Pre-School Play Area Working Party

As many of you know, a Working Party set up by the Parish Council earlier this year has been looking into pre-school play provision in the village.

In 2011, the Bottisham Village Vision Questionnaire asked residents "How you would like you see the village/parish change in improve in the future?". The most common response after "no further development" was "Provide more facilities for children/young people".

Bottisham is an unusual village because despite its size, the Parish Council owns no land. This makes meeting that vision very difficult.

Some residents may remember play equipment used to be in place at the Village College and behind the British Legion many years ago. Both were removed when they fell into disrepair. For safeguarding reasons, neither the Primary School nor the Village College can be accessed during the day. The Working Party wanted to establish if there was a particular need for pre-school play provision during the day in light of this hence the questionnaire which was sent out last month.

169 responded to the questionnaire. 88% said they believed there was insufficient pre-school play provision in the village. 75% also said that they would support the Parish Council acquiring land if it became available for that purpose with 83% also in favour of installing some play equipment. The full results are available on the Parish Council website. A lot of valuable comments and suggestions were also received which the Working Party plan to now work through. Many of you have offered to help and we plan to contact volunteers in the New Year to ask if they would like to be involved.

In the meantime, the Working Party would like to thank those involved in distributing and collecting the questionnaires and to you for taking the time to fill them in.

Dottie my aged bantam finally succumbed and literally "fell off her perch" one night recently. She wasn't much of a looker – and when she moulted she looked an absolute sight – more fitting for the roasting tin than roaming around the garden. Apparently it is what is expected from her breed – a "frizzle" – basically she looked as if she stuck her beak in the electric socket and all her feathers stood up on end. I tried to find him to give him something, but he had gone, I had lost him in the crowd.

That nameless young man and dear old Dottie have brought home to me how superficial and instant can be our judgements. Yet Jesus bucked the trend – he sought out

those society judged – the poor, the ostracised, the outcasts. The Bible – both Old and New testaments, tell us repeatedly to care for those in need and who are "different" as part not only of our human solidarity, but also as part of God's reaching out in love.

I have a short prayer I say each morning – and I leave it with you

God, grant me this day generosity of spirit, clarity of mind, and warmth of affection.

May that generosity and warmth be each of ours in the coming days.

Parish Notes

Firstly, news of some major changes to the A1303 were presented to us by County Council Highways at our December meeting.

The County Council have secured significant funding from the Department for Transport Safer Roads Fund to improve the A1303 from the Quy roundabout to the A11 flyover. Over £175M has been allocated to the 50 most dangerous 'A' roads in the country based on accident statistics and volume of traffic using the road. The A1303 was identified as the highest risk road in East Anglia. Eight Councils were supported by the EuroRAP Pathfinders Project which is funded by the RAC Foundation. Roads are inspected and software is used to provide an objective measure of the level of safety built into the road, the road is then given a star rating by road user type between 1 and 5.The A1303 achieved a 2 star rating. All 50 roads have gone through the same method using the same software. The software then suggests countermeasures to reduce the risk to road users based on international research. It has taken 2 months to survey the road and put the proposals together and the County Council now have 6 months to spend the majority of the £1.3M given to them for the project and the £145K they have also contributed before the end of the financial year.

Funded countermeasures will include rumble strips which will warn drivers if they are too near the grass verge and there will be a protected turn lane into the two entrances into Wilbraham. There will also be street lighting at these junctions. The curve delineation on the route to Newmarket will be improved with extra lighting built into the road and there will be improvements in the layout to all existing junctions. There will also be a lay-by for the bus stop on both sides of the road on the A1303 by Hilton Park and a safer crossing route to the bus stop. The software does not like large trees by the road. Where there is a large cluster of trees, a safety barrier will be installed which will be timber clad to fit in with the surroundings. It was explained that a safety barrier has to be installed 30 metres either side of a tree so it makes more sense to remove lone trees and replant in one area that can then be protected by the barrier. Queries were made by Parish Council regarding the Quy roundabout and the priorities coming off of the A14 which had been looked into approximately 18 months ago. Highways will talk to Highways England again regarding this as this was their responsibility. We also queried whether there would be any speed restrictions but apparently the software did not show that a speed limit reduction was needed as there were no built up areas although there will obviously be temporary speed restrictions whilst the work takes place.

