


I am sure Paddy will keep us up to date with any changes that affect the buses, together with all the other public transport matters that she shares.

Hold on to what gives you life...

“During the bombing raids of World War II, thousands of children were orphaned and left to starve. The fortunate ones were rescued and placed in refugee camps where they received food and good care. But many of these children who had lost so much could not sleep at night. They feared waking up to find themselves once again homeless and without food. Nothing seemed to reassure them. Finally, someone hit upon the idea of giving each child a piece of bread to hold at bedtime. Holding their bread, these children could finally sleep in peace. All through the night the bread reminded them, “Today I ate and I will eat again tomorrow.”” (Linn, *Sleeping with Bread*, p.1)

This excerpt is from a book that has really impacted my life. I can imagine the sense of peace and stillness in the camp on the night the children first had the opportunity to hold onto something life-giving rather than the fear, uncertainty, pain and sadness - things that do not give life. The book centres around 2 questions:

1. For what moment today are you most grateful?
2. For what moment today are you least grateful?

I don't always immediately recognise the significance of words shared or events that occur. Sometimes it's only after taking time to reflect over my day that I'm reminded. I always thank God for the joyful moments in my day, and try to thank the people who have been involved too.

I recall time spent with refugees in the Jungle camp, Calais; in a conversation about why they risk their lives hiding in or under lorries attempting to get to England, the refugees responded, 'we are dead already, we have lost everything, we are worthless'. I find this heartbreaking. I pray that refugees around the world now and indeed anyone who feels hopeless, would have a metaphorical (or maybe a physical) chunk of bread to hold through the night, something that gives them hope, something that gives them life.

I want to be involved in conversations and actions that cause people, on reflection, to be grateful for the moments we shared that day. What can you say today? What can you do to bring joy to someone, to make peace? Think over the last day or so. For what are you most grateful? Give thanks. For what are you least grateful? It's important to recognise these moments, learn from them; move forward holding on to what gives life.

At RENEW each week we share our good news stories, and our struggles when we gather for worship. You would be made very welcome at any of our services. There's a place at RENEW for you.







A busy week in May for Parish Council with our usual monthly meeting on Tuesday 8th May and the Annual Parish Meeting on the 9th. Thank you to all those residents who attended the Annual Meeting. It was a busy and interesting meeting with lots of guest speakers. Mrs Rankine the Principal of BVC gave an insight into the new build and informed us they had been successful in their bid with Sports England to have the swimming pool retiled, something the whole village can benefit from. Also Mrs Johnston from the Primary School came and told residents a little of what the children at the school have been doing over the past year and how the primary school is now an Academy. Our new police sergeant Mark Rabel also came and updated us on crimes in Bottisham which have shown a 50% increase from 94 to 143 in total. Sgt Rabel is planning on having monthly road shows in the villages he operates in giving crime prevention advice to residents and I will let you know when the Bottisham one is taking place. He did say, after many complaints from residents regarding inconsiderate parking in the village that he will be having random days of action where a team will come and ticket anyone that is parked illegally which was welcomed by all.

Our County Councillor Mathew Shuter as the Chair of Highways and Infrastructure updated us on potholes. He reported that from January to March of this year close to 10,000 potholes had been notified by highways teams or members of the public. There were 5,500 for the whole of the previous year so you can see what a problem it has been this year and they have tried their best to solve the situation. They have 11 traditional crews and they now have 3 'dragon patchers' which is a new machine which can carry out 160 repairs a day compared to 20 by a traditional 2 man crew with a wheelbarrow. The repairs are not as robust as the traditional way though but are good for a quick repair. Highways are running an experiment on a new type of patching technique more in line with what utilities companies use when they dig up the roads where they seal the sides which gives a better finish. This way is more expensive but is more cost effective as it lasts longer. They are also looking at the possibility of plastic roads and are working with Peterborough on this. There is a company in Dumfries using un-recyclable plastic that would normally go into landfill as part of the aggregate. If they decide to go ahead with this they have the company's assurance that they would use plastic waste from East Cambs.

