Hello to you and welcome to our November issue. It is a month that means different things to a lot of people.

But firstly a correction.

Last month, the Newman family put an obituary notice in *The Cresset* following the death of Tony Newman. It was not noticed until after publication that Tony's birth year had been inadvertently put in as 1944. By 1944 Tony was 20 years old as his birth year was in fact 1924. The family asked if this correction could be put in this month's magazine and I am pleased to do this now.



November now and it is a month of remembering. Firstly, "Remember, remember the 5th of November, gunpowder, treason and plot etc". Most of all remember to celebrate safely. For children, it is an exciting time and they can get carried away with the excitement. Adult supervision is needed whenever fireworks are around. But also for adults, sensible planning and following directions are required. Every year we read about accidents which one thinks couldn't or shouldn't happen. Well think sensibly and it needn't.

The second event to remember in November is Armistice Day. The 11th hour, of the 11th day, of the 11th month. Two minutes of silence to remember all those who gave their lives for us in the two great wars and conflicts since.

You will read in the British Legion notice elsewhere in the magazine, that Bottisham & District will remember, this year, in two ways. Firstly, on the nearest Sunday, the 8th Nov, there will be a service in Quy Parish Church, to which everybody is invited. There will be Standards of various local organisations and the attendance of the Deputy Lord Lieutenant of Cambridgeshire.

Then on Wed 11th November itself, leading up to 11 o'clock there will be a short ceremony at the village sign in the High St. outside the vicarage opposite the Church.

In addition, at the village sign, there will be a small garden of remembrance where personal wooden poppy crosses can be laid by individuals. These crosses are available from Poppy sellers or The Royal British Legion Club.

Importantly I think this as an opportunity for all of us to think of a family member who was taken in one of those conflicts or affected by it. There are very few of us who were exempt from that bit of family history. You may not think of it applying to you, but we could all with some thought, find some part of our ancestry which was affected by these events directly or indirectly.

My experience is a thankful one, where my very existence depended on a pure chance and a faulty fuse. My father was a squadron leader navigator in bomber command who survived against the odds, not only the 50+% casualty rate of crews, but by a miracle, which still makes my hair stand on end and for which I like to give thanks.

Flying over Germany one night, my dad was at his navigator's table in his Halifax bomber when an ack-ack shell, which detonates by a set altitude fuse, came up through the bottom of the fuselage, smashed through his table failing to explode and went out through the top of the plane, then exploding above and outside the aircraft. Oh how things might have been different!

For a separate event, he was awarded, amongst others, the Distinguished Flying Cross (DFC) of which I am now the proud guardian.

Given thought, we all have thanks to give for those who went before, and we should remember them and recognise them, if only on this one event in the year. Give it some thought.

Now a note about our magazine cover this month. This is a photograph of a wreath which was created by the children at Bottisham primary school last year, on the Centenary of the outbreak

of WW1. Each leaf was written by a pupil, noting their thoughts about the impact of the Great War on the soldiers and their families. It makes delightful and informative reading. Very moving, being such young children. I understand that a similar exercise is taking place at the primary school again this year.

Holy Trinity Bells

The Bells - a last word

In truth the bells themselves have had the last word. I suspect that all in the well-filled church must have been stirred when the moment came in the service of Rededication when the bells had been blessed and rededicated and the Bell Hanger, Andrew Nicholson, and the Tower Captain, Derek Latchford, bearing a symbolic bell-rope, marched off to the belfry to join the waiting ringers for a celebratory peal. A great moment and the culmination of a project that seems to have stretched back to time out of mind. However, all that has to be remembered is where we started and where we have finished; compared with that the tortuous pathway between the two, filled with forms, official bodies/boards/trusts and waiting for decisions, is of little interest. Having said that, the non-bell part of the project is not quite finished. There is still work to do in the ringing chamber to fit emergency lighting and to bring the electrics up to modern standards. 'Community' aspects, an important part of the grant awarded to us by the Heritage Lottery Fund, have to be completed and to bring that to a conclusion we are planning, as we promised HLF, to have another Open Day at which aspects of the history of the Bottisham bells and their ringers will be presented and there will be an opportunity to watch the bells being rung. If we can fit it in, there will be a talk on Patterns and Peals.

It may also be possible to organise trips up to the belfry to see the reborn bells, but definitely not while they are being rung! The **Open Day**, more a Rounding-off Day for the whole project, will be on **Saturday 28 November from 2 pm**. Refreshments will be available throughout the afternoon. Our hope is that at the end of this phase we shall have at least two or three recruits to ringing. Come and join the band!