The successful DFT application can be found on the County Council website under transport bids. There will be a more detailed scheme plan available in the New Year on a dedicated webpage. Further detailed public consultation is planned next year on the roadside hazard element of the scheme. Construction on all other elements is due to start at the end of January 2018.

The Community and General Purposes Committee would like to thank Reg Webb who kindly planted the winter bedding plants by the village sign and also John Hutchinson for his continued work within the village. Work to several of the trees in the churchyard and cemetery will be completed before Christmas and we are also looking for some welding work to be done

to the cemetery gate. We propose to re-new the contract with ECDC for the grass cutting which we have felt has been to a good standard this year. We have also been looking at re-locating the speed cushion which was removed from Tunbridge Lane. Various options and locations have been looked at with County Council Highways but it was agreed the best place was on Lode Road between the entrances of Bradfords Close and Arber Close. There will be a cost to reinstall and for new signposting and notification documents and we await these before we agree to go ahead.

At our meeting in December councillors looked at current income and expenditure and compared this with requirements for the next financial year. It had been agreed that employment costs would increase from £9450 to £14000. With the development of a new cemetery and other projects and extra responsibilities coming in we needed extra admin support. The current Clerk did not want to take on any more extra hours and it was agreed the best idea would be to take on a part-time admin assistant who would have the responsibility for the cemeteries. Alongside this we would need provision for an additional computer etc. Regarding the future cemetery there will be additional consultancy fees and we have allowed £20K for construction as we hope to be able to purchase the field next year. It was therefore agreed that we would increase the precept by £10K for 2018/19 to £45K which was still very low in comparison to other villages in East Cambs.

Thank you to everyone who completed the questionnaire regarding pre-school play equipment and to those people who delivered and collated them. Of 936 delivered we had 170 responses. It will take some time to go through the helpful comments that many residents provided and we will look at doing that over the next month. Thank you also to those who said they would like to get more involved. Councillor Lino Di Lorenzo has been leading the Working Party looking into pre-school play equipment and has provided a separate report in the Cresset with more details on the results of the questionnaire and the way forward.

Public Transport Matters

In a recent article in the Cambridge Magazine Andy Campbell, the managing director of Stagecoach East, mentioned that he likes to help when he realises the problems some bus times can cause and that he had been able to change the Newmarket service so that a chap, who had contacted him, could get home in time to see his baby son.

I also get contacted by people who have read my articles and I can pass comments on but not change the times! Some contacts, however, do prove helpful to me. Through a positive response about the new Cambridge North station I looked up a website and discovered there was to be an afternoon of discussion on the subject of The Future of Transport in Cambridge held by the Cambridge Network group. It was to be held at the new Post Doc centre at Eddington. By coincidence the evening before this I read a very positive article in the Bulbeck Beacon about what the writer, who works there, feels is the most far-sighted and impressive thing the University of Cambridge has done for a long time. He quotes me as the reason for his article as I wrote recently that Eddington was having very mixed reviews.

The main speaker at the talks was Professor Lord Robert Mair, who has worked on many transport tunnels. He talked positively about the geology of Cambridge and how the Cambridge gault clay is even better than the London clay. He works with the Soil Mechanics group of the Cambridge University Engineering Dept. Other speakers were from RAND Europe (Travel in Britain in 2035) and the Greater Cambridgeshire Partnership (connecting people and places) also Richard Fairchild, RDM and Nathan Wrench of Cambridge Consultants. Subjects mentioned included the Internet of Things, autonomous vehicles, APPS, areas of growth in Cambridgeshire, the Milton Keynes/Oxford corridor, the Cambridge South station, DelivAir for last mile delivery.