The improvements on the A1303 look to be further delayed as at the time of writing they should have started. County Councillor Shuter updated residents at the Annual Meeting on the improvements to expect. The County Council were able to apply to the government for a grant as the A1303 had been identified as one of the 50 most dangerous roads in the country. They were awarded £1.3M to provide safer features on the road which was video surveyed from the Quy roundabout to A14 slip road on the bridge. Improvements will include larger visibility splays, deceleration zones, improved lighting, new bus stop, rumble strips, the road being widened in certain areas and re-surfacing of the road at the Quy roundabout. Some trees will be removed but for every tree that is removed two will be replaced in a safer position.

There is a big purge on fly tipping at the moment by East Cambs District Council who have been travelling round East Cambs removing all fly tipping. They ask that if residents see fly tipping they report it online.

Parish Council have applied to use Section 106 money towards 4 new speed indicating devices similar to the one in Bell Road which flashes red and green. We had looked at using



portable devices that could be moved to other locations but agreed that this was too reliant on people volunteering to move them and re-charge them.

The static units would be placed on existing lamp posts in the following locations which are close to both the Primary School and the Village College.

Public Transport Matters

Well there is only one topic of conversation at the bus stops at the moment – what a mess Stagecoach has got itself into with all the changes to times, the removal of the 11 during the day and the increase in fares. As I wrote last month I was expecting a delivery of a box of timetables and it is the same situation today. I rang Stagecoach 2 days ago, as e-mails seemed to have had no results, and heard that the new timetables had indeed just been delivered and that I would receive some during the coming week when deliveries had been organised. As the buses changed on April the 15th and today is May the 13th we have been a month without the paper timetables on which many people rely. The drivers are fed up as they get hassled by passengers and they don't know what is happening either! I surmise that due to the increase in fares the timetables had to be reprinted – what is all this costing? They tell me that the cuts to the 11 are due to the low passenger numbers but people are now back in their cars and using the park and ride and even driving direct to Bury. I can only repeat what I have long said – use it or lose it – and we don't want it to get even worse!

On April 10th it was confirmed that the free bus passes for older and disabled people would be protected for the future keeping them connected with their local towns and cities. It will not now need to be renewed every five years. The Buses Minister Nusrat Ghani stressed the importance of people being able to keep their independence and play a role in their local community. In addition to the bus pass scheme the government provides £250 million every year for bus services in England, £40 million of which helps to fund routes that may not be commercially viable but which are considered socially necessary. This has been welcomed by Age UK as also benefitting people's health.

Stagecoach has increased its fares by between 20 and 50p but frozen the megarider day plus and reduced the termrider student ticket from £288 to £250 per term from September. The park and ride fares are frozen at £3 and the council has removed the £1 parking charge.

It is thought that the Liberal Democrats' win in the South Cambridgeshire local elections was due in a large part to their wish that the Cambridge to Cambourne busway idea should be scrapped. It is felt that the Mayor James Palmer is still keen to build a metro or busway and there are worries about its effect on the local villages. There are calls for a new 'people's bus service' that could rival other operators and improve the public transport in the city. I used to find the free circular bus which the City council ran round the city very useful and was disappointed when it was stopped. There should be more competition and cover routes which are underserved – should companies like Astra Zeneca contribute to the cost of public transport in the city? The mayor is holding a bus review. There is also a review of the traffic lights system across Cambridge employing new technology prioritising public transport. They also want to introduce electric and lower emission buses on to the streets to improve air quality. This is all as part of the Greater Cambridge Partnership.

There is much interest in the improvements of rail journeys at the moment and the new bigger, better London Bridge station has just been opened by Prince William. It will carry 54 million passengers through the Thameslink programme. There are new direct services from

and to Cambridge and the link to Brighton running through the centre of the capital. There will be brand new Class 700 trains – more modern and spacious with fully accessible toilets by the end of 2019. Luton and Bedford will also have some benefits.

Rail passenger fares have also risen and people are complaining about the problems of getting the correct and most beneficial fares. It is suggested in a letter that like Uber there could be a charge per mile with four different rates – for first and second class and peak rate and off-peak rate. People buy split tickets but that may be stopped. Not just our local buses but some train services are axed and then people find they have already bought tickets for them! It should be that they are published 12 weeks in advance but now it is only 6. Compliance with EU regulations could cause problems for voluntary organisations providing transport to older and disadvantaged people as they would become subject to the same regulatory regime as commercial bus companies. Rail companies have paid out record amounts of compensation for delays in the last year and one commuter successfully sued Greater Anglia.