This will be the last 'update'. We are very grateful for the interest that has been shown throughout the project and, of course, for the donations that closed the funding gap and made it all possible. I shall quite miss (I think) being stopped in the street and asked about the bells or, indeed, when the clock is going to be working again. Quite remarkable in this digital age how many still look to the church clock to see what the time is. *Mike Young*

Parish Notes

I have received several calls/emails regarding litter/dog waste this month. Following on from Mr Hughes' letter in the Cresset last month and communications I have had with him, East Cambs District Council are looking into putting a litter bin by the bus shelter on the A1303 (Hilton Park end). Several people have also complained about dog mess which seems to be becoming a problem again. Please, if you have a dog, clear up after it when you take it for a walk and when you have cleared up please take the bag with you instead of leaving it insitu. It is an offence to not clear up after dogs on the footpath but wouldn't it be nice if people could get in the habit of clearing up after their dogs wherever they are. I have received a complaint from a resident about litter and dog waste on the right of way across farmland from Thomas Christian Way through to the Arber Close and Jenyns Close footpath. This is used by a lot of people including school children and it would be lovely to be able to walk this way without treading in dog poo, please be considerate to other people.

On the theme of Mr Hughes' comments, Parish Council would encourage any resident walking through the village to pick up any litter they see lying about and dispose of it. Although it would be great for people not to litter in the first place and to take their rubbish home with them, if you are walking through the village and see litter please pick it up and put it in the bin rather than ignoring it. All those dog walkers could use one of their spare dog litter sacks to pick up rubbish on their daily walks. What a lovely clean village we would have if everyone thought like this. Along with our 2 litter pickers who go out at the weekend we know that there are now several residents in the village who go out litter picking regularly as well as someone who is working towards their Duke of Edinburgh award and is doing village litter picking as their voluntary aspect. I realise that many of you do this on an ad-hoc basis but wondered if it may be an idea to co-ordinate efforts and get a rota going. Please contact me if you would be interested in this idea. Next March sees a nationwide initiative to celebrate Her Majesty's 90th birthday 'Clean for the Queen', in which the whole country will be encouraged to pick up litter and keep the country tidy. It would be nice if we could get this going and be ahead of the game before March.

The grass cutting season will be coming to an end shortly and we have asked CGM, our contractors to make sure all footpaths in the village are well tended before winter. We have also arranged for the 8 lime trees in the cemetery to be cut back as they have grown quite large and over shadow some of the bungalows in Downing Close.

There is a new Highways Officer at the County Council and he has arranged for the drains to once again be flushed out on Lode Road, at the bottom of Bradfords Close which regularly floods in a downpour. Although this may help, it will not completely alleviate the problem as we have been told before that the Victorian drains are just too small. He has also been looking through the village at areas that may need resurfacing, although he has only a small budget for this we have made requests for parts of Beechwood Avenue, Pound Close and the area outside of the shops to be considered. *Claire Fullwood, Bottisham Parish Clerk*

November Bulletin

It's that time of year again - nearly !

FIREWORKS and bonfires can be great fun for all the family to enjoy. However, the fire service recommends going to an organised firework display, instead of holding one at home. If you do use fireworks or light a bonfire at home, we would ask residents to take on account of our safety advice to ensure that it is just fireworks that go off with a bang !

- Keep all fireworks in a closed box and always follow the instructions.
- Light them at arms length using a taper and stand well back.
- Never return to a lit firework.
- Never put fireworks in your pocket or throw them.
- Don't light bonfires in unsuitable weather, particularly in windy conditions.
- Don't leave bonfires unattended.
- · Build bonfires well clear of buildings, fences and hedges.
- Never use flammable liquids to start the fire, and never burn dangerous rubbish such as aerosols, paint, foam furniture, rubber tyres or batteries.
- Before you light a bonfire put all pets indoors. But also check that no children or other animals are hiding inside the fire and are a safe distance away.

And, don't forget! Keep testing - smoke alarms save lives. Michael White

Is our village too 'Snobbish'?

But first let me apologise for sending The Cresset 'The Wrong Trousers'! To my horror I found that in my haste to meet the October deadline the version I'd submitted didn't acknowledge a couple of sources I had used and that there were some grammatical mistakes. I contacted the Editor but alas it was too late...