A leaflet found in Newmarket Library introduces East Cambs. Connect. This is a bookable, flexible, door to door mini bus service for all those living, working and visiting East Cambs., who can't access scheduled bus services to where they want to go. It is managed by Cambs. County Council under contract to ESACT and runs Monday to Friday from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. You need to book a day in advance and the booking line is available Monday to Friday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. – 01353 612699 or email totaltransport@cambriddgeshire.gov.uk. They are not able to cross the line to South Cambs. and visit the dentist.

There are to be new bus timetables in January.

People are talking about the mathematical design of the new Cambridge North station and for those in the know the senior architectural designer at Atkins, the company behind the look of the station, says it is based on rule 30. There are also mixed reactions to the tunnels suggestion due to the historic buildings in the centre of Cambridge. James Palmer, mayor of the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough combined authority, has launched a feasibility study.



Advance fares online or 10% savings on off-peak and Advance fares at a station. They also offer a saving of £396 on your annual season ticket or £38 saving on a monthly season train ticket from Cambridge to London Liverpool Street. The Dept. of Transport is urging rail companies to introduce smart ticketing such as Oyster cards and contactless debit cards by the end of next year. Chiltern Railways already has plans for this. But will it need conductors or mean the end of inspections?

Rail strikes are threatened for the Christmas period but National Express coaches work over the holiday.

Groupe Eurotunnel becomes GETLINK and that will no longer run the trains but the Eurotunnel section will. GETLink is to run Eleclink which will use a superwire connection to bring 1,000 megawatts of electricity into Britain, enough to power more than a million homes in Kent and the southeast of England. Coffee beans to power London buses with a new biofuel? Trackside solar panels to power electric trains? The future beckons!





Bottisham & District Gardening Club

Robert Brett currently Curator of the Hyde Hall Royal Horticultural Garden at Rettendon in Essex spoke about Your and My Need for Plants. He was a passionate speaker and very enthusiastic about education especially with youngsters. He was firstly a farmer, then a student at Kew where his special interest was orchids, then moved to the Cambridge Botanical Gardens in charge of the Glasshouses, had a spell with the Eden Project in Cornwall then returned to the New Sainsbury building in the Cambridge University Botanical Garden which involved both science and horticulture.

He explained that life as we know it would not exist without plants because of the Oxygen Cycle. People are less dominant than grass and we need the staple food production to keep us fed. Plant materials are used in construction and even for bamboo scaffolding in the Far Eastern Countries. Mangrove swamps prevent coastal erosion, bio fuels produced from sugar cane are now widely available. Plants are used for cosmetic, perfumes and there are good and bad drugs produced by plants. We regularly turn to the plant world for cures for many illnesses (snowdrops provide drugs for alzheimer patients. He said that plant research was vital and Kew had catalogued 33 million different plants since the millennium but it is estimated that there are another 150 million to be found.

He explained that Hyde Hall had recently received a £7.8 million grant for reinvestment of the 690acre site and encouraged us all to visit the garden in all seasons. They are currently planting out a new winter garden – will we be around to see it compete with our own local garden at Anglesey Abbey?.

Our next meeting on 23rd January is at 7.30pm in the Poppy Room at the Royal British Legion. Nigel Start will be telling us about "Self-sufficiency from your garden"

Rev. Sue Giles writes...

Invisible lines can be powerful things. Most of us have a sense of personal space and this varies from person to person. When someone crosses that invisible line we may feel uncomfortable. At a recent event I met someone whose sense of personal space was considerably different to mine. I had to resist the urge to keep taking a step back when they came to talk to me and stood within my invisible space-line.

The same is also true for date and time lines. They are not visible yet they are enormously powerful and can shape our behaviour. The turning of the year is an internationally agreed event. Its timing moves around the globe yet it is a powerful marker of change for many people.

The changing of the year allows human beings to put events behind them, sometimes with great relief, sometimes with sadness, sometimes with gratitude. It also allows them to turn to a new beginning or a fresh start.

In the ups and downs of human life this invisible marker provides an important moment of transition and change. For some it re-energises them giving them a new sense of purpose or hope. It has been another life-saving year for EAAA. The annual review is now available which précis just how much work has been done by the teams. The review details progress in clinical development as we strive to be at the forefront of medical advances, providing the best care for patients. This year included a visit from Her Majesty The Queen, accompanied by HRH The Duke of Edinburgh to the EAAA base at Cambridge Airport, and the introduction of a new Rapid Response Vehicle. This RRV complements the airborne service and is already proving to be a vital element when circumstances and/or flying conditions determine.

