



News from Bottisham Medical Practice Patients' Participation Group

COVID VACCINATIONS: These are proceeding well, due to the hard work of the staff, who still have their usual patient care duties to do, and the volunteer marshals. We owe them all our thanks. It has been a major effort to organise finding and equipping suitable premises and getting the supply of the vaccines. GP practices are grouped into Primary Care Networks, with Bottisham being in the Cambridge North City along with another five practices including the East Barnwell Health Centre, hence using it as a vaccination site. Whether having had the vaccine or not we are still advised to follow government guidelines and remember hands, face, space.

The Practice gave a fond farewell to Dr Higham on 5 February, who has now retired after nearly 21 years here at the practice. He will be very much missed by both staff and patients. We would like to wish him well in his retirement.

We would like to welcome our two new GPs Dr Leveritt and Dr Kanagasabapathy to the practice.

- **DISPENSARY**: Please remember the practice are still operating a 5 day turnaround for repeat medication to ensure safe working in the dispensary and manage increased demands.
- FLU VACCINATIONS: The practice is still encouraging patients to have flu vaccinations. If you have still not had one and are eligible, please do contact the practice to make an appointment.

COVID-19 VACCINATION PROGRAMME – UPDATE:

In the last edition of the magazine we were pleased to announce the start-up of the COVID-19 vaccination programme in conjunction with our local Primary Care Network. At the time of writing this we can confirm that we have now vaccinated over 5000 patients within the network which is an amazing achievement in just three weeks. Staff across the Network have come together to deliver a programme at a large scale in order to achieve this and are hugely grateful for all the staff across the network who have worked so hard to get our most vulnerable patients vaccinated. We could also not of done this without the help of our dedicated volunteers who played a key part in supporting the logistics of running the clinics and we thank you all.


Cohorts completed so far are cohorts 1-4 which includes all those over 70 years old, residents and staff working in care homes, all frontline healthcare workers and patients in the high risk "shielding" category also known as clinically extremely vulnerable.

Housebound patients within the at risk groups will be done by the District Nursing team in the coming weeks.

The order in which the vaccine is offered to patients is decided by Public Health England and the Joint committee on vaccination and immunisation (JVCI). We have no control over whom we are able to offer the vaccine to and have to strictly adhere to the order of priority.

The next group of patients will be cohorts 5 & 6 which are all those over 65 years of age and those aged 18 - 65 years of age with at risk health conditions. As soon as we have a date for the next vaccination clinics these will be publicised.

Along with Stevenage there are now additional local hubs in the area including the Grafton Centre and Newmarket racecourse. It continues to be the case that patients could be called to have vaccinations at these local hubs as well as via the surgery, we have no choice over where you are invited to be vaccinated.

Importantly, patients aged 70 years and over and those within the "shielding" group who have not yet been vaccinated against COVID and who would like to be are being asked to contact the NHS to arrange a vaccination. The easiest way to arrange a vaccination is through the national booking service which can be accessed at www.nhs.uk/covid-vaccination. The system allows patients to choose a time slot and location that suits them. Anyone unable to book online can call 119 free of charge, anytime between 7am and 11pm seven days a week.

The Chairman of the Parish Council reports

A recent highlight for me, has been assisting with car parking at the vaccine hub at East Barnwell Health Centre, which our local practice is participating in. It was a pleasure to support many of our elderly residents, who have recently been so restricted in their movements, arriving with hope that this might finally point to the end of their confinement. All involved in running the exercise are to be commended on the very efficient process put in place at short notice. When interacting with our practice, I would ask you to be sensitive to the fact that the staff are having to give additional time and energy to vaccinations on top of their "day job" of looking after resident's normal medical needs.

