District Councillors' Report

The impending retirement of Dr Liz Robin, Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Director of Health. On behalf of the Members and Officers of the Council, the Chairman thanked Dr Robin for all her pandemic-related work and wished her well for her forthcoming retirement. We would like to add our thanks to Dr Robin for all the work she and her team have done over the years, and especially throughout the Covid pandemic.

Council approved the budget for 2021/22 and the Medium Term Financial Strategy through to 2024/25. The East Cambs element of the Council Tax is frozen for 2021/22 but will rise by over 3.5% in 2022/23 and by the maximum amount allowed in the subsequent years. Despite these Council Tax rises, the Council is forecasting a budget shortfall of over £4 million from 2023/24. We supported an unsuccessful amendment which would have given financial support to local businesses recovering from Covid and carried out a consultation on leisure and recreation provision across the district as well as raising Council Tax more gradually and reducing the budget shortfall below £4 million.

Although the District Council's share of the Council tax is frozen, your Council tax bills will rise because the bill sent by the District Council covers the County Council, Police and Fire services and your Parish Council – many of these other bodies have increased their Council tax charges. If you are finding it difficult to pay your Council tax, you may be eligible for reductions or exemptions. There is a list at www.angliarevenues.gov.uk/services/counciltax/reductions/index.cfm. There was cross-party support for a motion in support of the proposed Fens Biosphere. (Biosphere Reserve status is awarded by UNESCO to unique and valuable landscapes.) Biosphere status can bring people and organisations together to develop a shared vision for the future of the Fens. It will support better management of the natural capital of the Fens, create a sense of connectedness to the Fens, and contribute to a sense of place and better quality of life. Charlotte had to declare an interest in this and not vote or take part in the discussions because she works for the local Wildlife Trust, who are a partner in the project.

The administration passed a motion calling for the A1123 to be down graded to a B road. We did not support this motion because evidence from across the country shows that changing from an A road to a B road does not lead to any reduction in traffic or speeds, but it does lead to a reduction in road maintenance funding from central government. In this case, we would lose £250,000 a year putting yet more pressure on a budget which is already struggling to fund adequate road maintenance.

It was confirmed that the Council has a 7 year land supply and therefore our development envelopes in the Local Plan 2015 should be respected.



Parish Council Notes

I'll begin with the topic that has taken so much of our time and attention over the past few months, namely the application for the development of a retirement village to the rear of 163-187 High Street. The application was considered by the Planning Committee of East Cambridgeshire District Council on 3 March. The Committee members considered a substantial report from their Planning Consultant, which took account of all the documents submitted including a large number of submissions from local residents. In addition, I was able to summarise the key concerns identified by the Parish Council alongside Dr Emma MacGrath, who spelt out the potential impact on the Medical Practice and its existing patients if a such a major development for potentially higher medical need residents were approved.

The Planning Consultant contended that, although it had been asserted that there is a need for such accommodation, the applicant had not shown either that it was needed in this location or that the site pro-posed was the only one available. It was stated that the "exceptional circumstances" required to secure permission for development within the Green Belt had not been demonstrated.

Cllr Cane, who represents this Ward on the District Council, pointed out that there is a now a 7 year land supply for development in the Council area, well in excess of the 5 year minimum required. Thus there is no requirement to accept development outside of the sites earmarked within the Local Plan of 2015 (often described as the "development envelope"). This is a fundamental challenge to the "exceptional cir-cumstances" argument put forward by the applicant.

When the matter was put to the vote, the decision was taken to refuse the application by 10 votes to 1. My thanks to everyone who took the time to submit their comments on this key issue.

Turning to smaller but still important matters, I am pleased to let you know that the renovation of the bus shelter has been completed, which we hope will provide a more pleasant environment while you are waiting for the bus.

Councillor Mathew Shuter, who has represented this Ward on the County Council for the past 16 years, announced that he is standing down at the election in May. We thanked him for all that he has done on our behalf over that time and wish him well for the future.

