Taking part will be contingents from the Bottisham Royal British Legion, Bottisham Scouts, Cub Scouts, Girl Guides and Beavers, primary schools together with members of the Burwell detachment of the Cambridgeshire ACF We shall also be joined on this occasion by Mrs. Penny Walkinshaw DL, Deputy Lieutenant for Cambridgeshire, the Queen's representative. Everyone is most welcome to join us for this occasion. Following the service refreshments will be available and the Crocheted Poppy installation will be on display.

THE 11TH HOUR of the 11TH DAY of the 11TH MONTH

At 11 o'clock on Sunday the 11th November the Nation will pause for the Annual TWO MINUTES SILENCE to remember the War Dead, including those from recent conflicts.

Services of remembrance will be held in each of the Anglesey group churches. The Bottisham Royal British Legion Branch will join with others at the village sign for the two minutes silence service and after to lay wreaths at Bottisham Holy Trinity Church.

The Bottisham Royal British Legion will erect a small Garden of Remembrance which will be situated by the Village Sign opposite Holy Trinity Church. Anyone who may wish to do so

On the Buses

Just had my first experience of going into Cambridge on the "new" 11.

I fear that the works on the A1303 once again demonstrate that our planners never use public transport.

Going into Cambridge the bus turns right into Albert Road beside the Missing Sock. Before the works that meant it could hold up traffic going towards Cambridge - however it also meant that traffic coming out of Cambridge, seeing any hold up would often slow down and encourage the bus to turn - now there is no hold up for cars going into Cambridge and so much less incentive for vehicles coming out of Cambridge to give way. Once again the private car gets priority over public transport whatever the "official policy" is of supporting it.

Looking at the village as it is now, the bus stops on the A1303 would make far more sense if they were at the end of Bell Road as they would then be nearer the centre of population, "especially since there is a connection between the High Street and Ox Meadow thereby cutting off a corner for people from the eastern end of Beechwood Avenue".

Two Stories With thanks to Debie Thomas, USA for the story outlines.

Once upon a time, there lived a young prince. When his father died, he assumed his divinely appointed throne, married a beautiful princess from a neighbouring kingdom, and settled down to govern his people. Soon afterwards, God appeared to him in a dream, and promised to grant the young royal whatever his heart desired.

Being a humble man, the new king refused to ask for wealth, power, or long life, and instead replied, "I am only a child. Therefore, give your servant an understanding mind to govern your people, and to discern between good and evil." God was so pleased with the king's request, he promised not only to grant it — to make the king the wisest human being in history — but to grant him every other measure of greatness as well. Untold wealth, matchless honour, and long life.

In time, the king's reputation for brilliance spread across the land. Nobles travelled from distant shores to hear his pithy sayings and witness his wise judgments. In accordance with his wisdom and God's blessing, the king's wealth and power grew beyond measure. Many people know he had a reputation for being very wise and that the Queen of Sheba came to visit him but much of the rest of his story is unknown. Even for those who may have read some of his writings in scripture and know some of his story the other part of the story is often not discussed. What is the truth? Well, as with most people, the two stories come together in one individual. We are all people of several characters. We have a good, kind and thoughtful side and we have a selfish, unkind and hurtful side. Most of us try to keep the one side buried and to make the other more

prominent, presenting it as our public face. We may decry the work of spin doctors but in a more everyday setting we often act as our own spin doctors.

One of the wonderful things about being a Christian, (and there are many) is that we have a God who knows us through and through. He knows the best of us and wants to help us develop and grow all that is good in our lives and in our personalities. He also knows the worst of us. God is the one we can never hide from. God knows every thought, every motivation and impulse. We can only be completely open and honest with him even if we try to hide things from ourselves and those around us. In our relationship with God there is no spin, no public face, no hidden corners of our hearts. God's desire is to help us change what needs changing, he forgives the mistakes that we make and the deliberate harm that we do to others and most importantly he loves us exactly as we are. God never says to any of us, change and then I'll love you. Act differently and then I will be with you. He loves us and is with us. He is beside us to help us change, pouring out his healing and grace and giving us a wealth of new beginnings. This is how we should perhaps hear the story of Solomon.