Anglia 1 and Anglia 2 between them flew 2,132 missions whilst the RRV attended 872. Of the total. 548 missions were to patients within Cambridgeshire. Cardiac arrests accounted for 442 missions whilst 485 were to road traffic accidents. Thanks to the timely intervention of EAAA coupled with the brilliant work of the NHS at Papworth, etc, of the 27 patients data analysed, 18 were 'sent home well' compared with the national average of I in 10! Proof of the pudding I would venture to suggest.

The 'chain of survival' comprises four key stages – Early access and recognition, Early CPR, Early defibrillation and Early advanced care – resulting in improved patient welfare. The key to the success of EAAA in helping to save lives is the provision of advanced critical care at the scene followed by rapid delivery of patients to appropriate hospitals. A highly professional charity providing the best of care to our community. Together 'we save lives'. Thank you to all who support EAAA.



The story of the New Zealand airman who is buried in the commonwealth grave in Bottisham cemetary.



PILOT OFFICER, R K A ANDREW

RNZAF No.412010, 168 Squadron RAF, Royal New Zealand Air Force. Died Thursday, 6th August 1942 Aged 25

Robert Keith Anderson Andrew was born in Wellington, New Zealand, on 18th September 1917, son of Charles Thomas and Lily Magdalene ANDREW (née ANDERSON) of Akatarawa, Wellington, New Zealand. His mother was South African by birth.

He was educated at Wellington Boy's College from 1931 to 1936. His sporting interests were Rugby, Tennis and Cricket. He was employed as a civil servant, working in the New Zealand Mines Department. He attested for the Army at Fort Dorset on 13th October 1939 and was posted to the 10th Heavy Regiment on 28th October, promoted Lance Bombardier 6th July 1940 and Bombardier 30th January 1941.

He then enlisted in the New Zealand Air Force on 24th March 1941. Flying training was at No 2, Elementary Training School, New Plymouth from September to October 1941 before moving on to No. 2 Flying Training School, Blenheim, from October 1941 to January 1942, receiving his "wings" on 29th November 1941. Commissioned as Pilot Officer on 10th January 1942.

He embarked for England on 29th January 1942, arriving No 3 Personnel Reception Centre on 13th March and posted to No 41 Operational Training Unit, Old Sarum, Salisbury on 29th April. He was at RAF Snailwell from 3rd June 1942 with No 268 Squadron on Army Co-operation work, before joining 168 Squadron on 14th June.

168 Squadron RAF was an Army Co-operation unit, formed at RAF Snailwell. They moved to RAF Bottisham from July to November 1942 and were equipped with Curtiss Tomahawk MkIIA. Flying Tomahawk AH891, c/sign OE-?, with three other aircraft, they were in practice formation to the target and carried out low level attacks on a battery of guns. During the 3rd attack P/O Andrew, following 300 feet away, was seen by two of the others to hit a tree with his port wing tip. His aircraft rolled twice and crashed into the ground on the Thetford to Watton road. He was certified dead on arrival at Thetford Cottage Hospital. Robert Andrew is buried in Bottisham Cemetery.

My name is Katie, I'm seventeen, and I live in Bottisham.

I thought people might like to read a little bit in The Cresset about an exciting challenge I have ahead of me when I leave sixth form. I have been

selected by an educational charity called Project Trust to volunteer overseas in Malawi for 12 months in a primary school teaching and social care project.

Project Trust sends around 300 school leavers overseas each year to work in projects in Africa, Asia and Latin America. The charity was set up in 1967 when they sent three volunteers to Ethiopia, and since then they have sent over 7000 young people overseas. The idea is to provide volunteers with an educational experience through living and working with people in very different communities to those they have grown up in, without taking

work away from local people. I will be living with a local family in a small community where I will learn about their culture and customs, build friendships, and hopefully contribute a little to them through my work with young people. Living conditions can be quite basic with no running water or electricity, but Malawi is a famously welcoming African country and learning about such a different way of living will certainly broaden my horizons! Unfortunately the impact of HIV/AIDS has been massive in Malawi, claiming the lives of tens of thousands every year. More than one million children are orphaned because of the disease. Project Trust has several projects in an around the cities of Blantyre and Zomaba, as well as near the famous Lake Malawi.


