Rightful concern about cyclists on the road not using the cycleways from Robert, and the PC reporting on their involvement in maintaining the hedges and cycleways including using flails to cut the hedges. Well, there lies the rub!

Cyclists often avoid and don't like using the footpaths because of the high risk of punctures from hedge flailed thorns. If hedges are to be flailed, that MUST be followed by clearance/ blowing the debris well back into the undergrowth. If that was done and seen to be done, cyclists would have more confidence in using the cycle routes. It is all very well spending millions in developing fancy cycleways, but lack of thoughtful maintenance makes it worthless. It is like buying a Roll Royce, then saying you can't afford the petrol! It becomes a waste of money.

Lot's more to read in this month's magazine with an update on the neighbourhood plan which links into what is reported in the DC report. Vital for the future of this village.

Finally, this month's cover picture comes courtesy of Toby Limmer, and should be of note, because it is a view (and a beautiful sunrise one at that), which is soon to disappear when the retirement 'village' that has been foisted on us by developers and remote landowners will start to be built. 

Parish Council Report

The next full council meeting will be held by on 2nd September 2024, 7.30pm at the **Poppy Room, Bottisham Sports and Social Club.** All Parish Council meetings are open to the public. Please note that the clerk to the council does not keep regular office hours. Replies to emails and phone calls will be attended to as soon as is practicable. Details of upcoming meetings and Councillor Details are available from the Parish Council Noticeboard and from the website bottisham-pc.gov.uk.

TREE WORKS

Following on from the July edition, the Parish Council have now accepted and approved a quotation to carry out the works on the trees in the Cemetery. Some of the trees have a Tree Protection Order on them and will require a permit to be issued by East Cambs District Council. As soon as the permits have been received works will commence. Following closure of the churchyard in 1899, the Parish Council assumed responsibility for its maintenance and we have also requested a quotation for remedial work on some of the limes there. Moving forward the Parish Council will be carrying out regular audits on all trees that they are responsible for and preparing tree management plans to ensure that the health of the trees is preserved whilst not causing a public hindrance.

GREENWAY

The Parish Council have not received any further information as of yet with regard to the planned Bottisham Greenway. As a significant period of time has elapsed with no communication from the Greater Cambridgeshire Partnership, I will chase the project team to see if there are any updates so that we may update the community.

DEFIBRILLATOR

As previously mentioned, the developer of the new homes off Bell Road is kindly donating a defibrillator for community use. Councillors have been busy identifying an area that would be of the most benefit for its placement. Negotiations have been held with the shop/homeowners around the triangle. Very kindly the Pharmacy have given the Parish Council permission to site the unit where the current community noticeboard is located. This is a location that will be easy to identify for both residents and those transient through the village.

VILLAGE MAP & COMMUNITY NOTICEBOARD

We need to remove the existing community noticeboard, as it is very tired and is no longer fit for purpose. It has therefore been discussed that a new noticeboard for community use will be purchased to match the Parish Council noticeboard and sited on the triangle. Posting in this board is to be confirmed later, as the Parish Council need to agree the access arrangements. It was also discussed that the current village map is now out of date as it doesn't not include some of the more recent developments. Moreover, the casing of the map is in a vulnerable state and requires work. The Parish Council appreciate all the hard work that was involved with the preparation of this map and wish to call for volunteers to come

HEDGES & FOOTPATHS

It is that time of year when hedges and footpaths get overgrown. Highways maintenance has been delayed, as a result of the absence of our local Highways Officer due to illness. However, we are grateful that we now have a replacement who is working hard to catch up on outstanding matters.

But we can all play our part and we are grateful to a resident from Lode especially, who has been working hard to bring the hedges along the Lode Rd cycle path under some control. Following communications between the Parish Council and Anglesey Abbey (who are responsible for some of it), we are hoping to see the Lode Rd hedging cut back further with a flail in September. This will improve safety by encouraging pupils and residents to use the cycle path, rather than the road.

District Councillors' Report

The Full Council meeting took place on Thursday 25 July. Unfortunately, due to a fatality on the rail line, Charlotte was unable to travel to the meeting from London.

Corporate Plan action plan

John joined the rest of our political group on the Council in abstaining on the Administration's proposed Corporate Plan action plan. There were some elements we supported, such as the work on inclusive play, which we had initiated. But some elements did not go far enough, some were unevidenced, and some such as the Mepal crematorium we continue to oppose.