Once upon a time there lived a king. He had big dreams, as most of us do. He had great faults, as most of us do. He yearned at times for the best of things - wisdom, discernment, and a sound mind - and lusted at other times for the worst. He lived a life marked by success and failure, nobility and disgrace. He loved God and he didn't. He pleased God and he didn't. He left a legacy that was neither perfect nor wretched, as most of us will. But he was loved by God throughout - even when his foolish wisdom shattered God's heart. So are we.

Parish Notes

Emma Grima from East Cambs District Council came to our October meeting to explain how the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) worked. The CIL is a payment made by developers of £90 per square metre of development floor space. 15% of this payment is paid to the relevant Parish Council for them to spend on infrastructure improvements with the other 85% being retained by the District Council for district wide infrastructure improvements. Emma confirmed that Bottisham has so far received approximately £18,800 in payments There is a very broad remit for what Parish Councils can spend the money on and Emma confirmed we would be able to spend it on a new cemetery and playground.

The roadworks on the A1303 are largely complete now. We are concerned about the bus stop box position on the A1303 (Hilton Park end). The situation of the bus stop on the other side of the A1303 (heading to Cambridge) is more of a problem as the stop is right by the landowners access gate and the County Council cannot impose any improvements as the gate is in use. Parish Councillors are interested to see how many of the improvements shown to us at a presentation by Highways have actually been implemented as we do feel that Bottisham has lost out to the Wilbraham's as both those junctions and the one at the Missing Sock had had a lot of work done to them whereas the 2 Bottisham ones had not and there had been accidents at the Bottisham junction in the past.

The 4 new speed indicating devices (SID's) are now in place and seem to be very effective. The older speed display by the scout hut is intermittent and does not always work especially in wet weather. We have therefore decided to replace this with another one of the new SID's using remaining S.106 monies as it was felt that this slowed the traffic down near to the primary school.

Work has finally been taking place in Bell Road to put in a kerb and repair the grass verge. This area, as the entrance to the village always looked messy in the wet winter weather as rainwater from the road made the grass and path beside it muddy. With no kerb it also encouraged vans to park up on the verge worsening the situation. Hopefully this will rectify the problem and enable people to use the path without getting muddy and also improve the look of our village.

Once again can I ask that everyone check their trees and hedges are not encroaching onto the public footpath. I have had several complaints regarding this recently. Thank you for your support.

The first meeting of the Pre-school play area working group to involve residents took place recently. Several residents when filling out last years questionnaire about play areas said they would be interested in getting more involved. We hope, as a group to be able to come together and provide a play area in the village. We see this very much as a community group and not a parish council one and to this end it can only be achieved with help from the community so thank you to those that attended.

Public Transport Matters

The 'info to go' Stagecoach van duly turned up and I now have a box of timetables for the latest 29th July 2018 ones. I am again assured that no new ones are planned although the chap did mention January! Newmarket Library staff want to know why we are thus honoured as their appeals for timetables so far have only resulted in 10 in an envelope! The Stagecoach chap also redid the bus signs at the stops as they were very difficult to read before due to the dirty covering. Signage ref. it now being a 11 not 10 bus through the villages has also been put on the bus shelter. I am still in touch with Highways regarding the improvements needed to the A1303 stop by the farm gate entrance.

Local bus and train problems are often mentioned now in the Cambridge News - the accidents at the busway near Addenbrookes are a problem needing solving. The busway speed limit should be reduced it is stated. Pedestrians and cyclists are being involved in accidents. Building a new railway station at Soham could cost taxpayers more than £21.8 million. There is already £1 million of funding available. Commuters could connect to Ely and Bury St. Edmunds but not to Newmarket. Mayor James Palmer said it could be completed by 2021 with good project management and government lobbying. James Palmer still backs a Cambourne to Cambridge busway link but is meeting opposition. There is money for the scheme and some has already been spent but there are ongoing discussions for and against the transport hub and metro scheme. Could the busway be built and then linked to any new scheme – this is being asked. New housing is proposed for the Cambourne and Bourn areas and transport will be needed to avoid even more cars on already overcrowded roads. Radio Cambridgeshire reports on the traffic situation every half hour and I listen before setting off to the bus stop. As I write the buses are all very late due to an accident at the Teversham/Newmarket Road junction and the road was blocked and then partially opened after some hours. Cambridge City Council has plans to build 14,000 new houses in existing growth sites on the edge of Cambridge – the southern fringe and places like Darwin Green and Eddington and also north of Cherry Hinton and west of Teversham. They hope to avoid incursions into the green belt. Adequate infrastructure including transport must be provided.