You may recall in September's issue that I was praising those who responded to the questionnaire about a Community Forum or Society. On the basis of this enthusiasm I was encouraged to ask for volunteers to respond to 'the call'. Well, I'm really disappointed to report that only two people made contact with me which really isn't sufficient to go to the next phase which was to create an independent working group. So, I've decided to copy the results of the survey to Parish Council in the hope that possibly the 'Community Working Party' may be able to pick up on some of the points you raise. In case you're interested herewith follows an insight into some of the ideas put forward:

Quite a few respondents felt more could be done to provide day time meeting places for groups with common interests, for example a mother and toddlers group and a drop in forum with possibly daily newspapers and internet access for those normally on their own during the day. I know that The Legion does a Wednesday coffee morning often attended by our more 'mellowed' residents but there could be some scope here to expand, even possibly an idea The Bell could take up. One or two suggested a central point for couriers to drop off parcels that could be collected later in the day, say on the way home from work. Something that a number of you put forward was events that 'mix people with different interests' and suggested Quiz nights. Again I know that The Bell does a very good pub quiz fortnightly and that occasionally the Library Association and Bowling Club do one. But is there scope for even more? What came over as very popular was events that involve the community at large; Village Fete, Village Fun Day, St George's Day - children could make appropriate items and or costumes depicting St George and the Dragon and parade down the High Street for a best fancy dress award. Possibly club activities for children during school holidays was also popular. One idea I particularly liked was a monthly village cinema. I've been to two of these and they seem very popular. All you need is a room able to take around fifty people and space to put the hired projector and screen. The last village film show I saw was in Cornwall earlier this year presenting 'The Imitation Game' - the following month it was 'The Theory of Everything'. Matinee performances were showing a series of old Fred Astaire and Gene Kelly musicals much enjoyed by those in their advancing years. May be we could build on this idea and offer a young people's cinema evening... A more contentious suggestion (and it wasn't mine, honest!) was a medium to debate village issues, gather information, review options and implement some plans.

One person suggested that they'd not found a good forum for meeting people, like dog walking groups, cycling club, tennis club etc. Well, if you're interested in cycling might I suggest you contact Brian Lewis at The Anchor on the High Street (The Anchor was one of the many village pubs in Bottisham). I know the 'lads' and occasionally 'lasses' go out at least twice midweek and at weekends. I'm not sure what's happened with the Tennis Club – I remember them having an issue with the Village College but whether this was ever resolved I'm not sure. Someone else commented that they do attend village events but those willing to take the lead are becoming fewer and fewer. Yes, I do agree and this was one of the aims of a Village Society - to find leaders. Hey Ho! I had to smile when I saw this one;

"I've found certain clubs and places in the village too snobbish". But seriously, is this true; are our clubs, societies, et al, elitist and unwelcoming?? Perhaps this perception should not be dismissed lightly... Several suggestions included a 'Welcome Pack' for new residents. More is needed to stimulate teenage engagement is the cry from a few. Again this is something a Village Society could take on board – it's not too late so do get in contact if you're interested.

Now to matters that have an impact on us here in Bottisham. No doubt we all know about the worrying situation at Addenbrookes Hospital being in 'special measures'. And so it was interesting to listen to the Home Secretary talk about whether our 'strategic infrastructure' comprising; transport, utilities and of course public services including the NHS, can cope with the additional demands that immigration is placing upon it. Of course, she was lambasted in the media for saying what the evidence clearly suggests and ves, it was a political speech that deliberately chose words that pandered to the gathered assembly. But when you look past the syntax and set aside the absurd vitriol posted on social media what was she actually saying? The message she was advancing was that a 'non-selective' open borders policy has the capacity to overwhelm a country's 'strategic infrastructure' in an instant whereas an instant fix to the country's 'services dependant' infrastructure is not something that can be remedied overnight. And please, this is not anti-immigrant talk; it's simply stating the blatantly obvious. Despite the benefits of economic growth the stark reality is that our country cannot sustain the level of population growth currently being inflicted upon it. The greater the number of people that come here to work the greater the demand placed on the country's 'services dependant' infrastructure and round and round we go. A line surely has to be drawn! But what measure is to be used to determine where we position this line? Could it be where our 'strategic infrastructure' can no longer cope with the pressures of demand? So, returning to Addenbrookes; is what has happened there an unmistakable indicator that the demands being made have expanded beyond what is pragmatically sustainable? And if so, what is the warning from this to public services in general and to us; 'Joe public'? Well, with Addenbrookes we already have one very real and unambiguous example and I would suggest we can all point to many more! TJ

Public Transport Matters

Sometimes an article in a newspaper or magazine brings personal memories flooding back. This has happened recently due to the announcement by First Great Western, one of the most frequently criticised railway companies, that it was reverting to its old name of Great Western Railway originally given to it by Brunel in the 1830s. It was also known popularly as God's Wonderful Railway. Back in the 1940s I was a keen Girl Guide at Leigh-on-Sea in Essex and each week I took in 6d. to an account to enable me to go on the annual camping holiday. We had a keen Guide Captain and visited Scotland, Devon and Cornwall. My mother used to come as camp nurse. We used to travel on the Great Western Railway and one year we went to Par in Cornwall. As my mother's name was Gladys Winifred Read and mine was Patricia Ann Read, we felt it was a very personal trip! Very happy times - I nearly hunted for the old photo albums! As patrol leader, I wore a knife at my belt and we could cut back the turf for our camp fires before sitting down to supper on a circle of groundsheets - my mum once had to cope with a girl, who had sat on a fork!

