We have continued with monthly raffles and remembered members birthdays.




An Update on the Work at Holy Trinity Church

PROGRESS OF THE WORKS TO THE N AISLE PEW PLATFORM OF HOLY TRINITY, NOVEMBER 2020

This is taken from a report by Mike Young to the Parochial Church Council on the progress of the works to the N aisle pew platform and the external drainage of Bottisham Parish Church, Holy Trinity. The contractors are Lodge & Sons of Stebbing, who are specialists in the restoration of historic buildings. The project has been underway since 5th October .



The first move was to envelop pretty well everything above ground in Holy Trinity in plastic sheeting - an A-grade packaging job. This was followed by moving the pews in the N aisle to the rear of the nave, removal of the rotten and dry rot infected flooring, joists and the boarding (dado) along the North wall. The solid supports for the joists were also removed. (I don't know how he did it,



but Richard of Lodge [right] moved all the pews by himself!)

At this stage everything looked pleasantly straightforward, but there is a requirement that any excavation in or around a church has to be viewed by an archaeologist. Once a further layer of soil was removed, the picture looked rather different.



THE GRAVES. The large rectangular grave was the first to be revealed. (One of the archaeologists for some reason decided to stand on the grave at an early stage of removing the soil and promptly went through the surface - happily not far and without injury, but the cavity at the NE corner goes down c 70 cm.) It is not obvious in the photo, but the level around the grave and other cavities is hard clunch (local chalk), resulting from smaller pieces that have fused together, to provide firm support for a floor.

The first church on the site with aisles, dates from around 1250 and it seems likely that the clunch foundation is from this period, although it is possible that it was renewed when the nave was completely rebuilt in the first quarter of the next century.

The graves appear to have been cut into the foundation layer, so would have to be post c 1250. The decision was taken not to excavate further and to let the souls rest in peace - it would have been interesting to have dug further, but potentially expensive, since we have to pay for the archaeologists' time! However, the small square grave, just visible at the top right above was identified as that of a child from fragments of rib recovered from the soil in the grave. (All bone fragments have been collected, carefully stored and will be given a reburial at the end of the works.)



POST HOLES. The smaller square holes running along the N wall were identified by the archaeologists from the residues in them as holes that had held wooden posts. The line of the holes is clearer in the image lower right. (The hole with indications of wood is the smaller of the two square holes at the bottom.) The view of the archaeologists is that the posts would possibly have been scaffolding, probably of an early date.



The foundations of the N wall. There is evidence from the S aisle that the walls of the aisles of the rebuilt nave, c 1310-20, were in the same position of the aisle walls of the Early English predecessor. What is clear from the excavation in the N aisle is that the walls of the 14th century aisles used the foundations of the earlier church. This is clearer in real life than in the photographs but is shown quite well in this image (arrow right), the bottom layer of stone being from the earlier building. It can be seen in the other photographs and is also apparent in a photograph taken when the floor of the S aisle was removed during the works to take out some of the pews and to move the font from what is now the choir vestry. So perhaps no great discovery, but great to see.




The Allington Chantry Chapel. Much the most interesting finding was visually less dramatic and not easy to see on a photograph. Indeed initially nobody seemed that interested in it, but towards the E end of the N aisle there are no graves apparent, but quite abruptly an amount of rubble in the soil. The broom handle indicates where it starts. To the right, at the end of the excavation, is the Allington Chantry Chapel.

A chapel was created for William Allington ('Alyngton'), speaker of the House of Commons, in 1474, in which a chaplain was to say the divine service every day for the souls of William and 'our very dear consort Elizabeth Queen of England'. What was created was an aisle chapel and it must always have been highly probable that the chapel was larger than the enclosure resulting from the comprehensive reordering of the church by the Rev. John Hailstone in 1839 (above right). I recollect a speaker leading a group of visitors saying that they thought that the chapel would have extended as far as the first pillar in the N aisle and that they thought that they could see an indication, unspecified, of this.

The floor level of the chapel is higher than that in the nave and aisles and it seems highly probable that the revealed rubble was foundation material for the raised level, which extends exactly as far as the first pillar of the N aisle, (marked on the plan). So, at last there is, I think, good evidence for the extent of the aisle chapel. Indeed, there are holes on the N side of the first pillar of the arcade which could well have been fixings for the screen which would have surrounded the chapel. The presumption is that the screen was formed from the original C14 rood screen separating the chancel from the nave, which was replaced in this period by the stone chancel screen that we have today.

