The author Clare Mulley, our speaker for April, transported us back to the life of a World War 2 secret agent. 'The Spy who Loved - the secrets of Britain's wartime heroine' is the title of her latest book and tells the story of Christine Granville who loved adventure and danger. This was clearly a woman ahead of her time who was passionate about freedom and independence for the country of her birth, Poland.

She became a secret agent in the early stages of the war and the retelling of her story was a breath taking adventure of dangerous undercover operations and amazing escapes from capture. Christine was the first female British secret agent who served in many different theatres of the war including Poland, Egypt, France and Italy. At the end of the war she was awarded the George Cross and the OBE for her outstanding contribution.

Sadly she was murdered in a South London hotel seven years after the end of the war. You will need to read the book to find out how and why!

RE:NEW Church Family



For the past year I have had a deep sense of compassion for those men, women, boys and girls fleeing from their war torn countries and seeing refuge in Europe. I don't presume to speak for anyone else, I speak for myself in the light of my faith, experience and interpretation of what the Bible says.

"Give justice to the poor and the orphan; uphold the rights of the oppressed and the destitute. Rescue the poor and helpless; deliver them from the grasp of evil people." (Psalm 82.3-4)

I have been praying for and pursuing justice for the marginalised wherever I come across them - the poor and hungry in Teesside, the migrants in Calais, the Roma in Romania, the homeless in Mexico, those around me who are lonely, suffering abuse - or through whatever circumstances find themselves involuntarily prevented from accessing the productive activity upon which society is built. God's heart is for such people, Jesus would speak for them and as one of His followers, I will speak up for them too.

Justice is not only about punishing wrongdoing, it is also about bringing the world back into balance. So, in feeding the hungry, housing the homeless, accompanying the lonely, standing with the refugee, supporting the abused through to freedom, I can be part of the redressing of the balance, as indeed can you with whatever opportunities you are given.

I believe Jesus will judge me based on how I have treated the marginalised in the world, He personalises it in the Bible when He says, "I was hungry, and you fed me. I was thirsty, and you gave me a drink. I was a stranger, and you invited me into your home." (Matthew 25.35) When his disciples didn't understand what He meant, He clarified that, whenever we meet the needs of others, it is as if we are doing it for Him directly, such is His closeness to, and heart for, the marginalised.

How blessed I was, to have visited the 'Jungle', Calais on May 1st to stand with the Orthodox Christians and worship with them on Orthodox Easter Day; they fed me, they gave me a drink, they invited me in; and my country remains largely closed to them.

Please check out care4calais.org or their Facebook page, please help. I've spent time with the people in desperate need, heard their stories; this is not an issue to be resolved, they are people to be rescued. They have names, are precious and deserve justice. Some folk from RENEW will be returning to Calais to help in our small way, get in touch if you'd like to support us. We'd love to welcome you to one of our services. Parish Notes

Summer now seems to be on the way so now is probably a good time to remind people to keep their hedges cut back so pedestrians can walk on the pavements easily. Although we have the same company cutting our grass this year they are from a different branch of the company so please let me know if any grass verges appear to have been missed from the cut and I will let them know. It usually takes a couple of months for them to learn the different areas of the village. Often volunteers help out in the churchyard with some pruning and such like which is always very helpful however someone keeps cutting the ivy back off of the medieval church wall between the church and the back of the primary school. This wall is very old and the ivy literally holds it together, if the ivy is removed the wall will just crumble which it is beginning to do in places. The Church is very grateful for your help but please can the pruning be done in another area.

Lots of residents have been asking when the next electrical recycling will be as this is a good opportunity to clear out the garage etc. This has now been arranged for **Wednesday 29th June**. Posters will be going up around the village soon.

By the time of reading we will have had our Annual Meeting of Bottisham Parish Council and I will be able to report back in the July Cresset on that. Another date for the diary is Thursday 4th August. Our MP Lucy Frazer will be holding an open surgery at the Royal British Legion in the afternoon which will be a great opportunity for residents to go and meet their elected local MP and discuss any issues they may have.

Most residents will be aware of the proposed extension to the Village College. Although we have not received the full planning application for this yet we have received an application for the installation of 4 temporary classrooms. It must be emphasised that these are a temporary facility and installation will take place during the summer holidays. This is the first phase of the future expansion of the College and other phases will be subject to further applications at a later stage.

Councillor's Bryant and Buchanan met recently with Bidwell's who are the agents for Peterhouse College who own the land off of Bell Road and have been involved with the David Wilson site. They were informed that Peterhouse College will not be going ahead with any future planning application on the site with David Wilson Homes. There have been a lot of structural changes within the company which they are not happy with. This may explain why residents and the Parish Council have had trouble getting in touch with them over various matters. The College itself will make an outline planning application to the District Council; they have no developer in mind at present. The layout that was decided will remain mostly unchanged but there may be some design changes to the houses. We can expect a planning application soon.

