's hard to believe, but it's now been over ten months since I was elected as your Member of Parliament—and what an honour it continues to be. I'm delighted to have spent that time fighting as your local champion and standing up for our communities in Parliament. My team and I have now closed over 4,300 cases—each one representing someone who reached out for help, advice or support. Every case matters, and I remain committed to making sure your voice is heard and your concerns are taken seriously.

Healthcare continues to be one of my top priorities. I recently spoke in Parliament about the challenges facing the NHS, including how hard it is for people to see a GP or dentist, and the difficulties local practices face in getting the resources they need. While we don't have a major hospital in Ely and East Cambridgeshire, we rely on others nearby—and it's vital that our own Princess of Wales Hospital is properly maintained. I've spoken with some of our local pharmacists, who are under huge financial pressure, and I've called on the government to give them the support they need and stop the wave of pharmacy closures affecting so many communities.

I'm also pressing the government for greater investment in rural public transport. Too many of our villages have no bus service at all, while others have infrequent services and nothing on Sundays. Our rural communities are fantastic places to live—but they must be accessible for everyone.

With proposals for large-scale battery storage sites across our constituency, I'm concerned that current fire safety regulations don't do enough to protect residents or the environment. These sites are crucial for supporting renewable energy—but safety must come first. I've raised the issue in Parliament and written to the Secretary of State, but so far there has been no satisfactory response. That's why I've launched a public petition calling on the Government to urgently strengthen safety regulations for large-scale battery storage sites, including requiring local fire services to be consulted during planning stages. It is possible to sign the petition here: bit.ly/batterystoragesafety

This spring, I enjoyed visiting Witchford Village College and the Centre School in Cottenham—school visits are always a highlight. I've also attended fantastic local events including Ely's Beer and Eel Festivals, Reach Fair, Soham Repair Café, and the new Policing Hub ceremony in Milton. On the doorstep, I've spoken with residents across the constituency, from Littleport and Haddenham, to Bottisham and Burwell. And I've hosted Community Meetings with residents and councillors in Waterbeach, Sutton, Soham and Ely. The next is in Cheveley on 7th June—get in touch to book your place.

The Scout group also urgently needs adult helpers. We are looking for help in 2 areas. Bottisham Bird Brain

This month, my featured bird is taking a back seat to some items of news, not because the bird is undeserving in any way, but in order to emphasise a couple of recent announcements by the RSPB.

Firstly, you may remember last month's description of Trichomonosis, which affects many passerines, and I urged you all to clean your garden feeders regularly... Well, the RSPB has now paused the sale of bird tables and feeders with flat surfaces due to the 'potential harbouring of infectious diseases'. Therefore, I recommend using only hanging feeders in your gardens for the time being.

You may also have read that Bird Flu - or Avian influenza, to give its proper name – can pose a serious threat to various bird species (especially water birds and chickens) and can be transmitted by humans handling dead birds. So please, NEVER pick up a dead bird.

Secondly, the RSPB has announced the results of the Annual Garden Birdwatch, in which 600,000 people took part (including many local residents), counting some nine million birds! The top five commonest birds are (in order): House Sparrow, Blue Tit, Wood Pigeon, Starling, Blackbird, which is not especially surprising, except that a significant drop in the Starling population is evident, with its lowest-ever number recorded. Prior to the year 2000, Starlings held the top spot on the Birdwatch count; now it has slipped to fourth, continuing a massive 50-year decline of over 80%. On a positive note, the bird that appeared in the most gardens this year, 84% in fact, was our beloved Robin.

And so to our bird for June. Perhaps more common in open green spaces than our gardens, the Pied Wagtail will be busy rearing its young by now and may often be seen in small family groups as the parents teach the fledglings how to feed and prosper. Motacilla alba yarrellii is actually a British sub-species of the Continental species of White Wagtail (Motacilla alba alba) and our commonest member of the Wagtail family. It is easily distinguishable from the other two – the Grey (Motacilla cinerea) and the Yellow (Motacilla flava) – due to its wholly black and white plumage, and sports a darker back than the White. Not that you're particularly likely to see the others on any given day... the Yellow is a summer visitor, seen mainly on meadow and arable farmland, whereas the Grey is a resident bird of uplands and wetlands, never far from flowing water where it darts around after insects. Both are extending their range though... I have seen the occasional Yellow out on my bike (that's me on the bike, not the bird!), and I understand Greys have been seen on the River Cam in Cambridge recently.

The Pied Wagtail is 7 inches from beak to tail, a fairly bold bird, full of perky character, fast runs, and sharp movement, and – like all Wagtails – will flick its tail habitually. This behaviour is poorly understood by ornithologists but thought to be connected with either

flushing prey, or signalling pecking order information to other birds, or announcing to potential predators that it is alert and ready to take evasive action! Slender-billed, the Pied Wagtail takes insects on the wing and off the ground and will even pick insects off the front of your car. It remains insectivorous throughout the winter, feeding on beetles, spiders, maggots, even small worms as well as whatever flies are available.