There has to be a silver lining to the dark cloud of the dry rot damage to the N aisle pew platform and having a glimpse into the past of Holy Trinity is it. Perhaps not as dramatic a revelation as when the 'lost' N door of the chancel and the aumbry were revealed during work to replaster the N wall of the chancel in 1986, but surely interesting.

There were a couple of items discussed at the December Parish Council meeting which I want to share with you. The first relates to the Planning Application for a Retirement Village to the rear of 163 to 187 High Street. This was originally intended to be discussed by East Cambridgeshire DC Planning Committee in October. We were advised at the beginning of October that the matter had been postponed, to allow for the applicant to respond to “late consultation responses received”.

We were notified on 20 November that revised documents and plans had been received “to address the [District] Council’s recommended reasons for refusal”. On examining these documents, it emerged that substantial changes had been made to the application. Most notable was the addition of up to 50 affordable dwellings in the north west corner of the proposed development, on land that had previously been designated as public open space. The District Council asked for comments by 11 December, to prepare papers for the Planning Committee meeting in January. Given the extent of the proposed changes, and concern that residents should have time to respond to them, the Parish Council asked that the Planning Committee discussion be deferred until February 2021. This has been agreed and will permit the Parish Council to consider its response at its meeting on 4 January 2021.

We also encourage residents to make their own comments to the District Council. If you do, it would be helpful if you could copy the Parish Council into your response at: clerk@bottishampc.co.uk.

The second item of wider interest was the presentation to the Parish Council by Jonathan Cook from the A to B1102 Group. At a time when the Greater Cambridge Partnership is considering its plan for the eastern approaches to Cambridge, this group aims to ensure that the villages from Quy to Burwell (very much including Bottisham) take the opportunity to ensure that the impacts on our part of East Cambridgeshire are understood and taken into account in those plans. Responding to consultations by the Partnership is very important and the group is supporting that process by collecting views from around our villages. Please take a look at their website at: <https://atob1102.org>. It would help them if as many local people as possible complete their short survey through the website.

Another piece of news I want to share with you is that Fenland has been identified as a biosphere.

A Biosphere is a special status awarded by UNESCO to a unique and valuable landscape. UNESCO states that "biospheres connect people, economies and nature to create a secure future we can all look forward to. They are about developing new ways of living, exploring new ideas and working together." Bottisham lies on the edge of this area. More information can be found at: <https://www.fensbiosphere.org.uk>.

In the meantime, the Parish Council is keeping busy with its work to ensure the village is a pleasant and safe place to live. In this task we work closely with C/Cllr Mathew Shuter, and D/Cllrs Charlotte Cane and John Trapp – the Council is grateful for all their help and support through the year.

Finally, I hope that you have enjoyed a peaceful Christmas despite the restrictions and send good wishes from everyone on the Council for a happy and healthy 2021.

District Councillors' Report

At the last meeting of the Operational Services Committee:

- It was decided to support the Local Electricity Bill and to write to local MPs to ask them to support the bill.
- The grant to the Voluntary and Community Action East Cambs was renewed.
- The reports on Waste Collection and Street Cleansing showed very good performance.

At the last meeting of the Finance & Assets Committee:

- The External Audit noted some areas that required improvement, but nothing major, and the report was accepted.
- The ECDC accounts for the last year were submitted and approved. There was some disquiet voiced about the further loan to East Cambs Trading Company, the Council's company for building development.
- The Council Tax Reduction Scheme was continued.
- A new trustee was appointed to East Cambs CLT which has only four members; some misgivings were voiced over the appointment of the Leader of the Council to a supposedly-community led organisation. Clarification of the purpose of this trust, its governance and its relation to Palace Green Homes and East Cambs Community Housing was sought.
- The Bus Services Review document was accepted and will be submitted to the Cambs and Peterborough Combined Authority. Besides the continuation, and augmentation, of the no. 11 bus to Cambridge, other interesting ideas such as a fast bus from Bottisham to Cambridge North, and Demand Responsive Transport to the south of the A14 were proposed.
- A CIL contribution of £750,000 to the much-needed expansion of St. Mary's Medical Practice, Ely.
- The Gender Pay report for ECDC showed that there was still a gap in pay between genders.