A brief update on the proposed Retirement Village to be situated behind 163-187 High Street. As I write, we understand the consideration of the application by the Planning Committee of East Cambridgeshire District Council has been postponed until 3 March. I anticipate that by the time you read this, the date may have been confirmed. If you wish to see the details of the applications and the responses to it, you can do so by following this link: https://pa.eastcambs.gov.uk/online-applications/ and then entering the reference 20/00296/OUM. I will be attending the Committee on behalf of the Parish Council to address the members about the concerns raised by residents.

The Parish Council has now confirmed a contractor to renovate the bus shelter in the High Street. The work is planned to take place around the end of February or beginning of March. We hope that it will then be a more pleasant place to wait and encourage use of public transport as lockdown restrictions begin to be lifted.

A number of residents have contacted us about the noise levels arising from the A14. Two residents joined me in a recent (virtual) meeting with Highways and the County Council, to explore the options available. I am pleased to report that Highways intend to resurface the A14 between junctions 35-36 in 2023/24. This will be with modern "low-noise" tarmac. They informed me that residents of Bar Hill and Dry Drayton have reported significantly less noise from the A14, since the new stretch has been reopened with the same type of road surface. They were asked if they might consider bringing the date of the works forwards and agreed to consider this, albeit any changes need to fit within other priorities.

We asked about the installation of sound barriers along the side of the road, but were advised that these are only effective for locations immediately adjacent to the road. In our situation, at some distance from the A14, the sound would simply vault over the barrier and we would not secure any meaningful noise reduction for the village. In the longer term, the move in future years to electric vehicles will also significantly reduce engine/exhaust noise.

Concerns have been raised about an increase in dog fouling in the village. It is an offence to not clear up after your dog in our District and we know that most dog owners are very diligent about the matter. However, if you are a dog owner, please do all you can to keep our environment pleasant and healthy. In the event of any problems, the matter can be raised with the District Council Dog Fouling Complaint | East Cambridgeshire District Council (eastcambs.gov.uk).

On a related matter, I want to pass on a warning from our County Councillor ,who advised that there have been several thefts of dogs in the locality recently. He advised always keeping pets in sight when out and about - this means that even tying up a dog outside a shop could be a risk.

District Councillors' Report

Snowdrops are out – which means Easter is on its way. This means that there will be temporary changes to the waste collection dates. As there will be no collection on Good Friday, all collections in the week beginning 29 March will be a day earlier than usual (if your collection is normally a Monday, it will be collected on the previous Saturday). There will also be no collection on Easter Monday, all collections in the week beginning 5 April will be a day later than usual.

And after Easter, it must be time for elections... On Thursday 6 May we will be voting for our County Councillor, Police and Crime Commissioner and Mayor. Covid may bring additional challenges to attending the polling station, so you may want to arrange a postal or proxy vote. With a postal vote, the Council will post you your ballot with a pre-paid return envelope, you vote before election day, so that your ballot is delivered back to ECDC by polling day. With a proxy vote you nominate a trusted person to cast your vote for you at the polling station. You can get the forms to apply for postal or proxy votes on-line www.eastcambs.gov.uk/elections-voting/ways-vote or by email Democratic.Services@eastcambs.gov.uk or phone the Elections Office 01353 665555

The Finance and Assets Committee discussed the budget for 2021/22. Although the draft budget for next year is balanced, by drawing funds from reserves, by 2023/24 the Council will have a budget shortfall of £4.6 million on a total net expenditure of £12 million. The Finance Manager "strongly recommended that early consideration is made as to how savings in future years will be made."

The Committee also approved the Climate Change Supplementary Planning Document (SPD). There were many comments from individuals and groups that felt that the SPD did not go far enough to counter climate change, with interesting and thoughtful contributions, and we hope that most of these suggestions can be incorporated into the new Local Plan. Unfortunately, an SPD cannot go beyond the provisions in the current Local Plan, but it does contain some useful guidance. We were disappointed that several large housing developers had sought to water down the proposals.