As I write, we have seen the first step to exiting of lockdown with schools returning and I want to thank everyone who has made the sacrifices necessary to get us to this point. The Prime Minister has made it clear that the progression through the next steps of easing is dependent on our progress in reducing Covid 19 infection levels. Residents have recently raised concern over the number of positive cases in this Ward, when compared with other other local areas. Whatever the reason, I would encourage everyone to maintain the precautions that have helped us progress this far. This will help ensure we are able to reach the next steps in the Government's timetable.

Mothers' Union

As a follow up to the Women's Aid Refuge Christmas Gift Appeal, to which members of the local community also donate, I felt it appropriate to pass on current news of how the Refuge is coping during the pandemic.

This past year has been a particularly difficult and busy one, due mainly to the pandemic and the restrictions imposed by the lockdowns. Putting measures in place to keep everyone at the Refuge safe from the virus has been a real challenge. There has been an increase in the demand for places as domestic violence has increased across the country, but the Refuge can only accommodate eight women and their children at any given time. As soon as one moves on to their own accommodation their place has been immediately filled

During lockdown they had to make the decision not to accept any donations of goods so would-be donors have had to keep the goods on hold.

As reported in the run up to Christmas, to comply with Covid restrictions, the Refuge could only accept Supermarket vouchers or money for their Christmas Appeal. The staff at the Refuge do not distribute all the vouchers to the women residing there over the Christmas period, but throughout the year as new residents arrive in need of financial support until they begin to receive their benefits.

The Lady Day Service on 25 March was held virtually on Zoom, and led by Revd. Michael Banyard, MU Diocesan Chaplain.

For the time being Mothers' Union meetings remain suspended, but as the lockdown eases we hope to plan for resuming our fellowship and social activities together.



Dear Editor

Last month's 'Jolley Old World' gave a very one-sided view of a serious and complex issue. Racial discrimination ruins lives and blights society. It is not enough to not condone racism, we must confront it; reject it and offer support and understanding to its victims.

I cannot agree with the suggestion that people faced with racist abuse should close their social media accounts. That's what the racist bullies want – for the targets of their abuse to disappear from public view - their racist imagery has no place in it for successful black people making reasoned arguments; they want to silence black voices.

Any radical movement is made up of many people and has 'hangers-on', it's not difficult to find hot heads and extremists and get quotes from them that are 'threatening and menacing'. Black Lives Matter UK sums up its aims as —

"We stand together across the globe to change the world, we kneel together in peace and solidarity asserting Black people are treated as equals to White people."

Far from being 'threatening and menacing' they are simply asking for their human right to be treated as equals.

Many of our statues, street names and 'fine institutions' date from a time when Britain was benefiting from the spoils of Empire and the slave trade. They therefore present a skewed view of the best of British society and it is valuable to consider the wider view. To Richard Morrison it may appear that organisations are reviewing their roles in colonialisation and slavery 'without serious reflection or consultation', but he is wrong. He cites as an example the National Trust's report examining the links between its properties and colonialism and slavery. The Charity Commission reviewed that report and how it was commissioned, their Director of Regulatory Services, Helen Earner said:

"In this instance, the National Trust was able to provide us with a well-reasoned response, supported by clear evidence of how it had carefully considered how this interim report fitted with its charitable objects, and we are satisfied that there are no grounds for regulatory action against the Trust."

Greene King has acknowledged that its founder Benjamin Greene "own[ed] cane sugar plantations in the West Indies where he owned enslaved Africans and profited from their labour. He wrote columns in his own newspaper that were critical of those campaigning for the abolition of slavery and he was financially compensated when slavery was abolished."

We need to understand our nation's history — the good and the bad. It's not easy to accept that people we venerate for their good works were sometimes also involved in oppression and exploitation of people based on race. It's hard to think of some of our elegant stately homes being funded from income from the slave trade. Its jarring to think that the British army who fought so bravely and lost so many to defend freedom in Europe were violently supressing freedom movements in Africa and India. But they are all part of our nation's history and it is important that we do face up to the full picture.

