At our meeting at the beginning of November, once again road traffic and parking issues were discussed. We are considering purchasing cones which would say 'no waiting' on them, which could be put out on the double yellow lines outside of the shops to deter vehicles from continually parking here. Blue badge holders, who are able to park on double yellow lines for 5 minutes would still be able to park but should be 25 yards away from the junction. We are aware that our PCSO covers many villages but are still not happy that Bottisham receives so little attention.

Councillor Bryant recently read a report relating to Great Shelford Parish Council who are exploring the possibility of paying for extra PCSO time as they were also unhappy with the current level of service that they received. For a conditional grant from interested parties of £1000 this would pay for 42 hours over a suggested 6 month period. This would be voluntary overtime for the PCSO and would be outside of their normal working hours, although we recognise that with cutbacks in services there may not be so many PCSO's to go round in the future. Bottisham Parish Council agreed that they would not really want to spend money on this kind of scheme and would instead encourage people to park more considerately, especially around the shops area. We have sent in our application for extra lay-bys to Highways and wait to hear the result of this.

We hope that the vehicle activated signs should be installed in Bell Road this side of Christmas. We had some problems with the County Council changing what had previously been agreed but we have now gone ahead and Councillor Jolley is liaising directly with the manufacturer and supplier who will be doing the installation for us. This will then complete the traffic calming measures in Bell Road, the first part of which was installed last year.

The information board has now been sited at the Scheduled Ancient Monument at Oxmeadow and residents are encouraged to have a look at this. Residents have asked if a dog litter bin could be provided in Lode Road and we are looking into this with East Cambs District Council.

With regards to the cemetery please be aware that the tap has been turned off for the winter to prevent the water freezing and then leaking which has happened before. It will be turned on again in the Spring. We have a gravestone in the cemetery which has collapsed and is in need of repair but I am unable to find any direct relatives. The deceased is Ada Cornwell who was buried in 1980, if anyone in the village knows of any relatives I would be grateful if they could get in touch with me. Councillor Ogborn has been working with a cemetery consultant and is preparing information for a pre-planning meeting with the District Council regarding the land we are purchasing off of Lode Road.

The Finance Committee have begun to discuss the budget for the next financial year. Last year the precept remained the same for the third year running (£23,000) but it was pointed out through the Cresset that it would have to rise significantly for Parish Council to be able to provide a new cemetery and playground. This will be discussed further and finalised at our December meeting. The County Council has also recently sent through to Parish Council reports concerning their budgets for each department and the cuts that they have to make for the next financial year. These look to be severe with the emphasis very much on making the community more responsible and we wait to see what changes take place.

I have also been asked to make people aware that a defibrillator is now located at the first entrance to the Royal British Legion. People working at and living near to the British Legion have received training on how to use this equipment.

Bottisham Parish Council wishes everyone a very happy Christmas and New Year. See you in 2016.

I was interested to read in last month's Jolley old World, that the cause of the current crisis in the NHS was solely attributable to immigration. Having spent over twenty-five years in the health service I had assumed, quite naïvely it now seems, that the reasons for Addenbrooke's and other acute trusts being in, or on the cusp of, special measures were rather more numerous and complex.

**Dear Editor** 

How foolish of me to have believed that the current economic climate and the rising costs of energy, services and supplies may have placed pressures on public funds. That, maybe, with progressive developments in medicine more interventions can now be made for more illnesses, that long-term complex conditions such as diabetes, kidney and heart disorders can be better managed and that the success of these advances was evident in that we now possess an aging population. It seems quite inconceivable that I thought that being able to deliver more care, better care and maintaining those levels of care over longer periods actually had cost implications. I'm almost embarrassed to have supposed there were issues such as a shortage of GP's, resultant pressures on A&E and Urgent Care Centres, increased public expectations, impacts from modern lifestyle choices or that there were systemic legacy issues inherited from a structure which was originally designed to treat disease but now extends out into the realms of mental health, social care, rehabilitation, vaccination, family planning and beyond; or that there might be a lack of clear leadership in an increasingly Byzantine system with an absurd internal tariff structure which is married to an unhealthy obsession with paper targets rather than qualitative patient outcomes.

I am immensely grateful for the revelation that the challenges facing the health service can be boiled down to one issue, not least as this epiphany will undoubtedly make future service planning a great deal easier for all of us.

It has been my very great pleasure to work with many people from various nationalities. ethnicities and cultural backgrounds, from consultant surgeons to contract cleaners, all of whom, far from dragging the system down have actually kept it running, if not actually promoted, developed and improved it. At a time when trusts are seeking to bridge gaping skills shortages by recruiting from Europe and beyond and, moreover, that some trusts have called upon the government to ease overseas recruitment restrictions to facilitate this, it would seem that immigration is less of an ill and more something we can ill do without.