As far as nesting is concerned, Pied Wagtails have shown themselves to be extremely adaptable. They like holes and are not overly bothered by humans. So, whilst their natural home may be a crevice in a bank or ditch, they will also nest in bridges, buildings, even abandoned machinery and old cars. Both sexes take responsibility for nest-building: a rough cup assembled from twigs, grass, leaves and other plant matter, lined with soft materials, including animal hair. The female lays between three and seven eggs, two or three times a year, and will take the majority of the sitting duties while the male leads on food acquisition. The eggs take around 12 days to hatch; the hatchlings take around another 12 days to fledge, then both parents will feed their young for another week before dispersal and parents' preparation for the next brood. Everything about this bird suggests "busy"!

The Pied Wagtail's amusing character has given rise to much affectionate writing and folklore, and several nicknames have been coined, including Gypsy Bird, Willy Wagtail, Penny Wagtail and Polly Washdish: a hark back to the days when women would wash dishes and clothes in rivers! Scottish poet William Soutar wrote of "Wullie Waggletail" in a vernacular that might be understood by our esteemed editor, but not by me. *** ("Fitters in atween the fleurs and shogs them, ane be ane"!) So I'll leave you with a slightly more accessible offering from the master of rustic verse, John Clare.

TTFN - Gerry Daish

Little trotty wagtail, he went in the rain, And tittering, tottering sideways he ne'er got straight again. He stooped to get a worm, and looked up to catch a fly, And then he flew away ere his feathers they were dry. Little trotty wagtail, he waddled in the mud, And left his little footmarks, trample where he would. He waddled in the water-pudge, and waggle went his tail, And chirrupt up his wings to dry upon the garden rail. Little trotty wagtail, you nimble all about, And in the dimpling water-pudge you waddle in and out; Your home is nigh at hand, and in the warm pigsty, So, little Master Wagtail, I'll bid you a goodbye.

Safety reminder as charging batteries cause several fires

Charging batteries have already caused several fires in homes across the county so far this year.

Firefighters have been called to fires involving batteries being over charged, resulting in thermal runaway from the lithium-ion contained in them and causing significant damage to people's homes.

Crews from Wisbech and March, along with crews from Norfolk, recently attended a well-developed house fire in Wisbech. They arrived to find the battery from a DIY home conversion e-bike kit had exploded, with the fire spreading throughout the property causing significant damage. One of the residents was treated for burns at the scene.

At the start of April crews from Cambridge attended a fire on the ground floor of a house in the Chesterton area of the city. They arrived to find an e-scooter, as well as several other items including power tools, on charge in the living room, with one of the batteries having exploded. Luckily the residents closed the doors while evacuating the property, which limited the damage.

At the end of March crews from Ely and Burwell, along with Newmarket from neighbouring Suffolk, attended a fire in Soham. They arrived to find a fire in the kitchen resulting from two devices being charged, a games console controller and a portable power bank.

A matter of days later the Peterborough Volunteer Fire Brigade and a crew from Yaxley attended a fire in Orton Malborne in Peterborough. This again involved a battery used in a DIY home conversion e-bike kit, bought in an online market place. One of the residents sustained burns that required hospital treatment.

Both of these fires caused significant damage to the properties.

Station Commander Gareth Boyd, one of the Service's community risk managers, said: "These incidents highlight the potential risks that lithium-ion batteries can pose and how it is vital for people to be alert when charging any kind of device. Last year firefighters attended around 20 fires involving batteries charging in homes, with more occurring already in 2025.

"Electrical devices are a key part to everyday life for most people. Mobile phones, tablets, laptops and games console controllers, as well as vehicles like e-bikes and scooters are used daily and need to be powered to do so.

"Most devices come with safety features to ensure they do not overheat when being charged. Using the charging packs, cables and plugs provided by the manufacturers, rather than cheaper versions will help charge devices safely. Replica replacement chargers sometimes don't have these features and can end up overcharging the battery, which causes thermal runaway leading to explosions and rapidly intense fires."

"We have seen items for sale, at car boot sales as well as online, that people can use to convert a standard bike into an e-bike. These whilst seemingly a cheap alternative can be highly dangerous and do not conform to the required standards to be sold in the UK."

Residents are being reminded to Take Charge and Be Safe, remembering some simple tips to help keep themselves and their families safe.

Gareth added: "Most new items come with a suitable battery and charger, however if you are looking to purchase additional ones then make sure they are the right voltage and are fully compatible. Other things like charging a mobile phone while you are awake and alert, rather than while sleeping, means the device won't be overcharged and risk overheating the battery. This can be the same for any device."

The Service is encouraging people to plan a good bedtime routine. Things like making sure all internal doors are closed, electrical sockets are switched off, any candles or heating appliances are off and keeping hallways and stairs clear of obstructions. This will not only help prevent a fire from happening but also ensure an easy escape if one does.

Gareth said: "Many fires in the home start at night while people are asleep. This can be down to a number of different causes, but can be easily avoided by following a few simple tips, as well as having working smoke alarms on each floor of your home. A bedtime routine is a great way to help you and your family stay fire safe in your home. By following a few simple tips before heading to bed for the night, you can prevent a fire from happening or, if one does break out, stop it from spreading."