All Council meetings are now on Zoom, and available to view retrospectively as well as being screened live, so you can see your Councillors in action. For details go to the Council website, www.eastcambs.gov.uk.

We shall be holding our next Councillor's Surgery by Zoom on 12 January from 6.30 p.m. The Meeting ID is 357 775 2400, and the Passcode is 098359. If you prefer to follow a link, it will be on Charlotte's Facebook page – fb.me/charlottecanelibdem. If you join for the Surgery, you will be held in the waiting room if there is already someone in the meeting with us, so that any discussions with us during the Surgery remain confidential. The Surgery will be followed by 'Meet your Councillors' on the same Zoom link, and this will be a group meeting to listen to, and discuss, your ideas and opinions with others.

As we write this, the Covid vaccine is starting to be rolled out, which gives huge hope to all of us. But it is critical that we continue to follow social distancing, mask wearing and hand washing as well as other restrictions. If we keep protecting ourselves and each other, 2021 should be a healthy year for all of us.



Distraction is one of the biggest causes of fires in the home - most of which start in the kitchen.

You lock your door when you leave the house, but do you unplug your chargers?

You turn off your oven when you aren't using it but do you regularly ensure there isn't a fat build up in your oven, hob and grill?

A simple fire safety check list can help you avoid an unnecessary fire in your home - Simple tips, simply STOP the chance of a fire.

- **NEVER overload sockets:** Multi-socket adapters, often used in homes to provide more plug sockets quickly and easily, are particularly popular during the winter period when people are more likely to plug in heating devices, lights and other items. If used incorrectly however, these can be very dangerous and cause an electrical fire through overloading the socket. 'One appliance, one socket' is the safest approach to avoid any danger of fire in your home.
- **Switch off, Turn off:** If it isn't meant to be left on (like fridges, freezers) switch it off and turn it off at the plug when it isn't in use.

Charge safely: Only use electrical charging devices for the purpose they were intended and avoid purchasing counterfeit, cheap charging devices for electrical items and always keep leads away from cookers and hobs.

- **Fat-Free, Fire-Free:** Fat can build up slowly over time through regular use of kitchen devices and as it does it increases the chance of a fire when cooking. Ensure you regularly maintain hobs, grills and ovens and keep them clear from fat build up and safer from fire.
- **Distraction causes fires:** over 50% of fires in the kitchen are caused by distraction - pay attention and avoid cooking if under the influence of alcohol or medication or feeling tired.

Richard “Dick” Bradford

Firstly, I would like to thank Gerry Daish for his kind words about Dad in last month's edition of the Cresset; kind words indeed Gez and greatly appreciated by all the family. On that point I would like to express my heartfelt gratitude to all the wonderful people who sent cards expressing their sadness, respect, and love for Dad. You will never know how much it has helped the whole family at this time.

On the day of Dad's Funeral, my brothers and sister, walked behind the Hearse from our family home in Beechwood Avenue to the Holy Trinity Church, the place where Dad was Christened 90 years ago. We would have liked Dad's service to be in his beloved Church, but as things worked out, it was closed for essential repairs. As we approached the church, we were literally blown away by the large gathering of Bottisham people who had turned up to pay their respects to Dad and our family. I knew Dad was extremely respected and loved from within his own community, but in that moment, it really hit home how much. As a family will be eternally grateful to you all.

Dad was a massive part of Bottisham and its history. Only in October when the Cresset was pushed through his door, he said to me, “See that photograph of the old shop Mike”, referring to the front cover picture, “that's the exact place where I was standing when Jim Bendall said to me, “Dick boy, we're at War”. He was referring of course to the start of World War 2. What a recollection?! Nothing wrong with your memory I thought.

Dad was born in a cottage on Lode Road in 1926; it was one of a pair of cottages opposite the village college which have long since gone. Dad would recall how the road to Lode was nothing more than a dusty track in those days. Times were hard and being the youngest of 5 children Nanna and Grandad's priority was putting food on the table. As a child he would spend his days playing any sport he could, scrumping in the vast orchards of the village and swimming in the Swaffham Rivers. I bet lots of people reading this now would not realise that at the little humpbacked bridge to Swaffham Bulbeck, there used to be a river big enough to swim in.

Dad's school was next to the church, I can only imagine the range of emotions he must have felt when we took him back to the school for a slap-up Italian meal in the then Il Piccolo Mondo restaurant, which it had become by his 87th birthday. He had a tear in his eye and even bigger one when the bill turned up!