I feel we do need to reconsider who is honoured with statues and street names and how we present a full history of those so honoured. Imagine being a black child in Bristol, walking past the statue of Edward Colston, or down streets named after him, seeing his name on Bristol institutions, celebrating his generosity to the City and not understanding why there is no public acknowledgement of his role in the slave trade. This would cause offence, hurt and anguish and we should not allow that to continue. I don't like mob rule and do not support toppling statues, but we do need a proper discussion which leads to change so that we can create a public realm which makes all citizens feel a valued part of our society.

News from Tim...a Vinophile

It's beginning to get a bit warmer, the days are getting longer and even the lockdown appears to be easing. We may not be able to have the Easter break we are hoping for but we can certainly treat ourselves to some delicious wine to accompany our special meal.

Traditionally roast lamb is the order of the day and often this is paired with the Spanish wine Rioja.

Rioja is region in the Basque province in the north of Spain. Although produced as a white and rose wine it is the red version that most of us will have tried. The principle grape is tempranillo and this type of wine can be traced back to the 9th century.

Red Rioja is classified into three types based on ageing; Crianza, Reserva and Gran Reserva. The wine is aged in a 225 litre barrel and then in the bottle. As a general rule the longer the ageing the smoother the wine.

Crianza: The period of aging in oak barrels and bottles must be a minimum of two calendar years from 1 October of the year of the harvest in question, followed and complemented by aging in the bottle. The minimum time that must remain in the barrel is one year.

Reserva: The period of aging in oak barrels and bottles must be a minimum of thirty-six months, with a minimum time of twelve months in oak barrels.

Gran Reserva: The wine must have a minimum of time in barrel of twenty-four months, followed and supplemented with an aging in bottle of at least thirty-six months.

Like most wines you don't always have to pay top dollar to get a tasty tipple. Look out for Valdepeñas. It's the same grape as Rioja but nowhere near the same price.

If you prefer white to red avoid anything too acidic why not try an oak aged Chardonnay or a Gewurstraminer with your roast lamb?

Next month we'll be embracing spring and looking at what wines can be drunk outdoors as we emerge from Lockdown 3.0. I'd love to hear what you enjoy drinking al fresco. Drop me an email vinophile?@gmail.com

COVID VACCINATIONS: These are proceeding as planned. When you are due for a 2nd jab you will be invited by the practice so please do not call them in advance.

DISPENSARY: The prescription delivery service is in operation and leaflets are being distributed for those who wish to take up this option.

ACUTE PRESCRIPTIONS: Please wait **3 hours** after a prescription that has been generated via a phone or video consultation before collecting it. This will ensure that the prescription has been received in dispensary and dispensed. If you cannot pick up your medication, please let the GP know so they can put arrangements in place to get your medication to you.

REPEAT PRESCRIPTIONS: Please do not to attend the practice until **5 working days** after ordering these. Social distancing is still a challenge in the dispensary and there are fewer staff working in the actual dispensary because of this, which is why they are continuing to work to a five day turnaround time. This also means that if a certain drug has to be ordered it provides time to get drug supplies in. Please do not ring or attend the practice to see if the prescription is ready before the 5 days is up.

Public Transport Matters

Now that things are slightly opening up there are a few more passengers on the buses at certain times of the day. School buses are back.

There are ongoing works at various railway stations at weekends and buses are available to provide connection services. Stagecoach is hoping to extend its 300 million pounds loan from the Bank of England for a further year as it is not sure when and whether people will go back to work. Might they prefer to continue working from home - WFH.?

A joint venture between Stagecoach East and the Greater Cambridge Partnership to improve air quality in the city has involved the introduction 12 months ago of electric zero emission buses. They have driven 50,000 miles. They use state of the art batteries that use regenerative braking to recharge every time the bus slows down. A full charge takes 8 hours overnight.