Bottisham & District Gardening Club

Our April speaker was Dr Jane Sills, talking about the renovation and restoration of The Walled Gardens of Ramsey Abbey. Originally part of the grounds of a very famous Benedictine Abbey founded in AD69, the walled kitchen garden was discovered by chance 20 years ago and the one-acre site has now been almost fully restored by a small but enthusiastic team of volunteers. Their aim is to grow as many Cambridgeshire varieties of fruit, vegetables and flowers as possible. Additions over recent years include an apple tunnel running the complete length of the garden, a large area devoted to soft fruit, and a herb garden.

Used as a market garden in the 1950s, it sadly fell into decline, the glasshouses were taken down and the garden became completely overgrown with brambles, shrubs etc. until it was rediscovered by a member of the Cambridgeshire Garden Trust. A new trust, the Ramsey Abbey Walled Kitchen Garden Trust, was formed in 2004 for the purpose of completely renovating the kitchen garden. With a total of only 15 volunteers, they cut back, removed and re-laid out the gardens. The Garden Trust member who rediscovered the garden was John Drake, a good friend to Bottisham Gardening Club and owner of the national aquilegia collection at his house on the High Ditch Road at Fen Ditton. Sadly John died in 2012 but he left a generous donation to fund rebuilding the old greenhouse and the kitchen gardens. His legacy has resulted in a 25 metre long greenhouse and display area and the now fully planted gardens. The kitchen garden is open to the public from April to October, with free admission.

Volunteers are hard at work in Bottisham too, preparing for the WI Centenary Fayre to be held in the Primary School grounds on 9 June. The gardening club will be running their annual plant stall there and we have more plants than ever this year - lots of perennials (including salvias, hostas, day lilies etc.), and plenty of bedding plants. Donations of your spare plants would be gratefully accepted, if you have any please bring them along on the day. We are also hoping to set up a plant crèche behind the stall so that you don't have to carry your purchases around the Fayre.

You will also soon be seeing copies of the schedule for the Annual Village Show which will be held on Saturday 8 September. It will appear in the July issue of *The Cresset*, which is delivered at the end of June, and will include an entry form. A more colourful version will also be available in village stores and the library.



Our crews, aboard Anglia 1 and Anglia 2, fly dozens of life-saving missions every week, so there are many stories to tell. One such concerns 'David' who, whilst out cycling with his son, collapsed and fell off. His son immediately rang 999. Within minutes, a passing first responder put David into the recovery position but, he very soon went into cardiac arrest. A second person also stopped and together they began CPR. The ambulance crew arrived within 10 minutes, followed shortly by EAAA with Critical Care Paramedic Luke and Doctor Peter. The team worked seamlessly together to stabilise David's condition before flying him to Norfolk and Norwich Hospital to continue his treatment. David's case highlights the importance, in the chain of survival, of early bystander CPR. It all came together on that day saving David's life. David visited the Cambridge base in December, meeting his Paramedic and piecing together the chain of events for which he is so thankful.

The EAAA after Care Team keep in touch with patients, as an ongoing and important part of their recovery. It is also good for the crews to see what a difference their missions and actions can make. Around 45% of all missions are funded from the proceeds of our Lottery - why not join today?

Would you jump into a river, lake or any other open waterway on a hot sunny day? Think Twice.

Do you know what hazards lie beneath the water? Or how cold the water is? Does anybody know where you are?

Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service is delivering Water Safety education to every school in Cambridgeshire as part of its #RememberRony campaign, launched following the tragic death of a Cambridgeshire teenager.

But there is only so much that we can do and we're calling on parents, carers and peers to talk to each other and to children about water safety. Some things to remember:

- You do not know what hazards lie beneath the surface of rivers, lakes, canals, etc
- Strong undercurrents can be tough to overcome, even if you are a strong swimmer
- Cambridgeshire's waterways are cold - even on the hottest days of the year - and this has a dramatic effect on your body's ability to swim and get yourself out of trouble, should you become stuck or in trouble
- If you are using waterways do ensure that they are approved for you to use and that people know where you are at all times
- If someone is in trouble, call 999 immediately. Do not hesitate to call the emergency services and give clear details of your location
- NEVER go into the water to attempt a rescue - use a lead, a branch or anything to hand but otherwise await assistance.