After his schooling, the opportunity of work was limited, Dad was a highly intelligent chap and at school he had been the equivalent of a Head Boy, (dear Audrey Rowe was the Head Girl). Determined to better himself he would cycle into Cambridge where he studied Aviation engineering at night school. When war came, he had to do his National service and was posted to faraway lands such as Egypt and Palestine serving in the Engineers.

My Grandad was one of 9 children born in the white Bodec cottages in Tunbridge lane. While grandad stayed in Bottisham his whole life, 3 of his brothers left Bottisham and went to Canada in the early 1900's in search of “The New World”. This was something Dad liked the sound of. When the war had finished, he decided to go to Canada and the United States

to see his Uncles and this “New World” he had heard so much about. He liked what he saw and stayed for over 7 years, mainly living in Regina and Moosejaw in Saskatchewan also Toronto in Ontario. He spent a lot of time in the U.S in 1955 travelling all over New England and right down the east coast to Daytona in Florida, he loved his time in Vermont New England, recalling how a friend would fly him in a plane over a beautiful lake called “Lake Champlain”. I love that name, a place I now have a huge desire to go and see for myself.

Dad had a huge passion for music, especially Jazz and in 1955 he saw Ella Fitzgerald, Count Basie, and Louis Armstrong at the Famous Birdland Jazz Club in New York City.

On Dad's return to Bottisham he started a new career path and became a sales representative for Hoover selling a potentially new revolutionary product called a Vacuum cleaner. It proved to be a great success and Dad did very well. A few years later he was approached to go and work for another well-known British company, Raleigh, selling bicycles this time. As you can imagine selling bikes in Cambridge was not much trouble and Dad's sales were extremely good. He finished his working life at Falcon cycles retiring at 65.

In 1957 Dad met mum at a dance in Ruthin, North Wales and after a short while convinced her to leave her Welsh home and brought her back to Bottisham, where they soon married and raised their family of 5 children.

Dad also had a huge passion and desire for sports, namely Cricket, Golf, Tennis, Cycling and Football. My Brothers and I were encouraged to play and try them all with Dad supporting keenly. He loved his Cricket and had many happy years playing for Bottisham, great times with incredible characters and friends, none more so than Andrew Martin, without doubt one of Bottisham’s favourite sons.

After losing Mum in 2007 Dad continued living at the family home even embracing modern technology; he loved his laptop computer and Sky TV with sports from all over the world. I recall once remarking that he looked a bit tired, he said he had been staying up until 3 in the morning for about a week watching the Australian Open Tennis from Melbourne. “Haven’t you been watching it Mike? It’s terrific!” “Errrr no Dad I’ve got work” was my reply!!

Even now it feels so strange walking into the house and not hearing Ella Fitzgerald, Frank Sinatra and Louis Armstrong blasting out on YouTube.

Ultimately Dad ran a great race, batted a terrific, steady innings with flashes of brilliance but fell just short of his Ton! We are all honoured to have shared and to have been a part of his innings but above all, we are all extremely proud to call this Bottisham Boy ... Richard Bowyer Bradford our father.

After the most horrible and strange year for everybody, when the sun shines again and when we all feel safe to do so, we will be arranging a memorial service in the Church that Dad loved so much to celebrate a life well lived. This will be followed by a “knees up” with all of Dad’s friends at the Legion, sharing their stories of Dad whilst listening to some of his favourite music.

Public Transport Matters

A different sort of Christmas. I hope that you all enjoyed the festive season despite the limitations. Public transport has been badly affected by the lockdown with many companies suffering loss of income. As I have mentioned previously, the reopening of schools meant some coach companies now had work and the Government has been handing out payments to rail companies.

Eurostar has asked for the same support from the Government that aviation industries receive. Eurostar says it is fighting for survival and feels it is at a disadvantage compared with aviation. Airports have received rates relief.

Bus routes between Newmarket and Cambridge are some of the most requested according to a survey done by East Cambs. District Council and which received more than 1,000 responses, which included Burwell and Bottisham to Cambridge and Isleham to Newmarket. Usage of the buses is now very low due to the present situation as regards the virus. People are staying at home, using their cars and many are working from home.