There have been letters and articles ref. people's experience of the present railway compared with the old days of dining cars and punctuality. It has been christened Worst Late Western - new names suggested are Goes When Ready and Gone with Regret. The company hopes to revive the old glory days of this line with its stunning stations, viaducts and what was once the world's longest tunnel. Green livery on new trains, updated staff uniforms and ticket office improvements. The high fares and overcrowding need attention. We compare badly with other European countries on these, according to a report, but our trains are the safest.

First Western have also been awarded another franchise to run trains from Paddington to South Wales and the West Country until 2019. The latest-generation Super Express trains being built by Hitachi will replace the Intercity 125 diesels from 2017 cutting journey times and adding extra capacity but buffet cars are to be scrapped as they take up room. Postscript are advertising a new book, A History of the Great Western Railway - 01626 897100

Regarding matters local - they are here! The promised green Bio buses recycled to us rural travellers from the guided busway are now seen regularly from my kitchen window and we have also travelled on one - much more comfortable and a smoother ride.

I was at the Tesco bus stop on Newmarket Rd. at the same time as a Stagecoach member of staff, who was checking bus punctuality and talking to passengers. She told me that 10 buses were being shared round but that now has to include King's Lynn as well. It is annoying when buses are late particularly if you have an appt. to keep. The 10 a.m. and 12 midday are often affected. I am told by drivers that these are often busy services and it takes time to check people on board. Please have your passes or cash ready not deep in a bag or pocket! Also check that you have the latest timetables - March 2015 for both the 10 and 11/12 services. Having heard of a local experience, I repeat my warning from last month ref. the 2 service – it goes all round Mill Rd. to get to Addenbrooke's! The rail upgrade between Ely and Soham has been put on hold but local MP Lucy Frazer and Euro MP Vicky Ford have joined forces and written to Network Rail's chief executive, Mark Carne, and Transport Minister, Claire Perry, asking for their support in getting funding to complete the project. It is hoped it could ease congestion on the A14 and keep lorries off the roads. Future visions, according to Prof. Bob Miles of CUED, include bullet trains below and driverless pods with park and ride sites 10 miles away connecting to Marshall's, Addenbrooke's and the new West Cambridge site. The trains would zoom in at 120 m.p.h. taking less than 4 minutes rather than the present hour. The pods could zip between the three sites and drop you off on demand using your smartphone! But not until 2065! An earlier possibility is the offer by Astra Zeneca to pay for a bus service along the A428 to Addenbrooke's and a bus-only slip road at Trumpington and Madinglev Rd. off (Public Transport Matters continued next page.)

the M11. The council transport chief, Graham Hughes, cited the guided busway and A1307 as examples of how bus use had increased giving a quick, reliable service into Cambridge.

Reports about the projected HS2 fast rail link rumble on and it is now forecast to be 7 years late and cost £250 million more due to a redesign to boost efficiency and reduce disruption to residents. Since privatisation of the railways the number of passenger journeys undertaken has more than doubled - 1.65 billion journeys were made last year up from 801 million in the 1990s when services were put in the hands of private operating companies but the new Labour policy is for renationalisation of the railways. Passenger income now covers the day-to-day operating costs of the railways with the govt. funds being invested in upgrades such as track renewal.

The well-known tube map designed by Harry Beck in 1933 is redesigned to show a more geographically accurate picture. It was originally produced to aid in engineering work but has now been added to Transport for London's website due to interest.

Once a month Ruth visits a local prison and shows the prisoners how to do high-quality needlework. The kits are supplied by the Charity and Ruth teaches them how to make them. The work has to be perfect and they are finished on the back using blanket stitch which makes the cushions very long-lasting indeed.

Prisoners spend long hours in their cells often from 7 o'clock in the evening until 7 o'clock in the morning and the needlework is vital to their well-being; some sleep very little and spend their time doing this wonderful needlework. They are paid for this work and this fosters confidence, hope and self-discipline and also creates the opportunity for them to send some money to help family members or to save for their release. At the same time they become part of Fine Cell Work through their regular classes and gain a powerful experience of inclusion, connection and integration through the extensive network of volunteers, staff and customers. The aim is to enable them to acquire new skills, to earn and save money and to acquire the self belief to stop offending.

One prisoner said "Fine Cell Work has given me back my sense of pride in myself, my self esteem and my self-worth." There is a long waiting list for prisoners to join the class.

Ruth showed us some beautiful examples of the needlework. This handmade work is supported by designs from interior designers including Pentreath and Hall and Kit Kemp and is bought by organizations such as the V & A and English Heritage and the public.