- The Plan said the Council would be 'engaging' with the Combined Authority's ongoing bus reform work'—just days after the Leader of the Council had abstained on it at a Combined Authority Board meeting.
- And the 'Road Safety Volunteer Scheme' that Conservative Councillors have pressed the police into taking on was mooted in the autumn of 2021 and three years later there is nothing to show for it.
- A few priorities were identified, but had no actions associated with them.

It was not clear what the Action Plan would do to address the challenges the report identified such as the cost of living, and recruitment and retention of staff. Meanwhile it complained about priority and capacity concerns at the Combined Authority, but not those at East Cambridgeshire District Council for which it is directly responsible.

Neighbourhood Plans

Council 'made' the two Neighbourhood Plans for Mepal and Sutton, so they now form part of ECDC's Planning Policies.

Neighbourhood Plans play a vital role in the planning process. They are not just a means to forestall inappropriate development. They give an opportunity for local people to consider and discuss what makes their community work, what is needed to meet the challenges of the future, what most needs protecting and enhancing, and where appropriate development can provide the right sort of housing and amenities for current and future residents.

Changes to national planning policy framework

The Government has launched a consultation on plans to amend the National Planning Policy Framework and other planning reforms (link below).

Many of the changes will primarily affect District Councils as local planning authorities in their local plan and development management functions.

Some of the main changes proposed are as follows.

- 1. The new method will include a stronger affordability ratio driver and the removal of the clause about previous oversupply in an area to give a combined national target of 370,000 new dwellings per year.
- 2. The need for Councils, Housing Associations and other providers to deliver genuinely affordable homes—changes will be delivered through increased Government investment, changes to borrowing rules and rent stability.

This will have obvious implications for East Cambridgeshire, whose Local Plan is now nine years old, and where the building of affordable homes has been below what is needed for many years. (4,548 dwellings have been completed in the last twelve years, of which fewer than 18% have been affordable.)

Bus Franchising Consultation

The CPCA will be engaged in a consultation on bus franchising which may provide the County with an opportunity for a strategic bus policy, and to provide new routes.

District Council Surgeries

Charlotte Cane MP writes, August 2024

Thank you for electing me as your Member of Parliament – it is an amazing honour to represent the constituency of Ely and East Cambridgeshire. I look forward to working with you and to representing our beautiful area at Westminster.

As I write this, I have been your MP for one week, and it's been busy! My first meeting was on Friday afternoon, about 10 hours after my election was announced. After a busy weekend, I packed my bags and headed to London on Sunday evening.

Monday morning, I headed to my first in-person meeting and in the afternoon I entered Parliament and was given my pass and met my 'buddy'. Each new MP (there are about 330 of us) has a member of staff assigned to us who showed us round and has been on-hand since to answer questions.

My buddy showed me the Members' cloakroom, where we really do have a pink ribbon with which to hang our swords, as well as a coat hanger for more prosaic attire! We then went to get my IT equipment and have various briefings on finances, security, standards etc. She showed me around parliament, but I still get lost all the time and am grateful to the staff who set me back in the right direction. Even the floor levels are confusing – Parliament has a ground floor, a principal floor and then first and second floors.

Tuesday was largely training sessions, with some time to use the hot desking to start reading and answering emails. We were told it will be a month or two yet before we get an office, meanwhile we have a locker and hot desk space.

On Wednesday, we had our first session in the Chamber – to elect the Speaker. A great deal of pomp and ceremony, but also a chance for all the Party leaders to make short speeches to congratulate the Speaker. Then they started swearing in the MPs, starting with the cabinet moving through long-standing MPs until eventually reaching the new MPs. I took my oath on Thursday afternoon. That was when it finally sunk in as I introduced myself as Charlotte Cane representing Ely and East Cambridgeshire and felt the weight of responsibility. I will do my best to represent you all.

Parliament didn't sit on Friday, so I made my way home to Reach. I recorded a television discussion and then had a zoom meeting about Sunnica Solar Farm, only to find out about an hour later that planning permission had been given by the Secretary of State.

On Saturday I was able to get to the Ely Farmers' Market, for my bread, cheese, samosas, cherries and strawberries. Then I went to the World Pea shooting Championships in Witcham. I am certainly not competition standard, but I did at least manage to hit the practice target a few times.