Despite it being summer please do not forget to continue testing those smoke alarms - smoke kills !

Centenary Birthday month for Bottisham WI started in style at the Newmarket Golf Club when members, husbands and friends celebrated with an excellent lunch on the actual birthday date. Sally Kingman Chairman of the Cambridge Federation raised the toast to our institute - the first formed in Cambridgeshire. Whilst 30 Institutes started that year only 3 have met continuously - 100 years 12 meetings a year - even during the war and we were the first. Lode were a few months after us.

Our meeting 2 days later was special too. We remembered 1918 and all wore hats, took part in a flower arranging competition (won by Jean Tierney), some dressed in Georgian dresses and enjoyed refreshments (wine and a cake in 2018) and had a motto chosen for members to abide by. "If you can't say a good word about somebody don't say anything at all."

One of our members Maggie Harrop took us back in true Dr Who Time Lord fashion to Monday 15th April 1918. It was wash day she had no servant and she was up at 5.00am to collect pails of water for boiling, there was no soap so she used a mixture of ash and lime, no starch so she made her own by straining water from the potatoes. She had developed muscles she never knew she had. She was very despondent, her husband was fighting the war in Kut in Mesopotamia, she worried for her 17year old daughter - would there be any young men left to marry her but mainly she was concerned as to when the war would end. When she hanged the washing she realised how there were more darns than sheets. No new ones were available and she had had to learn how to do without so many things. She gave herself a mental shake and decided to walk to the shops and try to buy lace to brighten up her daughters well - worn drawers.

On the way she met Mrs Clark and Mrs White who asked why she was so glum. They asked her to come to the meeting that night suggested by Mrs Jenyns from Bottisham Hall to try and form a Women's Institute. She balked at going to the Hall and was relieved that it was to be in the school hall. She went along with 50 others (coincidentally our present membership is 51 members) and the rest is history. She found help and support and made many new friends.

By the way her husband returned from the war a broken man only half his previous weight and only half his mind after the massacre at Kut.

Flowers were presented to Jenn White who has been an officer for the last 33 years and to Carol Bangs who joined the WI in 1983 our longest serving member.

Our next meeting will be on 19th June when Sylvie Short will be speaking about Two Churches together - a history of Swaffham Prior.

Visitors are most welcome to come to the meeting at Queens Court which starts at 7.30

Don't forget to come to the Special Community WI Centenary Fete we have planned for 9th June at Bottisham Primary School.



Thoughts of a Sports Nut

The encroachment on my turf by Jolley Old Tony in last month's Cresset, I can assure you readers, did not go unnoticed! The trouble is, I happen to agree with his sentiments regarding the damage inflicted on the skills of 'proper' (Test) cricketers by the short versions of the game. It remains to be seen whether the proposed 100-ball inter-city cricket will take off and, although some professionals such as Stuart Broad are said to be welcoming the new approach, there are serious concerns as to whether the ECB can protect established County Cricket sufficiently to preserve – even improve(?) – the performances of the England Test team. Whilst I understand the commercial imperatives of limited overs cricket, and the need to bring spectators, TV and filthy lucre into the game, surely, five day cricket remains the ultimate test in the sport? A wise friend of mine observed to me recently that “If test cricket is Bridge, T20 is Snap!” Exactly! So perhaps I can return the ‘favour’ to Mr Jolley by indulging in some encroachment of my own, on the fringes of local political debate! A little bird told me that, at the Parish Council meeting, a degree of exasperation was expressed about cyclists continuing to use roads despite the (expensive) provision of cycle paths; and I believe that some are bewildered, if not irritated, by cyclists not using cycle paths. Firstly, may I say that there are many different types of cycles and cyclists. A commuter on a robust bike with heavily treaded tyres is a lot more adaptable to changes of surface than the Middle Aged Men In Lycra who ride lighter bikes on skinny tyres at higher speed. But, from personal experience, I'll offer ten good reasons why some cyclists prefer the road (despite the appalling pothole situation):