Rail firms could be profiting from the 170% rise in replacement buses. Some changes have been made to rail timetables with priority being given to key workers. However there is expected to be increased use at the weekends as we gradually come out of lockdown.

Daniel Zeichner MP is making enquiries about the finance for the Cambridge South station. Work is now going well on building the new Soham railway station. There are now replacement buses between Ipswich and Peterborough via Ely until August 30th. The new stop in Soham is in Station Road.

People in Newmarket are fighting to keep the Wetherby railway crossing open. There are plans to upgrade several level crossings as they are viewed as a risk. There is an interface between road users and the railways. The signalling system first installed in the 1980s is reaching the end of its expected operational life.

Cuts are being made to the plans for the HS2 Euston station. Protesters against HS2 have been in tunnels dug under the station. There is to be an integrated rail plan for the North of England and the Midlands. Flexible season tickets could be introduced to. help people who only need to go into work 2 or 3 days a week.

Hitachi has committed to building more of the rolling stock in the UK. Competition hots up for the contract to build the high powered HS2 trains to go between London, Birmingham and beyond.

If you are planning a holiday, we are told of the trains in Scotland travelling through beautiful countryside and scenery.





Thoughts of a Sports Nut

Well, the remainder of the Test Series in India completed a predictably uncomfortable episode in English cricket. The anticipated Indian backlash from the visitors' stunning victory in the first Test was as embarrassing as it was clinical, resulting in a 3-1 home win. There are plenty of precedents for home teams exploiting conditions and wickets that play to their strengths, but the Indians took this to the extreme of preparing wickets that rendered their superior spin attack all but unplayable. Even Joe Root, nothing more than a part-time bowler, returned figures of 5 wickets for 8 runs in the Third Test as the Indian batsmen temporarily toiled on a surface that made a mockery of Test cricket. Whilst it was wonderful to have proper cricket back on terrestrial television, courtesy of Channel 4, one can't help thinking that India has perpetrated immeasurable damage to this, the ultimate format of the game, through their determination to make themselves unbeatable at home.

Can you imagine Channel 4, or anyone else for that matter, bidding top dollar for future Test series when the matches last only half the allotted duration? The last three India-England matches were completed in under three days, under two days and under three days, respectively. That's a total of less than eight days' play out of a scheduled 15 days, which represents pretty disappointing bang for the TV buck, doesn't it? If we want shortened matches with quick runs or clattering wickets, we have ODIs and T20 formats. Let us remember that Test cricket is supposed to be 'Bridge' to their 'Snap'!

It was not without some misgivings that I read about the Brazilian FA's decision to rename the famous Estádio do Maracanã as the "Estádio Rei Pele" (King Pele Stadium). Now don't get me wrong: not only do I believe that Pele was the greatest footballer who ever lived, he was a hero and an inspiration to virtually all sportspeople of a certain vintage, and there is no accolade too high for this wonderfully dignified man. (By the way, if you haven't seen the riveting new Netflix documentary on Pele's life and times yet, I strongly recommend it!) However, growing up surrounded by my Dad's books, I marvelled over stories and images of the enormous, exotic crowds of the Maracanã Stadium, an icon of international football, the very name fermenting a lifelong desire in a kid's heart to one day be a part of that incredible scene.

Well, some of you will know that the dream came true in 2013 when the Bottisham boys travelled to Rio for the 2-2 match which marked the opening of the refurbished stadium in preparation for the World Cup the following year. I had never shed a tear over a national anthem before – particularly someone else's - but, well... you just had to be there! Anyway, much as I love the great Edson Arantes do Nascimento, it'll always be the Maracaña to me!