Over the next few weeks I need to learn my way around and recruit a team of staff so that I can properly respond to all your queries and concerns. But I do, at least have an email address so you can contact me – charlotte.cane.mp@parliament.uk

A Neighbourhood Plan for Bottisham

Dear Resident,

August 2024

We last updated you with progress on the Bottisham Neighbourhood Plan (NP) in the July edition of The Cresset. These updates are also available on the Bottisham Parish Council Website. Due to the summer months marginal progress has been made and this has been primarily concentrated on gathering evidence to support the aspirations you gave in the 2023 Survey project. The structure of the plan and its contents will be discussed by the Bottisham Working Group (BWG) at its meeting planned for the middle of September, when we also hope to be able to set a date for residents to view and to comment on the plan so far.

The survey was delivered to 1000 Bottisham households from which 168 responses were received – this equates to a 17% response rate. 160 responses were from the 40 plus age group. 73 responses were submitted online and 95 responses were submitted on the form provided with the survey.

The most frequent concern expressed by residents in the survey is that Bottisham could not withstand more housing. Other less prominent but important concerns were that; there was too much traffic, poor infrastructure/transport, few community activities for young people, not enough affordable housing, limited employment opportunities, poor local services, size/growth of education provision, too remote. Another frequently listed concern is the view that local infrastructure is not able to absorb a larger population.

The survey results and previous consultations have been collated and built in to a Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats table – otherwise known as a SWOT analysis. These results are being used to steer and guide the objectives and policies of the NP. As mentioned, the NP will be available to view and for comments later on in the process, and the SWOT can be accessed via the Bottisham Parish Council Website.

It is essential that the NP exercises every effort to ensure the themes listed in the SWOT are taken into account. But in so doing the NP must also be pragmatic and strategize to meet a potential need for additional housing with suitable amounts and types of mixed housing. Residents also tell us that they would like to protect and preserve the topography of the countryside around us, and that they value the tranquillity this characteristic brings - but, above all, that they wish to have a much greater say on the future development of their local area. The BWG is also working on the theme that our protected areas and local green spaces should be kept entirely free from all forms of development. Whilst the plan cannot address all of the individual issues identified in the SWOT directly, they are nevertheless recognised.

Given the demands that will inevitably be placed upon the village by central government and by the Local Planning Authority (LPA) for additional housing, we believe we have struck an equitable balance that will have minimal effect on our quality of life and on the historic village settlement - whilst also offering sufficient scope to absorb probable housing growth over the decades to come.

Growth over Paths in Bottisham and Lode

There has been a lot of rapid growth of vegetation over public pavements and footpaths this year. Unfortunately, this is not slashed away by passing lorries as it is on roads. Vegetation growing beyond property boundaries should be cut back by home occupiers to allow free and safe passage for pedestrians, especially those with disabled mobility scooters or impaired sight or movement.

Vegetation overhanging the shared-use path between Lode and Bottisham has been cut back beside the sections of land owned by the National Trust. The path is now easily usable all the way and is much used by students to reach the bike racks at the southern end of the College. These hedges used to be lower and cut further back and hopefully will again be in the future.

It is a pity that only a minority of adults cycle on this path. If on the road and two or more motor vehicles are passing in both directions they are at significant risk. Having to slow down to alert pedestrians seems to be of more concern to them than the risk of serious injury. Recently seen were cyclists towing small children in carriers on the 60mph section of road. The Highway Code states that cycle paths should be used when it is safer to do so. It is hard to see how it could be safer to cycle on a 60mph road only 6 metres wide. The safely of car occupants should also be considered.

National Cycle Route 51 runs on the pavement along the western side of Bell Road from near the Quy border on Newmarket Road. It stops just before The Bell but recent pavement resurfacing has covered the End marking. It resumes on the pavement on the eastern side of Tunbridge Lane opposite The Triangle and heads along Park End. The part south of St Peters Field has been badly overgrown so has been reported to the County Council, who have contacted the landowner.

Growth out of the surface of public footpaths should be controlled by the County Council. Several paths with tall grass and nettles were reported to it in early June but were not cut until early August, following emails to and from the local Footpaths Officer. Two other paths were obstructed by crops. All public footpaths in the two parishes are shown in purple on the County Council's online 'Report a Highways Fault' map and one can mark the exact location and describe the problem.



Bottisham Bird Brain

During the hot weather of recent weeks, I hope people have noticed plenty of Buzzard activity in the skies over our local countryside: soaring, hunting, bickering with Corvids or Kestrels, demonstrating the skills of survival to their young, and generally making the most of the warm air currents which afford them maximum lift for minimum effort.