Greater Anglia has unveiled its new trains which it is hoped will replace all existing ones by 2020. They will have carpeted carriages (good idea?!) with more seats and inbuilt USB charging sockets. They are biomode and can switch between diesel and electric power and have been built by the Swiss manufacturer Stadler. Each seat has access to a plug and USB point. The large picture windows are fitted with a mesh that should help maximise mobile phone signals. There will be space for six bicycles. A low level-floor and retractable step will make them more accessible for wheelchairs, pushchairs and luggage. They will run from Cambridge to Norwich and Peterborough as well as between Ipswich, Lowestoft, Felixstowe and Sudbury. They are having safety, reliability and performance testing abroad and in the UK. Staff are all having to undertake training. They call it progress but as someone who doesn't like being bombarded by wifi for mobile phone signals I am not so sure!

The delays at Crossrail have led to the standing down of the chairman of this £15 billion scheme. It was due to open in December linking east and west London and easing congestion on the tube network but will now not start operating until well into next year. They wasted $\pounds 16,000$ on Oyster card wallets saying 'opening December 2018. Train operators are facing big

fines over the summer fiasco of timetable failures. The rail regulator is looking into Northern Railway and Govia Thameslink which run Thameslink, Southern and Great Northern trains – have they breached their operating licences? Go Ahead chief executive referred to the problems of trying to update lines to cope with increasing numbers at the same time as running the trains as normal. Could the future of trains be Hydroflex – the country's first hydrogen train designed by Birmingham University in conjunction with Porterbrook, a privatised train leasing co. Angel, a rival train leasing company, is on the same journey working with Chiltern Railways and is aiming to convert its diesel class to a hybrid drive called Hydrive. Chris Grayling, transport secretary, is backing the projects as he wants to remove diesel trains by 2040.



Walks for Health:



FIREWORKS and bonfire night can be plenty of fun for all of the family to enjoy and going to an organised firework display instead of holding one at home can be a great and safe way of supporting your local community. However, if you plan on using fireworks or lighting a bonfire at your own home, please ensure that you consider the following safety advice:

Fireworks:

- Buy only fireworks marked BS 7114
- Light fireworks at arm's length using a taper, stand well back and never go back to a lit firework
- Never throw fireworks or put them into your pockets or clothing
- Light sparklers one at a time wearing gloves, and place used sparklers in a bucket of water
- Never give sparklers to children under five
- It is illegal to sell fireworks to someone under the age of 18 or to light fireworks in a public place
- Always consider animals and wildlife nearby when holding a firework display.

Bonfires:

- Do not light bonfires in unsuitable weather conditions, particularly when it is very windy
- Always consider the location of a bonfire or firework display, smoke drifting near or on to surrounding roads can have devastating consequences
- Build bonfires well clear of buildings, garden sheds, fences and hedges
- Do not leave bonfires unattended and keep a bucket of water or a hosepipe handy just in case
- Never use flammable liquids to start the fire
- Never burn dangerous rubbish such as aerosols, paint, foam furniture, rubber tyres, batteries, plastics, etc
- Before you light the bonfire, check that children and animals are not hiding inside and are a safe distance away.





Bottisham and District Gardening Club

Unfortunately our September speaker couldn't join us because of illness and Margaret Nimmo-Smith very kindly stepped in at short notice to replace him. Her talk was entitled 'How to grow hardy ferns in East Anglia' and included a demonstration of spore sowing and she also brought with her a variety of plants for sale. Ferns are a prehistoric plant, existing over 300 million years ago, and they reproduce not from seeds but from the tiny spores on the back of their leaves. While they prefer a shady, moist site, they will grow almost anywhere. We saw slides of the many different types of fern in their different habitats, some, like the Royal Fern, able to grow up to 2 metres in height and some tiny ferns attached to walls and steps in cities and towns. Little pots of spores at various stages of growth were passed around, some just a mossy mound, others tiny heart-shaped seedlings.