I am unsure what sort of a sense community was trying to be encouraged but in view of the opinions expressed I am hardly surprised there was a reluctance to rush to the cause. I find it bizarre that with this article and others that have preceded it, there is a loud call for the community to come together, yet often within them are passages that can at best be described as alienating or divisive. You ask if snobbery inhibits community. It may well do but I can think of other obstacles as well. Anyway, ending on a more positive note; given the content I felt that the inclusion of Einstein's quote on the boundlessness of stupidity was entirely apt.

### Lucy Frazer MP Helps on Broadband

Access to broadband is critical to Cambridgeshire businesses and residents. As I met parish councils over the summer, it was clear that there are some small villages which are not properly connected.

Some people have contacted me about poor broadband in Bottisham. At a time when we are investing in superfast broadband and increasing connectivity, it is not acceptable that many people still have such issues. I want to correct this.

On Friday, 23rd October, I held an open meeting to bring together BT, Connecting Cambridgeshire and affected residents to resolve these problems and I wanted to update you on Connecting Cambridgeshire's and BT's position at that meeting.

As you are probably aware, Bottisham has been upgraded via the Connecting Cambridgeshire programme and superfast broadband is available in the village, however some premises may be particularly hard to reach meaning that a connection to the fibre network may not be possible. Where appropriate, alternative technology may be used to provide broadband connectivity (minimum 2Mbps). These technologies are likely to be delivered later in the roll-out.

Whilst I am very happy to assist with all queries, Connecting Cambridgeshire is very keen for those with problems to contact them directly. For specific broadband issues and information on the programme, you can contact Connecting Cambridgeshire by emailing contact@connectingcambridgeshire.co.uk. For BT-specific issues, if you have already spoken with your service provider, you can call BT directly to try and resolve the issue.

I will continue to press Connecting Cambridgeshire and BT to deliver a service that we deserve. *Lucv Frazer MP*

There is email in circulation that appears to have been sent from a legitimate Constabulary email address. The email appears to come from 'Lyn Whitehead' and is asking the recipient to pay an invoice that is attached to the email. If you have received it you MUST NOT open it. Instead delete it from your email system to avoid infecting your device. If you think you have been a victim of this type of email you should report it to Action Fraud, the UK's national fraud and cyber crime reporting centre. www.actionfraud.police.uk

### Stay well this winter

In the past year as many of one in four residents in Cambridgeshire visited A&E when they could have used an alternative service or looked after themselves at home.

Each visit to A&E costs the local NHS £87, and that's before any treatment is given. When you look at the figures, this costs the local NHS over £4million a year. In turn this is the equivalent cost of 677 hip replacements, or 287 liver transplants or 115 more dementia nurses.

Using A&E when you don't need to can also have a knock-on effect to the rest of the hospital, as busy A&E departments resulted in 500 cancelled operations and procedures because a bed was no longer available, and longer waiting and referral times.

### But you can help

- Stay healthy get a flu vaccination if you are eligible
- Look after others check on elderly friends, relatives and neighbours especially in spells of cold weather, help them to keep warm and have the medication they might need
- Be prepared get your prescriptions in early before the holidays and see your pharmacist or GP for any issues you might be putting off

In the meantime the Mad Hatter-Blatter has compounded his lunacy by admitting that the Russian World Cup deal was stitched up before the official voting! Is there no end to this man's skullduggery?

We are told by the Sports People's Think Tank in their annual report to an All-Party Parliamentary Football Group at Westminster that, at the current rate of progress, it will be another 31 years until black and minority ethnic managers are properly represented in English football. It seems that the 'properly represented' idyll would not be reached until the percentage of BME incumbents of elite coaching/management posts rises from the current 4% to the 25% that would reflect the number of BME players in the professional game. I wont bore you with another volley about the flawed arguments of the 'Rooney Rule' campaigners (I fired both barrels last November if you remember!) but I would just like to highlight an example of the nonsense emanating from these 'visionaries'. Former journeyman striker and now SPTT chairman, Jason Roberts, talks about a "structured exclusion of a minority in football"; then, in the next breath, he laments that we are losing potentially top managers and coaches because "When you're a black player and you're coming to the end of your career you think, 'well there's no opportunity for me as a manager', and the statistics only prove that." Sounds like a self-fulfilling prophecy to me!

So the South African government, in their wisdom, decided to effect a moonlight flit from prison to 'house arrest' for Oscar Pistorius in late October, having incarcerated him for less than a year for slaughtering his girlfriend on Valentine's Day 2013. The RSA judiciary termed the move 'correctional supervision'; Reeva Steenkamp's relatives, demonstrating extraordinary restraint, called it 'getting off lightly'; I would go a tad further and call it a hideous travesty of justice. It's difficult enough to understand how a man guilty of 'culpable homicide' received a sentence of only five years in the first place, but to release him after having served only one sixth of his time... well, it smacks of politics doesn't it? All part of the big fudge to appease the lobbyists on both sides of the divide – one side favouring the courageous, record-breaking, national athletics hero; the other deploring an egotistical, gun-slinging psychopath.