We have not always enjoyed the privilege of having these magnificent birds in East Anglia, though. Shortly after moving to this area in the early 90s, I remember being unfeasibly excited to see a Buzzard soaring above the trees along the A1303 towards Newmarket! Previously, one had to travel to the more remote areas of the UK to enjoy such sights, for example the moorlands of Wales, the South West, or the North. But, like most opportunistic predators and scavengers, Buzzards have successfully proliferated into more populated areas over the past 30-40 years, and now the plaintive 'mew' or 'pee-ooo' call of the adults can be heard from almost any garden, any day, in and around Bottisham & Lode.

The Common Buzzard - Buteo Buteo – is found throughout Europe and numbers up to 80,000 pairs in the UK, having quadrupled its population since the 1970s when years of persecution by gamekeepers, coupled with myxomatosis ruining the rabbit population, had reduced Buzzard numbers to their lowest ebb. In fact, they are only absent nowadays from the conurbations and the high peaks. Despite being majestic flyers, Buzzards are not agile enough to catch prey on the wing, but they will take a wide variety of prey on the ground, ranging from rabbits, voles and mice to worms and even large insects if other food is scarce. But, understandably, they do very well from road-kill too, although they are competing with many others – including Corvids and other birds of prey – for these particular delicacies!

Buzzards favour areas where forest or woodland meets moorland or farmland. They mate for life and build bulky nests of twigs lined with broad-leaved foliage, usually near the trunk or main crutch of a tree, and they may repair and re-use a nest many times throughout their lives, rearing two or three young per year. It is not uncommon, though, for the youngest hatchling to starve to death at the hands of its stronger sibling(s), such is the uncompromising circle of life. Fledging typically happens around six weeks after hatching, by which time the young birds can feed themselves, but they will remain in the locality, even forming social groups, for up to a year before the adults will regard their presence as an impediment to raising a new family!

So, how do you identify a Common Buzzard? The first thing to understand is that there are actually three species of Buzzard seen regularly in the UK, but the good news is that, in this area, you can almost completely discount the Honey Buzzard - Pernis apivorus - (rare, secretive and only seen at protected sites) and the Rough-Legged Buzzard - Buteo lagopus - (very rare winter visitor only). The general plumage of the Common is brown, mostly dark on the back and wings but can become paler with wear, and whitish feathers are visible on the underside of the body and wings. If you get a close look, you'll see yellow lower legs and feet, and a partially yellow bill, but often you'll need to identify a Buzzard by its shape.

Buteo buteo can vary in size but is always larger and heavier than any Crow or Rook, and the habit of gliding & soaring with its wings in a shallow 'v' shape will distinguish it reliably

from the Corvids. The wings are broad and rounded and the neck and wedge-shaped tail are relatively short. Level flight is a slightly laboured affair, but it won't be long before the bird returns to gliding or soaring or, very occasionally, hovering like an overgrown Kestrel (which hovers habitually in a more winnowing, less flappy, style). In spring and early summer you may also be lucky enough to see the courtship display known as sky-dancing, which can feature high circling, tumbling, upward sweeps, dramatic folded-winged dives, and some exaggerated wing flapping designed to show off their patterned plumage.

There are two other birds of prey prevalent in this area which need to be discounted when identifying Buzzards. The Marsh Harrier, which breeds on the fen, has a slimmer frame, longer wings and tail and will soar less, generally flying much lower to the ground; and the (now ubiquitous) Red Kite has relatively longer wings than a Buzzard, with a more obvious 'elbow' and a very pronounced forked tail. (I'll produce a separate piece on Red Kites in due course.)

Oddly, there is a paradox about what the Buzzard represents in literature and culture. On the one hand, the Buzzard can be a harbinger of doom and destruction, and on the other, a symbol of transformation and rebirth. Both views have their origins in the fact that this is a bird of prey and its nature is to kill. But its nature is also to clean up decay and create opportunities for the nourishment of new life. Beware, however, in America the term 'buzzard' can refer, colloquially, to a vulture, particularly the enormous Turkey Vulture which has a more obvious association with death and impending doom. I am guessing that Ravi Shankar's description of "hissing, hopping, tearing, gorging" in his poem "Buzzards" refers to vultures rather than the birds we know. Personally, I think we can regard our UK Buzzards wholly positively, representing survival, adaptability, loyalty and, of course, mastery of the skies!