I too have a shady side to the garden so I returned from the garden centre with a Polystichum setiferum and ideas to include ferns, hostas and hellebores. It's going to be very different out there.

My favourite television gardening programme is The Beechgrove Garden and it was there that I saw Chris Beardshaw's recipe for Snail Juice which I have been meaning to try for some time. It sounds simple – just take two whole bulbs of garlic, crush them and boil in two pints of water until mushy, sieve into a jug then dilute to double the quantity. Spray your plants with this and, fingers crossed, slugs and snails leave your plants alone.





Thoughts of a Sports Nut

"And that's the end of that!" said the inimitable Peter Alliss as Phil Mickelson dunked his 16th tee shot into the water on the final afternoon of play at Le Golf National, Paris, to hand the decisive victory to Francesco Molinari, and the Ryder Cup back to Europe. The USA came to Paris with 11 of the top 17 golfers in the world rankings but, like many before them, were swept away by a European brotherhood brimming with desire and passion, epitomised by Ian "Postman" Poulter's chest-thumping victory over world no.1 Dustin Johnson and Molinari's outstanding 5-0 performance - the first perfect record by a European player. And who would have thought that both Mickelson and Tiger Woods would come up completely empty-handed? So how did Thomas Bjorn's team do it? It appears that something remarkable happens this side of the Atlantic when the Ryder Cup opportunity knocks on the door of bread-and-butter pro golfers, and I'm not just talking about the imaginative use of social media, clever though that was. Prevailing opinion is that Bjorn managed to tap into the European propensity for camaraderie and teamwork to develop a wave of emotion and commitment to each other that proved irresistible. Seemingly, no such forces come into play for the Americans, whose sporting culture revolves around franchises, advertising and hype. There is no 'glue' of the type that brought together the duo of Francesco Molinari and Tommy Fleetwood in what Bjorn called a 'bromance' - now immortalised as Moliwood! In fact, the USA's Patrick Reed - currently no.15 in the world – summed it up best by observing in the New York Times that Europe 'left their egos at the door' better than the Americans! Long may it continue.

Sorry to move from happy to sad, but another very special person passed away last month – a force of nature who should not be forgotten... "The best defensive player that this country has produced." So said Sir Bobby Robson of his protégé, Kevin Beattie, the Ipswich Town 'legend', who sadly died on 16th September at the tender age of 64. Former England captain Terry Butcher effectively replaced Beattie in the great Ipswich team of the late 70s and early 80s. "He was my hero and my inspiration... the complete footballer." Some accolade, eh!

When I was managing Bottisham Sports FC a few years ago, I used to wax lyrical to my players about the extraordinary talents of the great Kevin Beattie who, I believed, embodied everything I loved about football: power, grace, strength, speed, skill, bravery and he revelled in the sheer joy in playing. The Bottisham boys used to humour me with a smile, thinking I was exaggerating, but note what Alan Brazil (a world class player himself back in the day) had to say about his team mate: "What a player, just awesome, lightning fast, springs in his heels, a cannon of a left foot..." Indeed, from the back of the North Stand, I saw him crash a shot past stunned goalkeeper John Osborne (one of the 7-0 goals v. West Brom in 1976) and swear it would have taken my head off had the net not stopped it! (Still available on YouTube if you're interested!)

But my favourite story of Beattie comes from his film 'career'! He was Michael Caine's body double in the 1981 movie "Escape to Victory" starring, among others, Sylvester Stallone. During some down time, he challenged tough-guy Stallone to an arm wrestle. Of course, he won! Stallone got the hump and never spoke to him again... priceless! RIP "The Beat" – the best player I ever saw.

By contrast, it pains me greatly to see the current Ipswich Town side struggling at the bottom of the Championship with players and a manager who don't appear to be up to the job. I won't bore you with my agonies but let me observe that it's a salutary lesson in being careful what you wish for! The previous manager Mick McCarthy (he of a function-over-style philosophy) was hounded out of the club by supporters' vitriol, demanding a more entertaining style of play. Well, they have it now – goals galore, mainly at the wrong end! Now the calls are for club owner, media mogul Marcus Evans, to plough in more money... as if that, alone, is all it takes to guarantee success. I wonder if supporters really have the right to make such demands of an owner, given that Evans has around £100m of capital tied up in ITFC. I don't know. But football finance is a murky world and it should also be remembered that he receives c.£5m a year in interest on his loans to the club! That should keep him in champagne while Ipswich slides towards the third division!