The Operational Services Committee renewed the grant to the Newmarket CAB, but for one year only. The paper presented to the Committee recommended that "Once the pandemic and its associated restrictions ease, the Council's Housing and Community Advice service will seek to create a housing and advice hub in the Newmarket area." We are concerned by this because many people are more comfortable going to Citizens' Advice than they are going to the Council, because they see Citizens' Advice as independent. We therefore think the grant should be continued in future years.

Our next virtual District Councillors' Surgery will be on Wednesday 24 March at 6.30pm, followed by meet your Councillors from 7.00pm. The Zoom meeting ID is 631 542 4066 and the passcode is 938720.

One thing I will be doing is encouraging you to move out of your comfort zone and experiment with different grapes and countries. There are so many wonderful wines out there it seems a shame to drink the same ones all the time.

At the time of writing, it's pretty chilly which means hearty stews, pasta dishes such as lasagne and Sunday roasts are the order of the day. If you're having a stew, you'll probably reach for a juicy red such as a Shiraz (Syrah in France). Why not try a Malbec instead? Or even a Carmenere from Chile? When it comes to national dishes, I tend to think that it should be drunk with wine from the same country. Chianti is an obvious match for the lasagne but if you wanted a heavier wine with a bit more punch why not try a Primitivo? This is a grape from the deep south of Italy that's become more popular in recent years. If it's roast chicken, rather than play safe with a pinot grigio how about a fresh and fruity Viognier?

Each month I will be making some recommendations hopefully to match all budgets and will always try and include one from our local shop. If you try them and love them, let me know. If you don't enjoy them, well, at least you tried something different.

Finest Cotes du Rhone - £8 Tesco

From the Côtes du Rhône village of Signargues, this rich blend of mainly Syrah and Grenache grapes offers opulent dark fruit flavours such as blackcurrant and cherry with comforting warm spice on the finish. Delicious with roast meats, casseroles or ratatouille and also great for drinking on its own.

Primitivo Miopasso 2019 Puglia, Feudo di Santa Tresa - £9.99 Cambridge Wine Merchants

A perfect combination of local tradition and modern winemaking, Rich in fruit with an abundance of ripe, dark berry flavours.

Les Jamelles Viognier - £7.50 Co-op

Viognier was historically known as the difficult grape of Condrieu, a wine from the northern Rhone venerated above all others in centuries gone by. Peaches and apricots and, quite frankly, a whole mouthful of yum.

Public Transport Matters

Local buses are still running but mainly empty as we all cope with lockdown. Some park and ride services are suspended. Schools being closed or with fewer pupils also affects the bus companies. The Parish Council is seeking involvement in any transport matters being considered by the Greater Cambridgeshire Partnership which involve our eastern villages. Villages west of Cambridge are worrying about the route of the planned east - west rail link as too costly and least direct.

There is talk of Westley Green a garden city between Cambridge and Newmarket.

Coach companies are offering summer holidays but there is no certainty as to whether we will be able to go on these.

Soham new train station should be open by the end of the year.

Doubling the railway line at Newmarket remains a priority for representatives of the racing and business community determined to improve the town's connectivity. Kent residents are asking for a rail link to Cambridge. Kent County Council has suggested a Thameslink service from Maidstone East to Cambridge. This would stop at Blackfriars and St. Pancras. The arguments about HS2 continue - route, costs. Some other lines closed at the time of the Beeching cuts - 750 million pounds to reinstate services between Bicester and Bletchley and 34 million pounds to reopen the line between Newcastle and Ashington. Diesel fumes at stations is to be monitored in at least 100 stations due to idling diesel engines.

The rise in rail fares is causing an angry response.

The UK will not take the lead in rescuing Eurostar which is majority owned by France. The number of passengers is down by 94%. The government sold its 40% stake in 2015.

Wrightbus is on the road to recovery. They are producing hydrogen powered buses.