Another decision that raised my Nutty eyebrows in March was the proposal by UEFA to expand the "Champions League" (sic – I find the absent apostrophe unfeasibly annoying!) YET AGAIN! If ever there was a misnomer, this is surely it. Call it what it is: the 'European Super League', or the 'Making-Rich-Clubs-Richer League' but stop pretending it's about champions when teams finishing as low as fourth in a national league can qualify for entry. UEFA's plan is to increase the number of teams from 32 to 36 and add four extra dates before

Christmas to accommodate the fixtures, a move which would squeeze the already jammed domestic programme until the pips squeak. The majority of English clubs have not yet pinned their colours to any particular mast but most, I'm sure, will worry greatly about the further downgrading of domestic competitions, which would knock-on throughout the leagues. I can foresee a reduction of the number of teams in the Premier League, the further sidelining of the FA Cup, and the abolition of the vital revenue-generating League Cup, if UEFA's plans go through. The Crystal Palace chairman, for one, has already described the effect of this on English football as "devastating".

I do so wish UEFA would consult the Sports Nut on such matters. Here is a much more sensible and equitable alternative: restore the European Cup as a tournament for national League Champions; restrict the Europa League to teams finishing second and third in national leagues, plus respective League Cup winners; and reintroduce the European Cup-Winners' Cup for national knock-out cup winners. This would not only resolve the ridiculous present fixture congestion, but also increase the importance of both FA Cup and League Cup and give the so-called smaller teams more of a chance of European competition. This would certainly widen the circle of the money-go-round. I also believe it could result in a more even distribution of top players because there would be opportunities to play in Europe without necessarily having to wear the colours of a 'top four' side (where they might spend frustrating hours on the bench, anyway). Any other ideas out there...?!

For the second month running, I beg your indulgence for me to vent some further cycling-related concerns, generated during long, lonely, lockdown hours on the road, fighting the ageing process to maintain a modicum of bodily fitness! Potholes are becoming such a frequent and serious hazard, now, that one wonders how long it will be before a more serious injury befalls one of our intrepid CB25ers. (Between us, we already have a number of non-life-threatening, but painful, mishaps in our antecedents!) A recent study by Cycling UK quoted 448 deaths or serious injuries linked to poor British road surfaces in the period between 2007 and 2018. This is against a backdrop of more than half of all local authorities suffering cuts in road maintenance budgets, and 90% of councils failing to repair all their potholes within the recommended timeframes.

One of the problems, of course, is the definition of a 'serious' pothole! Normally, repairs to 'non-serious' potholes are supposed to be effected within three months, whilst 'serious' ones are required to be dealt with inside 24 hours. But – I kid you not – we road cyclists encounter holes (even in Bottisham High Street!) that would pitch us off and have us munching tarmac every single time we ride! The trouble is that, whilst a pothole, say – a square foot in area and three inches in depth – would cause only an inconsequential thump under a motorist's wheels, it could easily be fatal to the cyclist. Obviously, we remain ever-vigilant and communicative when out riding together, but taking evasive action can bring its own difficulties, such as brushes with overtaking cars or, at least, incurring the ire of impatient drivers! I implore all road-users to understand the risks caused by dangerous road surfaces and I urge our local authorities to start spending their new £500 million fund on repairing the nation's 10 million potholes, soonest!

REFUSED...

I make no apologies for the euphoric sounds emanating from our household at around 5pm on Wednesday 3rd March when the Chair of the East Cambs Planning Committee announced that the application for a Retirement Village had been REFUSED...

Despite contrived claims by the applicant, the Planning Committee was not satisfied that the development demonstrated the 'very special circumstances' needed to build on Green Belt land outside of the Village Development Area and partially in the village Conservation Area. Having read the Planning Officer's guidance to the Planning Committee I noted that the application was essentially covered in three sections; Location, Need and Policy where Location was the primary consideration. It was therefore incumbent upon the applicant to prove that the benefit outweighed the potential damage to the openness of the Green Belt. In order to do this the applicant had to show that there was a recognised local need for residential care and affordable dwellings and that the application conformed to both national and local planning policy. This they were unable to do but they still have the option nevertheless to appeal the decision so the fat lady hasn't sung just yet...