Personally, I've always had my doubts about Pistorius: he never even struck me as a magnanimous winner. Do you remember that unedifying protest of his, over the blades worn by the Brazilian Alan Oliveira in winning the 2012 Paralympic 200m? That gave the world a glimpse of the ruthless, self-centred heart of the man who ran as if victory was his entitlement rather than something for which to compete. Neither did his bleatings about fairness cut any ice with the insightful Mrs Nut, who repeatedly observes "He's got no warmth in his eyes". I guess the story will endure, ad infinitum, for the prosecution has been

Their seemingly infinite pool of talent seems set to dominate world rugby for the foreseeable future, but I hope it'll be at least another 4 years before we see the Haka again! What makes opponents put up with this grotesque anachronism?!

### An utter disgrace!

Shortly after the November Cresset was issued I had my knuckles well and truly wrapped by Paddy James for inferring that the Wednesday coffee morning at the Legion was only attended by the more 'mellowed' residents of our society. I'm very happy to be reprimanded by anyone who would like to take issue with anything I've said in this column but I can only speak as I find. Possibly I made the mistake of not actually going in. Hopefully Paddy will take the opportunity to correct matters in this issue or the next.

Thank you also to the person who had a slightly different view about whether the Home Secretary was correct in saying the UK can longer sustain unbridled immigration. Their argument being that; this country should welcome any one that wants to live and work here and that immigration provides the UK with a net benefit and a secular multicultural society. The fact of the matter is that we are a country a third of the size, but without the land mass, of either France or Germany yet France and the UK share similar size populations. According to the UN Britain is set to remain the third greatest destination for migrants in the world. Currently every public sector 'service provider' in Britain is heaving under the strain of demand caused by population growth. You need go no further than Cambridge to see clear evidence of this in our hospitals, medical practices, social welfare, councils, roads, schools, stations...

Has anyone heard of or recognises the name 'Henry Willink'? No, neither had I until I read an extract from a book by Joshua Levine. Levine writes that; after the 'Blitz' the then Government had anticipated hundreds and thousands of deaths but instead it was faced with large numbers of homeless people with nowhere to stay, no money, clothes or possessions. Sound familiar... The 'authorities' at the time had no idea what to do about any of this. So, the Government's reaction was to appoint 'Henry Willink' - a long forgotten war hero and Conservative MP - to overhaul the structure of London along progressive lines. As a Great War artillery officer, Willink understood the concept of a 'front line'. He gradually started to make replacement housing available and removed the 'poor law' stigma that was making claimants feel more like Dickensian beggars than victims of strategic bombing. He introduced benefits and information centres where the dispossessed would receive help and advice. These reforms can be seen as the early stirrings of the 'welfare state', an acknowledgement that the vulnerable need to be protected rather than judged. Today modern Britain owes a great debt to Willink and much of what emerged from his foresight and vision we now take for granted. But if Willink were alive today I wonder what he would make of the exploitation of his legacy? Let's just remind ourselves again of the raison d'etre behind Willink's vision; the welfare state is to protect the vulnerable and needy!

I've no idea whether Sports Nut will comment on the Scotland v Australia Rugby Union World Cup game so apologies if I'm stealing some of his thunder; So Craig Jourbert continues to expresses his dislike of British rugby by, and I never thought I would ever say this, denying Scotland of a well-deserved win. But not only that; he showed utter contempt toward both teams by sprinting off the pitch at the end of the game without the decency of shaking hands with the players - 30 chaps who had tussled and skirmished for 80 minutes providing the spectators with edge of the seat end to end entertainment. With Scotland in the lead by 2 points and with only 3 minutes to go Jourbert awarded Australia a penalty that was within easy

kicking distance of the Scottish posts. A penalty I might add which at best was a no more than a scrum in favour of Australia for a Scottish 'knock on'. But no, out of a melee of hands and feet Jourbert 'hesitantly' judged it to be a deliberate Scottish 'knock on' followed by a Scottish offside which demanded a penalty kick. The fact that Jourbert was hesitant in making the decision suggests to me that there was some doubt in his mind - in which case any sensible referee would have referred to his touch judge (linesman) particularly at such a crucial time in the game. The cynicism in me suggests that his bias against British sides was played out in those few seconds of hesitancy. In fact when ITV later showed the replay you could see the Scottish captain pointing to his arm and talking to Jourbert suggesting something had happened in the fray that Jourbert hadn't seen. The replay proved Laidlaw to be right and showed that the ball clearly came off an Australian hand which meant the ball was played on and therefore in play when the Scottish player picked it up. What a travesty on which to end the game! English fans in particular have come across this referee before with England often fielding their 15 against an opposing 15 plus Jourbert. Yes, there are subtle differences in the style of play between Northern and Southern hemisphere sides which, most world class referees are mindful of - but neither is more right or wrong than the other. The prejudice displayed by Craig Jourbert during that game was an utter disgrace to the referee profession! T.I