Of course, part of working with a charity is helping them fundraise, and I have been set the massive fundraising target of £6200. I am working shifts in a café to save up as much money as I can, and I am applying to a variety of charitable trusts. I am also organising a variety of fundraising events like cake sales and a Bingo night. On Saturday May 12th, I am going to walk 60km across the South Downs in

one day with my mum as part of an organised charity event. We aim to collect as much sponsorship as we can for Project Trust - you might see us out training after Christmas!



Thoughts of a Sports Nut

May I firstly wish all Cresset readers a healthy, happy and successful New Year. I am thinking particularly of those who are not at this moment fit enough to be following the sports, games, pastimes or work of their choice; I wish you a speedy return to action!

However, I don't think it is to be a very happy start to the year for cricket fans! At the risk of repeating myself to friends who have already heard my rantings on the topic of the England cricket team, I find myself unable to quell the urge to pontificate further about the ludicrous situation regarding Ben Stokes! At the time of writing we are 2-0 down in the Ashes Test series in Australia and we have voluntarily left the world's best all-rounder out of the squad. Whilst I am normally a big supporter of Andrew Strauss at the head of English cricket, it really beggars belief that the England hierarchy has kowtowed to political correctness and refused to play Stokes whilst a possible assault charge is still under consideration by the police.

And what is the delay all about anyway? The incident was on 25th September. How is it that three months later – with video evidence and numerous witnesses available – that a decision on whether to charge Stokes with assault cannot be made? And even if he is to be charged, what on earth has that got to do with cricket? It is patently obvious that Stokes, having been set up in the first place by the 'victims' of his actions who just happened to have someone standing by to video the incident, is now the subject of some petty moral posturing by both the judicial and the cricketing authorities, and this grotesque charade is impacting directly on England's ability to defend the Ashes. It may be that the team, riddled with weaknesses as it is (inconsistent bowling, lack of a class spinner, fragile batting order, failure to convert 50s into 100s... need I go on?) would be out-thought and out-fought by the Australians anyway, but to take them on without a player who can turn defeat into victory within a single session, is – well – capitulation!

Well, the draw for the World Cup in Russia 2018 has been completed and I'm sure most of you would agree that it could hardly have worked out better for England. OK, Belgium could prove tricky opponents, but we don't play them until the third game and – looking at the group as a whole – all we have to do is finish higher than Tunisia and Panama to progress! We cannot possibly fail to do that can we? And in fact, it almost doesn't matter whether we top our group or finish second because our likely opponents in the next round would be either Poland or Colombia... take your pick!

The only downside for the fans – as per usual – is the amount of travelling necessary to actually attend those games. This is typical of FIFA's attitude towards the poor, beleaguered supporters but we (i.e. Messrs Lewis, Pilgrim and Nut) will take the positives and enjoy the prospect of exploring Volgograd (formerly Stalingrad), Nizhny Novgorod, and Kaliningrad, plus opportunities to visit Moscow and St Petersburg in between. We plan to be careful about where we go and who we associate with (obviously) but we are playing down the dangers of hooliganism having spoken to a Russian delegation at Wembley on the day of the draw and been assured that not only has half the entire Russian World Cup budget been spent on security, but also that it is a matter of immense pride to the home nation to put on a successful and peaceful tournament. And anyway, we are extremely unlikely to meet Russia on the pitch because they wont have the ability to progress far enough to meet England in a later round. Which leaves the question: how far do you think England will progress? All I can say is that, currently, we are looking at options for staying until the quarter final...!

Moving on to Euro 2020 for a moment: UEFA has just announced that, following Belgium's inability to guarantee readiness of Brussels' new stadium on time, a total of seven matches in

Hijacked Brains!!