On the face of it so far so good but what did strike me as disturbing is why a relatively well-off local landowner would be so callous as to want to deprive this village of an area officially protected and recognised as pleasant open countryside and of high landscape value if not solely out of rapaciousness. But then on reflexion and perhaps of even more concern were statements made in some of the submissions presented by official Consultees. Consultees are principally people and or public bodies who supply/oversee community services in a specialised capacity as contrasted to members of the public. This includes utility companies, environmental organisations and of course local government establishments.

Firstly, Anglian Water commented that the Bottisham foul water/sewerage system had sufficient capacity to accommodate additional flows from new development including the Retirement Village. Yet despite members of the public questioning this assertion the AWA claim was taken at face value and not challenged by the Planning Authority. This was made even more bizarre by the fact that the AWA statement was shown to be at odds with the East Cambridgeshire Local Plan where the Plan makes specific mention of the "'works' operating at near to full permitted capacity and that only modest development could currently be accommodated without an upgrade." Furthermore the inadequacy of the sewage works was first brought to light by the 'East Cambridgeshire and Fenland - Outline Water Cycle Study, April 2011' where the entry for Bottisham reads: "The sewage treatment works is at capacity and improvement works are required to accommodate growth."

Secondly was the Cambridgeshire Highways Authority who could see no threat to road safety from a new junction and pedestrian crossing intersecting the High Street within 25m of a sweeping bend? This potential hazard was mentioned in many submissions from the

public who also recognised the added dangers at this point of 'on street' parking and children crossing at school peak periods. The Highways site visit was but a single moment in time outside of peak hours and during a lockdown period. But this visit formed the foundation of their recommendation offering 'no objection'. To support the local view, automatically recorded vehicle volume and speed data from the VAS units was provided from 2019 showing that just over 30% of traffic coming into the village past that spot exceeded 30mph and that traffic volume was considerably higher than both Highways and the applicant were suggesting. Again, the Highways Authority assessment, along with that of the applicant, was accepted at face value whereas the plethora of village submissions to the effect that road safety/pedestrian safety would be adversely compromised were seemingly ignored.

Thirdly, the input from the Wildlife Trust supported a modelled scenario used by the applicant to calculate the impact on biodiversity. Yet it is well understood in environmental circles that habitat loss and degradation has been, and still is, the greatest factor affecting biodiversity in Britain. Moreover, calculative models of this complexity are invariably imprecise and are dependent upon input which at best is subjective and at worst skewed to produce a desired result. You would not then be surprised to learn that the applicant's model predicted a biodiversity net gain whereas it is acknowledged by the Wildlife Trust that even if habitats are not wholly destroyed by development, they may nonetheless be fragmented into smaller areas which may be too small for their plant and animal communities to remain viable.

And finally it was beyond belief that the Conservation Officer offered no objection to a service and access road, with its entire street furnishing paraphernalia, cutting through a substantial and prominent part of the Bottisham Conservation Area. The conservation ethos is to 'protect and enhance the features and character of the area that make it unique', and this applies equally to landscape, walls, hedgerows and open spaces as it does to buildings. Many neighbourhood responses recognised the importance of outlook the Conservation Area gave and the potential loss the development would pose. But remarkably this was not considered to be equally important as listed buildings.

At the very least, where factual evidence is provided and reference is made to policy conflict, the Planning Authority should challenge the Consultee to substantiate their submission. Furthermore, none of these Consultees has the knowledge or understanding of how our community works and what we, as residents value and find important. In the case of Anglian Water, they should have been required to provide confirmation that upgrade work to the sewerage works had indeed been carried out in accordance with policy.

So emotion apart all this begs the question: who knows the locality best, those who sit at desks behind computers and GIS models who see but a single moment in time or those that breathe the enduring daily life of the village?