### **Public Transport Matters**

I wrote in October of the chaos at Cambridge railway station as regards ticketing while the rebuilding is being carried out. We, therefore, allowed time before our train was due in order to renew our senior rail passes and obtain tickets through to Portsmouth. Sorry, says cheerful young man, we don't do renewals here, you have to go to another office. But he could do the tickets to Portsmouth and give us a receipt so that we could get our passes at King's Cross station. Efficient chap there organised the renewals and asked whether we really meant to go to Portsmouth from Victoria station rather than Waterloo. We had just presumed that the young chap was booking via Waterloo and hadn't mentioned it. We ended up with new tickets stapled to the old ones and with the correct route but, of course, we now couldn't put them through the machines at the platforms. Fortunately, there was always a member of staff there to wave us and our luggage through. With assisted boarding with a mini-bus ride into the innards of Brittany Ferries Pont-Aven and then the lift we were soon settling into our pleasant crossing to Santander for 5 nights. Our return journey turned out to be rather more rocky as we entered the Bay of Biscay! Once again I checked at the little tobacconists near our hotel and discovered that our bus card like an Oyster card was still valid and in credit! We topped it up and set off into the centre and visited the little café in the railway station to be greeted with happy smiles of recognition and handshakes with the staff -a lady, her dad and uncle! Who needs pastures new – revisiting happy times from the past can be gratifying.

£100,000 is being invested into an upgrade of Newmarket railway station – a partnership of Abellio Greater Anglia, Newmarket Racecourses, Jockey Club Estates, Tattersalls, Suffolk C.C. and Suffolk Heaths Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. (Mark Carne has suggested that businesses should pay for new railways as they can benefit). New signs saying 'Newmarket Home of Horse Racing' and new LED customer service screen to provide an easier review of running information and a card-only ticket machine where you can also collect tickets bought on-line. Jet-washed platforms and hanging baskets. Car park improved. However, there has been a complaint that this is not good enough! – increase to a half-hourly service to prevent standing at busy times and increase the car-parking available. A Newmarket station on the Ely to Bury route or re-open Chippenham junction?

The campaign group Rail Haverhill has collected 3,000 signatures in support of a rail link between Haverhill and Cambridge. You can join on-line or they will have a market stall on December 4th. They feel it would benefit commuters as Cambridge housing is now so expensive. Simon Norton, the transport campaigner, is arguing for revenue support for buses as he says that a comprehensive service cannot be provided on a purely commercial basis. The City Deal makes no provision for this. Rail Future East Anglia has published a map of how a metro system for Cambridge and around could look.

National Express continues to zoom along the A1303 but there are still no signs or information at Newmarket bus shelter by and opposite Hughes. I have now got Suffolk C.C. involved and they are contacting National Express.

Congestion continues to be a major problem in Cambridge and there are regular complaints of delayed buses. Our non-show today of the 10 at 10 a.m. turned out to be due to the installation of temporary traffic lights in the heart of Newmarket and total chaos there! You feel sorry for the bus drivers having to cope all day. Bob Stevens has told me of an informative website 'Realtime Trains' which gives details on the progress of every passenger and freight train in the country to the nearest minute and their history for the past seven days. It is interesting to explore the freight trains and their routes in connection with

the wish to get more of the A14 freight traffic on to rail. The doubling of the line between Soham and Ely will help but the Felixstowe branch line should be done first. Bob suggests various ways that things could be improved.

The first new railway in a century between a major city and London – Oxford to London Marylebone via Bicester has been opened by Mr. Carne. It is operated by Chiltern Railways -12 miles of new track, three stations at a cost of £320 million. Chiltern is owned by Deutsche Bahn. This is part of the east-west rail project linking Oxford to Milton Keynes and Bedford and on to us in Cambridge, then Ipswich and Norwich and dubbed the Varsity Line. Crossrail 2 would benefit us too. Upgrades on other routes are being delayed due to costs - the Trans-Pennine route, Midland Mainline between Bedford and Sheffield and the stretch between Bedford, Kettering and Corby.

National Express coaches are running over the Christmas period and 95 per cent of rail services will run except that there will be 'works on the line' including Greater Anglia. Paddington station will be closed on December 27 and 28.

Just a reminder that Seat 61 is a very useful website when travelling to France – he recommends Eurostar to Lille and then changing to a TGV. Having heard of the recent experience of neighbours changing trains at Paris, which involves changing stations, it is obviously preferable!