The public open space at Ancient Meadows has been subject of many conversations. The Parish Council were first approached by the District Council who own the land. They are selling off many of their land assets and wished to know if the Parish Council wanted to purchase the land as they knew we were lacking in play facilities in the village. However, they have failed to come up with any further information regarding the legalities of placing play equipment on this piece of land and this has therefore been ongoing for some time. Obviously local residents are very keen to know what is going to happen here and we have now written to the Chief Executive of the District Council asking for them to progress the matter.

We receive many letters each year from various charities asking for donations as this seems to be how they survive nowadays. We have a small pot of money each year that we

The District Council received £10K of Home Office funding to conduct enhanced awareness and training on the Government's 'Prevent' strategy. This is the initiative that tasks public services with increased vigilance in spotting the signs of a vulnerable individual becoming radicalised and falling into extremism. Project groups have developed an innovative campaign and materials to go out to schools and community groups as well as a publicity campaign to raise awareness to residents which starts 16th May.

SPOTTED FLYCATCHERS - do you have this increasingly rare bird breeding in your garden?

Spotted Flycatchers are attractive little migrant birds which are summer visitors to UK village gardens and churchyards. Although they breed with us, they spend ten months of the year travelling between here and their wintering grounds in Southern Africa. This is an increasingly dangerous journey for them, and sadly they are in deep decline. Widespread losses amounted to a 50% decline during 1995-2010, continuing an 88% decline since 1970.

These are very inconspicuous birds. They really like village gardens and churchyards but may be locally extinct soon. Householders often know they have them in their gardens when the formal wildlife people are unaware of them.

Only some fifty pairs remain breeding in Cambridgeshire, so it's now quite a rare bird, but most rural villages still have a pair or two. The Cambridge Bird Club is running a survey this year to find and monitor nesting pairs, and it's almost certain that there will be additional pairs in our villages of which they are not aware.

Bottisham & District Gardening Club

Our April speaker was Liz Mann, a former member of the gardening club, and her topic was The National Memorial Arboretum. This being the anniversary year of the battle of Somme in the First World War, perhaps a more detailed summary of her interesting and thoughtprovoking talk on the formation of the Arboretum is apt.

One hundred years ago we were mid-way through the First World War. By then there had been over half a million British casualties and, with the Somme to follow from July to November 1916, a further 300,000 names would be on the list by the end of the year. On the first day of that awful battle, nearly 60,000 British men died. The First World War officially ended at the eleventh hour on the eleventh day of the eleventh month: Armistice Day. Over 17 million people were dead, of whom nearly 700,000 were British military personnel. Their memories, and the memories of all who have died in the many wars since then, are commemorated on Remembrance Day each year.

In the late 1980s and early 1990s a number of things occurred which brought about the development of the National Memorial Arboretum. Group Captain Leonard Cheshire felt that the United Nations and its member states were reacting slowly to the increasing number of natural disasters around the world: famines, earthquakes, floods. He wanted to create a fund so huge that the interest alone would provide sufficient funds for any disaster relief operation, anywhere in the world. He also wanted people to give to this fund in remembrance of lives lost in the two World Wars. With the backing of the Secretary-General of the United Nations and many Heads of State, the idea of the World Memorial Fund for Disaster Relief was ready to be put into action.

At the same time, Royal Naval Commander David Childs was also trying to raise interest in Disaster Relief operations. Eventually the two men united in their efforts to get this off the ground. In 1988 David Childs visited Arlington Cemetery and the American National Arboretum, and the idea of a British National Memorial Arboretum was born. Leonard Cheshire died in 1992, but David Childs pursued the idea and started looking for a suitable site. A site owned by Redland Aggregates near Lichfield in Staffordshire was identified; the plot was badly drained and marshy, the soil was poor, but it was available. Eventually Redland Aggregates offered the land with a 999-year lease at a nominal £1 a year rent. The original disaster relief fund had in the meantime been taken over by the Disaster Emergency Committee, and donations soon came in for the establishment of the National Memorial Arboretum. It was officially opened in 2001, it covers over 30 acres with in excess of 50,000 trees planted. In the years since then, more than 300 separate memorials have been erected on the site, not all of them military-based.

The Shot at Dawn Memorial commemorates the 306 British and Commonwealth soldiers 'shot at dawn' during the First World War for desertion or cowardice. The memorial grove is at the eastern edge of the site, where dawn first touches the Arboretum. The name of each man is mounted on a wooden post arranged in arcs around the central statue. 75 years after the war, the Secrecy Act was lifted and campaigning started for pardons for these men and in 2006 a posthumous pardon was granted to all 306 men. A truly moving memorial.