As I believe I have mentioned before I confess to an immense dislike of technology for technologies sake. I've always held the belief that there has to be a measurable benefit, either economically or materially, when adopting new tools, especially those purported to improve one's quality of life and work balance. If not then humans simply become subservient to machines and the role of servant and master is tipped on its head. It's therefore interesting to read that a number of the Smartphone developers and App programmers such as Justin Rosentein, Leah Peralman and Loren Brichter bitterly regret their part in what they characterise as 'stealing minds'. So much so that they have now turned rogue on employers such as Apple, Google and Facebook. This small but growing band of Silicon Valley heretics, referred to as 'refuseniks', are set to inform the world at large about the addictive and dangerous effects of the "attention economy" which they believe we are being driven ever deeper into.

Imagine if you will a scenario put forward by Rachel Botsman in 'Who Can You Trust' that involves a world where many of our daily activities are constantly monitored and evaluated: what we buy on line, where we are at any given time; who our friends are and how we interact with them; how many hours we spend playing video games; and what bills and taxes we pay (or not). Actually it's not hard to picture because most of this already happens thanks to data collecting power houses like Google, Facebook and Instagram or health tracking apps such as Fitbit. But now imagine a system where all of these behaviours are rated as either positive or negative and distilled into a single number according to rules set by say a Government. This number would create your 'Citizen Score'. Your rating would then be publicly ranked against the entire population and used to determine your eligibility for a mortgage or a job, where your children can go to school - or your worthiness to access medical services. Frightening or what!!

But this is precisely what the 'refuseniks' are afraid of – the 'big brother' world they may have inadvertently helped to create. They are vexed by the physiological effects on people who it's said touch and swipe their Smartphone devices hundreds of times a day. The refuseniks suggest this behaviour is contributing towards so called "continuous partial attention" - a syndrome that severely limits the ability to focus. A former Google employee says; "All of us are jacked into this system. All of our minds can be hijacked." Data gathering power houses appear to depict events in a way that makes for compulsive, irresistible viewing – to sensationalise, bait and entertain – just to keep us hooked in. And a growing minority of fanatics are also resorting to similar practices using emotion, outrage and anger to ignite fury with the sole purpose of changing public opinion. This all suggests that our choices are being manipulated and controlled and are not as free as we think they are. There are organisations such as Snapchat that has created its compelling Snapstreak feature, encouraging near-constant communication between its mostly teenage users. As well as monitoring our daily activities through our addictive use of Smartphones, the techniques these companies apply are

also algorithmically tailored to each person to identify their emotions purely for the purpose of keeping people 'hooked in'.

During the November Budget the ONS identified an alarming drop in productivity and was forecasting a further decline in personal output over the next few years. The 'doom mongers' have readily, and too easily in my opinion, pointed the finger at a failing economy. But what I feel should be of concern to us all is the revelation in The Guardian that the average person now touches, swipes or taps their Smartphone over two thousand times a day. And apparently eighty seven percent of people go to sleep and wake up with their Smartphone in their hands. Considering the vast majority of these people are probably working then over two thousand taps a day cannot help but distract them from their employment. How can this love affair with their Smartphone - permanently glued to the palm of their hand – NOT adversely affect their ability to focus on the job in hand? There simply has to be a correlation between Smartphone use and falling productivity...

If even a small part of the above is happening then we may well have ventured downward beyond the tip of the iceberg toward creating our own 'Citizen Score' in the abyss of a 'Big Data meets Big Brother' world. So, with the 'attention economy' gradually chipping away at our ability to control our own minds – to remember, to reason, to make decisions for ourselves, faculties that are essential to self-governance - then what hope is there for democracy itself?

Finally I have been fortunate to acquire some of Ted Norton's old musings. Not all will know of or have heard of Ted who was a fondly loved local character and a once prolific contributor to the Cresset. Reading through a note book of his I came upon the following local story:

When old Freddy was asked by the Reverend Uthwatt why he drank so much he said, "To save my soul sir". "How so" replied" the Vicar. "Well...

When I drink a lot I get drunk.