Thoughts of a Sports Nut

Welcome, dear reader, to windy March and I can tell you that we cyclists are very much looking forward to warmer, quieter weather in the near future! Also, we are hopeful that we can enjoy the company of larger groups again soon but, in the meantime, I for one have tried to make the most of the thinking time that solitary rides offer. I'll share with you a couple of things that have exercised my mind frequently during recent battles with the elements. Firstly, car & van drivers! It's fair to say that the majority of car drivers are appropriately considerate and polite towards us, but there is a worrying number who refuse to slow down or to pass with a wide berth and who seem to take pleasure in deliberately terrifying cyclists who have the temerity to use 'their' road. I promise you, it's no joke being passed by a vehicle travelling at 30mph more than yourself, when it's close enough to touch!

But there's worse: roadkill... I am always appalled at the number of festering carcasses on the highways, particularly foxes and badgers. 
Anyway, back to proper sport: the Guinness Six Nations Championship. I have no doubt that our esteemed editor enjoyed the weekend of 6th February a little more than usual after the Scotland Rugby team humbled a sorry-looking England in their first win at Twickenham since 1983. Whilst a below-par home side were, to an extent, architects of their own demise, such was their ill-discipline, Scotland's relentless attacking and reliable kicking proved irresistible and could count themselves unlucky that the 6-11 scoreline was not more emphatic. I have to say they were unlucky again the following weekend, surrendering a sizeable lead to Wales who scored the winning try by virtue of an outrageous forward pass to their winger! This perfectly illustrates one of my main gripes with Rugby Union... this infringement seems to get overlooked with astonishing regularity and, in this instance, completely reversed the outcome of the game! VAR anybody?!

England's Test series in India is shaping up to be a classic! In the first Test, the Indians had no answer to a top-drawer performance from the tourists. For once, all the England players, including the two spinners, made a useful contribution to the victory and, in particular, Joe Root (double century in his 100th Test) and James Anderson (unplayable reverse-swing in the second innings) underlined their credentials among the world's best. But that did not stop Virat Kohli and company playing positive, attacking cricket – despite some surprising fielding errors – and their sporting spirit was exemplified by the captain himself in treating his opposite number on the square when Root collapsed with cramp during his marathon first innings.

In the second Test, the Indian backlash was swift and emphatic, despite the controversy of one or two surprising umpiring decisions and a bizarre incident where Kohli, clean bowled by Moeen Ali, refused to leave the crease until the third umpire confirmed he was out! However, at the time of writing, India is deservedly heading towards a big win to level the series with two matches to go. We shouldn't be surprised though... just look what they did in Australia in January! In possibly the finest away win by any team in living memory, India pulled off an unlikely run chase of 329 in the second innings of the Fourth Test to secure a 2-1 series win over the shell-shocked Aussies. Even without their talismanic skipper they simply refused to accept a losing situation and, in Rishabh Pant, they may have found a young wicketkeeper-batsman to rival the class of the great Farokh Engineer. I think Stuart Broad (ironically, left out of the England team for the first Test in India) summed it up best: "Test cricket's heart is beating strongly!" Indeed it is, and long may it continue.

"FALSEHOOD FLIES, AND TRUTH COMES LIMPING AFTER IT..."

We should all detest the vitriol recently directed at certain football players through the medium of social media. My short-term answer to this is for those targeted - and for anyone else who feels likewise inclined - to close down their digital media accounts. The message would then be clear to the platforms themselves that this is not to be tolerated and would put them on notice to perfect their algorithms or lose their customer base. But whilst prejudice of any sort cannot and must not be condoned, it would seem that broader opinion suggests that it's the threatening gestures and menacing demands associated with the Black Lives Matter movement (BLM) that's provoking much of this racial tension. If this is so where is the evidence?

Well, let's start with the opinion poll taken by Opinium for The Guardian where a majority of those polled believe BLM has actually increased racial tension and that the BLM protests that took place in big cities has increased racial friction. This experience is again evidenced by an increase in the number from ethnic communities expressing to The Guardian that they have faced a rise in discrimination since BLM took to the streets.