The Beat is the Police Memorial Avenue. It is an avenue of chestnuts, funded by every Police Force in the UK, each force has a plaque beside a tree. Individual memorials are found between the trees for police officers who died on duty. Chestnuts were chosen because the first truncheons were made from this wood.

The Far East Prisoners of War, with such terrible images, have a memorial which includes the original lych-gate from Changi prison camp cemetery, and sections of the original track from the Burma and Sumatra railways.

The War Widows Grove is dedicated to those women who lost their husbands during or as a result of their service careers.

The Children's Woodland was designed to combine trees, wildlife and education with remembrance. It has become known as the Wind in the Willows Wood, with carvings of characters from the book. The trees in the woodland are individually dedicated to children who have died.

The SANDS Memorial has been placed by the Still-birth and Neo-natal Deaths Society.

There is the Millennium Chapel of Peace and Forgiveness, the only place in the country where the act of remembrance is carried out every single day at 11 o'clock.

The Armed Forces Memorial is the largest and most impressive memorial in the Arboretum, a mound 100 metres wide at the base and 6 metres high. On the flattened top are four walls, 2 straight walls within 2 curved ones. At the centre are two bronze sculptures. 15,000 names were carved when the memorial was first created and there is space for 15,000 more. Each spring the names of those who have died in the previous 12 months are engraved, a dedication service held and all the names read out.

These are just a few of the 300 individual memorials, space doesn't allow for more detail. 75% of the funding is self-generated, 18% comes from the Royal British Legion and only 7% is public funding. Liz has contributed her fee for the talk to the National Memorial Arboretum. Thank you Liz for a truly inspirational talk.

- If someone is in trouble, call 999 immediately. Do not hesitate to call the emergency services and give clear details of your location.

Also, as always, please don't forget to test your smoke alarms, ideally weekly. Smoke and fire can kill!

Compline by Candlelight

Have you ever felt the need to sit quietly, away from distraction, and concentrate on something deep inside you - on your soul, for want of a better word? Some would call it a need to sort one's thoughts, others might call it meditation, others a form of deep prayer. Everyone, from time to time, needs a moment of silence for contemplation, for spiritual succour.

Compline by Candlelight, or C by C, is held here in our own Anglesey Benefice on the first Wednesday of every month, in a candlelit Bottisham Church. People arrive at 8pm to get to know each other a little, perhaps over a glass of something soft, and the service starts at about 8.15pm, lasting no more than 45 minutes. It is inspired by prayers used for centuries by monastic communities at the end of their day and incorporates periods of silence for reflection.

But as well as spiritual contemplation, there's another extremely powerful element to Bottisham C by C. There have been miraculous answers to prayer. People come not only for spiritual renewal, but in desperation: with news of a devastating medical diagnosis, the dread and panic felt after a sudden development in life, the sense of helplessness in the face of world tragedies. The extraordinarily powerful effects of combined meditative prayer have often been seen and felt at Bottisham C by C.

Sarah Maxwell has run Bottisham C by C for eight years, and each month puts together an inspirational yet contemplative 45 minutes. Everyone is welcome.

Thoughts of a Sports Nut

"One of the greatest sporting stories ever told." said Phil McNulty on BBC Sport. "A team of cast-offs and bargain buys written off before the season had started, led by a manager who had been sacked in five of his previous jobs." added Matt Davis, also on BBC Sport.

Thus, the incredible tale of Leicester City's rise to Premier League winners reached a slightly odd conclusion when Chelsea's Eden Hazard curled in a beautiful goal to snatch a draw at home to Spurs in a match where the bad-tempered squabbling and fighting was an utter disgrace to football. This decisive moment meant that Leicester could no longer be caught and the rest is history. The collection of journeymen and misfits had inexplicably gelled into a team of champions whilst the millionaires of the other big clubs faded away one by one to scrap over the remaining Champions League and Europa League places.

By the way, who would join me in feeling a little sorry for referee Jon Moss after his controversial handling of West Ham v Leicester in mid-April? You know, the one where he sent off Jamie Vardy. Jolley Old World

Brussels or Westminster?

"The village magazine is no place for politics!" I hear the bellowed cry. But is 'Brexit' really only about politics? Even in the political arena there are dissenting voices amidst the major parties. So is the point at issue more about what scenario we as individuals believe will best deliver a viable and flourishing future for this country and for the generations that follow. I think it is a topic of local relevance on which to reflect, particularly as whomever you meet and no matter how hard you try to avoid it, the 'question' invariably slips into the conversation.