Finally, talking of champagne, British cycling is celebrating yet again, this time with Simon Yates winning La Vuelta d'Espana after bitter disappointments in the Giro d'Italia and Tour de France where he promised so much, only to have bad days at crucial times. Now all three Grand Tours are in British hands... how the French must hate that!! Not only is that a clean sweep for the Brits in 2018, it's also the first time the three titles have been held by three different riders from the same country; and it means British riders have won the last five Grand Tours since Dutch all-rounder Tom Dumoulin clinched the Giro d'Italia in May 2017. This is no coincidence though. Adam Yates himself summed it up: "Just goes to show – you work hard and stay dedicated and good things happen." (Reminds me of Gary Player's 1960s adage: "The harder I work, the luckier I get"!) So, who are you backing for the Giro 2019... will it be Thomas, Froome or Yates? And don't forget Yates' twin brother Adam is also a top cyclist!

In the meantime, how is the FA getting on with the Wembley decision? Well, by the time you read this... a very important meting will have taken place (on 24th October) in which all the FA's stakeholders' representatives – the FA Council – will have voted to either sanction or reject the Executive's recommendation to sell Wembley to American Shahid Khan for £600m. Bearing in mind that Wembley was rebuilt in the years 2002-2007 at a cost of nearly £800m (of mostly taxpayers' money!), it's hard to see how the proposed sale price is "the best possible deal they will get" – an assertion by FA CFO Mark Burrows! Is the value of London real estate really dropping? Let's hope the "elderly white men" of the governing body see sense for once!



WHO GIVES A JOT!

Much is going on around us, internationally, nationally and parochially, that I've found it very difficult to know just where to start and in particular how to find a balance that doesn't suggest a bias one way or the other. After several attempts I've failed dismally to once again remain indifferent and wonder whether anyone gives a jot about the increasing absence of morality in humanity!

Once again there is a media driven clamour to delve into purported sexual abuse this time concerning Cristiano Ronaldo and Judge Bret Kavanaugh – the latter going way back to his High School days. Certain incidents of what modern day society now labels unwanted physical harassment and or 'abuse' were considered years ago to be part of the social order of 'growing up' and becoming 'street wise'. But now contemporary thinking is quick to accuse and to brand the accused because of its guilt ridden burden over perceived past failings. And isn't it interesting that one of the leading protagonists of #MeToo has herself now been reproached for apparent sexual misconduct! Planks, eyes and specks come to mind. After the fallout from the shameful Cliff Richard debacle isn't it best not to let paranoia set in and for us all to remain level headed and be very careful not to judge purely on melodramatic headlines. No, of course it doesn't make what allegedly happened honourable but surely a line has to be drawn beyond which we let sleeping dogs lie.

Closer to home we are all aware of the evils associated with illegal, dangerous and inconsiderate parking – we have it at the shops and at the schools. Once upon a time this problem was more or less under control and enforced by the police. Unfortunately village parking issues have now become a low priority for our Constabulary. So much so that those with no community conscience whatsoever or those who are just bone idle assume it's their basic right to park where they want. In some parts of the country this type of anti-social behaviour has been taken head on by villagers themselves by contracting with companies such as My Local Bobby to 'confront' anyone not towing the line. For a subscription of £50 a month a uniformed person wearing a 'bodycam' will point out the error. And, as with 'dashcam', footage may be submitted to the police for follow up. The trend is spreading fast and last year over 250,000 private 'Bobbies' are said to have been employed. But do we really want to become a country where basic enforcement is left to privatised vigilante groups. Perhaps Ministers and Crime Commissioners need to re think the basics of smarter 'neighbourhood policing' before it gets completely out of control.

Also in the news this week are the Head Teachers who are demanding more government cash for schools. And then you hear about Board Members of Academy Trusts getting in excess of £150K with one actually earning over £500K. So ask yourself where this money comes from, which, in a single Academy Trust, could easily top £1m. Is this then simply plain misappropriation that just piles even more pressure on financially squeezed school budgets? It's commented in one report that in excess of £21m was paid on just Trust Board