Then there is the main stream media that was more-or-less as one when their headlines reported that there was no reason why "the threatening fist of the BLM movement should have been projected over the London skyline on New Year's Eve". The New Year's Eve display also provoked a digital media backlash primarily targeted at London's Mayor and the BBC: "You made a NYE celebration political" was the general retort. Judicious people also evidently agreed that the NYE display was an inappropriate occasion to make such a fatuous radical gesture.

'The Week' magazine, which is an apolitical synopsis of the past weeks news, paraphrased national journalistic comment; "in the wake of events in America the already existing BLM movement has managed to threaten, blackmail and otherwise inveigle themselves into almost every public space in the UK". Indeed the evidence is there - from the Premier League to places of learning, industry, finance, museums and even civic centres such as Bristol and Exeter, BLM has successfully intimated that if you didn't sign up to their mantra then you were a sponsor of racial oppression.

Richard Morrison sums up this opinion in The Times by asking; "How many statues will we pull down? How many roads will be renamed? How many fine institutions denigrated? How many towering figures erased, Soviet-style, from our history?" Morrison adds "since the uprising in America last May and the rise of the BLM movement in the UK, many British local authorities and public organisations (The National Trust and the Church of England being but two) have been panicked into decolonising themselves without, it appears, serious reflection or consultation." Add to this the example of the brewer Green King forced by researchers at University College London (UCL) to succumb to accusations

of profiteering from alleged servitude. Morrison brings to mind the quote from the 18th century satirist Jonathan Swift that begins and ends this article...

Leaders of the 'beautiful game' and the clubs themselves should take note of the gathering pace of such opinion and play their part by finding some other way than sanctioning political gestures on the field of play. In this respect I also include the 'Kick it Out' campaign and Gary Neville (Football Pundit) who have also yielded to the claim that 'Taking The Knee' (TTK) is not a political gesture. A very noble position but somewhat naïve given that TTK has become synonymous with the openly anti-western/anti-capitalist political agenda of the BLM movement. As Sports Nut reminds me, it's even more surprising when 'keeping politics out of sport' is, in fact, football's official position. We would all agree I'm sure with the underlying anti-racial sentiment but let's not forget the furore a few years ago when British Football and British Rugby teams wore the Poppy as a mark of respect for the war dead which was then judged by some ignorant official to be a political gesture.

Is it therefore of no wonder that football fans are expressing their frustration and disapproval at having to witness the piousness of 'TTK' when all they have come to do is to watch a game of 'footie'! Recently academics at Cambridge University said that 'no disaffected group has the right to demand absolute respect for an ideology that others believe to be fundamentally flawed'. This of course equally applies to BLM, especially when such menacing gestures as 'the fist' and 'TTK' are openly used in front of a cornered audience.

I would speculate that many in this country are finding the hasty 'knee-jerk' reactions and the milky methods surrounding the 'expunging' of tainted historical figures disquieting and undeniably sinister. History isn't that simplistic and renaming institutions and kowtowing to claims of servitude achieves and solves nothing. Every age has its forms of collective piety; tragically though this seems to have proliferated into becoming aggressive and unenlightened outrage without questions being asked and no fact-finding done. Just because activists and wokes feel outraged about presumed social injustices does not mean they have to turn off their filters.

Fortunately though, more and more organisations across Britain are realising the aim of the BLM movement is to legitimise its murkier political side by infiltrating genuine and honest causes associated with racial equality. As a final piece of evidence Sherelle Jacobs, a black journalist, recognises this and writes: "Marxist-chic BLM is a disturbing threat to racial progress".

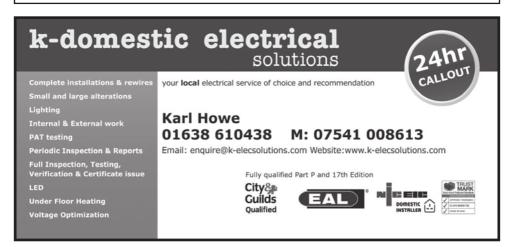