I don't know whether you watch 'Question Time' on the BBC - it's a programme people tune in to, to get a measured feel for what's important to others around the country. But I must admit to being somewhat disappointed by the contributions made by recent panels and in particular the manner in which one panellist turned it into their own 'soap box' citing all sorts of statistics and claiming their figures were right and everyone else's were wrong. Lots of opinions are being bandied about by pundits, even by the Governor of the Bank of England, based purely upon analysis of guesswork and assumptions simply because no one will really know what will happen until 'it' happens. And whilst these people continue to speculate on 'fear theories' and participate in 'scaremongering' on what they don't know then both camps are theoretically right!

Most people I believe like to be able to make informed decisions and this means having the known facts put in front of them rather than have the realities distorted. In my opinion both sides are equally at fault in this respect. Indeed, perhaps for some the economic argument is far stronger than the case for democracy and self-government. But what I find frustrating, particularly in the economic debate, is the real evidence - the quantifiable numbers that no one seems to want to give or agree upon.

Believe it or not readily available on the EU's website for all to see are the EU stats for 2014. Rather than cite them all here the important numbers show the UK net contribution after rebate (for matters in which the UK doesn't participate) as £14bn, which is the second highest contribution after Germany. However EU spending in the UK totalled £5.5bn - you can do the numbers. And the latest trading figures represented a continued decline for UK goods and services in the EU whereas the UK is one of the largest importers of EU products.

In addition to the numbers are the equally important issues of democracy, security and self-government. Some of these worries are of course the effect of certain pieces of legislation. But unlike economics not all of these matters can be quantified - only qualified as either appropriate or inappropriate to the British psyche depending on which side of the fence you are on. Certainly the UK has had and still has issues with some rulings coming out of the ECJ and the ECHR especially where such rulings conflict with our own laws and with the Government's ability to act in the national interest.

Some important numbers on which to reflect are exposed in the EU's own economic data, none more so than the large part of the UK's net budget contribution being distributed elsewhere within the EU. What, I wonder, could be achieved in this country with the net annual saving? Even so, to its credit some virtuous legislation has been introduced by the EU and peace in the region has, in the main, prevailed. But we also hear that the Eurozone is facing a number of political conflicts which are threatening to interfere with the EU's

recovery and the bloc's stability and unity as a whole. As members of the EU these complications will undoubtedly pose challenges for UK political and economic security.

The Government has however negotiated a 'deal' that grabs back some control over our democratic system. And if we vote 'IN' the Government has also agreed a UK veto on becoming part of an ever expanding and more federalised EU. This being so I suppose the overriding question is whether the UK must remain in the EU to be able to trade successfully with the rest of the world. The Obama disclosure suggesting there is no guarantee to achieving an individual trade deal with the US or with the rest of the world if the UK goes it alone will naturally play heavily on peoples' minds. When I heard Obama's comment it reminded me of the film 'Love Actually' where the UK Prime Minister (Hugh Grant) told the US President 'to get on his bike' if his idea of 'the special relationship' was all about the bigger partner's interests – in Obama's case the Transatlantic Trade and Investment Partnership or TTIP!!

But it's to this country's acclaim that it is widely recognised as one of the world's most globalised economies and that it would not have shaped its status in the world or continue to enjoy its freedoms, democracy and prosperity if as a nation it had not ventured into the unknown beyond its shores and found trade; faced up to challenges; stood up to oppressors and fought for democracy. Has our Prime Minister then been 'sold a pup' by the EU or has he done enough to justify putting past achievements behind us? And will the 'deal' be sufficient to overcome peoples' anxieties and doubts? Furthermore, will UK influence continue to have as much sway as the EU grows even larger?

At the end of the day there's unlikely to be a single and wholly satisfactory choice for everyone. Of course the safe haven is to vote for the status quo as no doubt the EU will continue to function very much along the same lines as now but with some new assurances for the UK provided by the 'deal' - better the devil you know! For those who want to see the return to democratic self-government there is a clear option. To what extent the nation's economy will falter or continue to prosper will be down to how well it plays 'the hand' dealt by the croupier. But which croupier is likely to deal the better hand, Brussels or Westminster - the choice is yours... TJ

Following on from my mention in last month's Cresset of the fact that there are now National Express leaflets of the local coach services in Newmarket Library, I have now ascertained that there are also National Express leaflets at the Information Desk in the Grafton Centre and at long last - 3 years of requests - there is a National Express display panel in the Newmarket High St. bus shelter by Hughes. Not one in the bus shelter on the other side of the road but at least there is some contact information by Hughes. They say that if they put up the actual times, it is then a problem when they change. They have been a bit reluctant to supply the printed ones for the same reason but not everyone has a gadget to make contact.

I am always grateful for the editor's comments, but my travelling this month has been a bit limited. Alternatively, across Christ's Pieces to Drummer St.