- cycles are vehicles perfectly entitled to use roads
- random start/finish of cycle paths and lanes, forcing you onto roads anyway
- enforced stops at side roads
- cycle paths on only one side of a road force cyclists travelling in opposite direction to cross oncoming traffic
- poor state of repair of many cycle paths
- excessive amounts of debris
- proximity of thorn-shedding bushes/hedgerows, especially when cut (e.g. Bottisham to Quy!)
- limited space for overtaking slower cyclists on narrow cycle tracks
- danger to pedestrians (and cyclists) when track doubles up as footpath
- cycle paths are not designed to cater for road bikes which are built for road speeds

I am not going to enter the debate about whether cycle path funding could be put to better use in support of other services, as I could agree and disagree with both sides of the argument! I just hope my comments help to bring a little perspective to the behaviours in question... We have a long way to go before we can match Holland for road/cycle safety!

As indicated last month, I was privileged to be able to meet England football manager Gareth Southgate recently, at a forum for supporters traveling to Russia for the World Cup, and I found him an impressive and knowledgeable man. He spoke with considerable passion about his plans for England and his ideas for developing ‘his’ style of play, and he was refreshingly honest about his “over cautious” approach to the matches that ensured England's qualification for the WC finals. He wants to build on that solid start now and give those who can deliver his vision of how the game should be played an opportunity regardless of age and experience. And, if you look at the way the England Youths are playing at the moment in the Under 17 European



'We want authenticity'

I was rather taken a back the other morning by something the chair of trustees of the charity 'Act for Change' said. It was on the BBC Radio 4 'Today' programme where she applauded 'Twitter' for forcing Sierra Bogess out of the role of Maria in the forthcoming Proms performance of West Side Story. Why? Well as one 'Act for Change' supporter tweeted; "You are a Caucasian woman and this character is Puerto Rican. Stop taking roles from actors of colour." Ayesha Casely-Hayford then declared; "... it shows that we want more diversity on our stages, and not only that, we want authenticity." She went further by accusing the producers of the West Side Story production of 'whitewashing'. And then when questioned about non Caucasian actors and actresses performing typically white European roles, for example in the BBC's production of 'Troy', she implied this was OK because we should celebrate and encourage diversity!!

What a sinister, incoherent phenomenon then this belief in conspiracy theories is. Until I heard Casely-Hayford speak I had not fully grasped the haughtiness of the "whitewashing" mind-set. Furthermore, the extent to which this arrogance and that of 'no-platforming' has become such a driving force in our universities and modern-day media. When this topic was recently covered in one of the 'broadsheets' (Guardian?) the position advocated was that this same mind-set rebukes any one dressed up as someone from another culture and or as someone not of their own ethnicity - referring to this as 'cultural appropriation'. It seems that those who hold these convictions consider themselves cerebrally superior; believing that any criticism of their favourite cause is biased and that the sheep-like masses who disagree with them are either corrupt or brainwashed. They try to appear noble in action even to the extent where their actions tend to be self-defeating and destructive of the judicious social order around them.

My twelve years working with pupils in secondary education taught me to be very wary of the pernicious influence social media has on minds both young and not so young. I believe recent events involving Facebook et al clearly vindicate my mistrust and I make no apologies for continually haranguing unaccountable 'Web' based media platforms. A mistrust that Michael Deacon, writing in the Telegraph, also shares when he writes of how; "furious fantasies" can attract a following of uninformed millions." But of course the freedoms of expression must be defended and in a free society people should be at liberty to act upon their cherished values – but only as long as they don't prohibit others from doing likewise. Nonetheless there are surely ethical limits to the right to protest. Dissent can be defiant or disruptive but its aim should be to raise awareness, change policy or challenge institutions – not to intimidate moral beliefs and certainly not to persecute individuals.

Sierra Bogess has undergone tremendous media pressure stirred up by 'Act for Change' to quit the role which she has now done in a selfless and gracious manner saying; "I had signed on to lend my voice to honour Leonard Bernstein in his centennial year, with an orchestra I have loved singing with for years, following in the long list of (both Caucasian and 'of colour') sopranos who have all sung the score before me." Because she has been 'bullied' out of the role there will be many concert goers bitterly disappointed that the very talented Bogess will not be performing.