Residents can also use our online home safety check to carry out their own fire risk assessment of their home. This simple to use tool goes through each area of a property and generates a safety plan for the occupants to follow. The check can be carried out on behalf of a vulnerable family member.





The new TIGER 4 and TIGER 5 bus services - supplementing the existing 12 bus service that links Newmarket to Cambridge city centre via the A1303 and Bottisham – both start on Tuesday 27th May, immediately after the Spring Bank Holiday. The TIGER 4 (T4) will link Newmarket, Exning, Burwell, Reach, the Swaffhams, Lode and Bottisham to the Wilbrahams, the Cambridge 6th Form Colleges and Addenbrookes. The TIGER 5 (T5) will link Soham and Fordham to Burwell, the Swaffhams, Anglesey Abbey, Quy and Cambridge city centre. Both TIGER 4 and TIGER 5 replace the existing 11 bus service. The 12 bus service continues unchanged.

In the week beginning 19th May the AtoB1102 group will be publishing on its website at www.atob1102.org timetable information on the new services, from data provided by CPCA and the bus operators. In a bold new endeavour like these TIGER bus routes it is understandable should not everything have been got completely right first time. Consequently, it is understood that the new services will be reviewed by CPCA in the first months of operation so that any feasible identified improvements can be introduced in September.

News from Bottisham Medical Practice Patients' Participation Group

FROM THE PRACTICE:

- **Dispensary**: 2025 has been a challenge for the dispensary teams in terms of staffing. We are actively recruiting new staff. There are simply not enough qualified dispensers in the area looking for work. We continue to offer home delivery for medication. Patients can request medication online, we encourage you to request medications via this method to avoid errors.
- **Our Multidisciplinary Team**: Did you know that you do not always need to see a GP, we have team members that can diagnose, prescribe and if necessary make hospital referrals for some illnesses / conditions
- **First Contact Physiotherapists** provide patients with expert diagnosis and treatment for musculoskeletal conditions including neck pain, back pain, knee pain, hip pain, wrist pain, ankle pain and general problems with arthritis. Dominic works on Thursday and Charlotte on Tuesdays. You can book an appointment directly with them via reception. They have appointments available as currently are rarely full. Please use them or we will lose them!
- **Minor illness nurses**: can diagnose and treat certain health conditions, order tests and interpret results, prescribe some medications and make hospital referrals. You may be booked into see a nurse practitioner rather than a GP if reception triage that your condition does not need a GP. If you see the nurse and they feel you did in fact need a GP this will be arranged swiftly, usually right there and then. Examples include minor illness such sore throats, chest infections, rashes, ear ache. Practice Nurses can also assess minor injuries, provide support with long term conditions and contraceptive advice.
- **Use of text messaging**: you may receive more text messages than you used to, asking you, for example, e to measure your blood pressure or have a blood test that is due. In order to reduce postal charges we will use text messages where we can. We will be asking more of you to measure your blood pressure than before as there are now new government targets to meet for the GP of every patient over the age of 45 years at least every 5 years. We have 3193 patients in this category!
- **BLS training**: the patient participation group is planning a basic life support course in connection with the East Anglia Air Ambulance who are offering free training locally currently. Advertising will be on facebook and in the surgery when a date in finalised so please look out for this.
- **Next Meeting**: In July at the surgery, date to be notified. If you are interested in joining our meetings please contact our chairman Steve Gilson s.j.gilson@btinternet.com.. Or contact reception.

Bottisham Airfield Museum Group (BAMG)

By the time you read these words the Museum's newest exhibit should have arrived, a WW2 Tiger Moth. This aircraft is in the markings of Squadron Leader Johnny Johnson, a famous WW2 fighter pilot who learnt to fly at Marshall's Airport at the time Bottisham was used by No.22 Elementary Flight Training School. It's probable that he flew from Bottisham during his training. This aircraft was originally donated by Marshall's to Duxford IWM, but due to refurbishments Duxford put the aircraft up for disposal and our application to bring this historic aircraft to Bottisham was successful. We hope to unveil the Tiger Moth at the Bottisham at War 1940's weekend on Saturday 5th and Sunday 6th July.

That weekend will also feature battle reenactments, military vehicles and living history displays, stalls, WW2 singers and dancers. On both Saturday and Sunday we are fortunate enough to kick off the show with flypasts by Spitfire and Hurricane aircraft from the Battle of Britain Memorial Flight between 10:30 and 11:00. Advance tickets are available now on www.eventbrite.co.uk and also on the gate.

The Museum has had a very busy first two months of the new season with visits from local groups and coach parties from the USA. The first Classic car and Bike Show took place on the 11th May and the Museum has attended events for V.E. day at Bottisham, Duxford and Little Walden in Essex.

The Museum will be attending the D-Day and 'The Americans' airshows at Duxford in June and July this year, and the Cambridgeshire Country Show at Quy in August. On August 17th we hold our second Classic Car and Bike show, adult entry only £7.50 including entry to the museum. Our resident band "Back in Time" will be playing in the Hanger and hot and cold food will be available. 