The local papers regularly have articles on the plans for the new Metro system and recently there have been the naming of 5 non- executive directors. A vision of how it should be organised was set out and then revised. 1.5 billion pounds for this transport system is the expected cost not 1.5 million as first published. Some people are asking for a rethink mentioning just better ordinary bus routes would be cheaper and quicker. I have missed the free little bus that used to go round the centre of Cambridge.

The Weatherby rail crossing in Newmarket has been retained after a successful campaign. Shippea Hill near Ely had the lowest number of station visits in Cambridgeshire with just 164 visits in the year to March 2020 but the previous year it was 432. Cambridge had the highest daily number with 21,580 exits and entries. It is followed by Huntingdon, St.Neots and Cambridge North.

Taxpayers will be hit with a 4 billion pounds bill to keep the half empty trains on the rails due to the pandemic. It is suggested that trains might stop twice hourly between Newmarket and Cambridge not just once and there was a consultation in December. James Palmer is lobbying for more capacity at Ely North and Ely stations - 11 not 8 trains an hour.

Crossrail is delayed and paying millions for train drivers. They carry out tests on the 13-mile tunnel section through central London. Network Rail has promised to plant tens of thousands of trees honouring a pledge to the Daily Mail.

Richard Goodwin has published an interesting book on the history of London's stations.





HAPPY NEW YEAR EVERYBODY!

It's not too often that Bottisham can celebrate having a national champion in our midst, so may I kick off 2021 by offering heartfelt congratulations to "local" boy Neil Robertson for his magnificent triumph in the UK Snooker Championship in December. Playing snooker of the very highest calibre, as he has now done since turning professional in 2006, the current world no.3 took on world no.1 Judd Trump, in a gruelling final which endured to the last frame with the score at 9-9. A gritty tactical battle stretched into the small hours of the next morning and, with both players spent like punch-drunk warriors, Robertson finally profited from an uncharacteristic error by Trump who missed a very gettable pink with victory in sight. This was an epic sporting event of tension, drama and breathtaking skills... such a shame that the only audience was watching on TV. Let us hope that the coming year allows us to enjoy the atmosphere of packed arenas in all sports once again.

Coincidentally, that final took place on the very weekend that saw spectators in domestic football matches for the first time since last March and this was a happy modicum of progress for nearly everyone. But there was a somewhat disconcerting furore over the crowd at the Millwall-Derby match which booed the players for the now customary 'taking of the knee' before the game. (By the way, the same thing happened at a number of other grounds, too, but those were under-reported in favour of an easier target at Millwall.) Social media was alive afterwards with players, managers, league officials, The FA, broadcasters and journalists crying, "Racists!" But I'm not sure it's as simple as that, is it?

No-one can argue against the propriety of sports people using their high profiles to oppose racism and other discriminator behaviours, but it seems the 'knee' gesture is beginning to wear a little thin with the general public now, particularly in view of its association with the controversial Black Lives Matter movement. The football authorities have already dropped slogans overtly supporting BLM and they would do well to consider whether to continue the knee-taking before stadiums return to full capacity. Just imagine the hullabaloo if crowds of 50,000 plus start voicing their objections (as opposed to the 2,000 at Millwall)!

Another issue that polarises contemporary opinion is whether Lewis Hamilton is a national treasure who should be regarded as our greatest sportsman, worthy of an immediate knighthood, or a virtue-signalling tax avoider who wins only because he is driving the best car in Formula 1. I guess the answer is, as always, somewhere between the two extremes, but I would say – as I did of Bradley Wiggins back in 2013 – that surely it makes sense to allow someone to finish their career before bestowing the ultimate accolade upon them!

At the time of writing, Hamilton's latest Grand Prix victory came in Bahrain, where Frenchman Romain Grosjean made an extraordinary escape from his burning car after a terrifying 137mph crash. Whilst everyone was left marvelling at the effectiveness of the controversial "Halo" head protection, there were also concerns over the failures of both the crash-barrier and the car, which had unexpectedly broken in half and burst into flames, trapping the driver for 30 seconds. The fact that Grosjean suffered only minor burns and is

well on his way to a full recovery, is testament to the enormous steps in F1 safety achieved over the last couple of decades, but it's worth recognising that the biggest steps are always taken in the aftermath of tragic accidents when research efforts are redoubled to improve future safety. Respect to all the top drivers for risking their lives on a monthly basis in the pursuit of sporting excellence.

Talking of safety, I was disappointed to see 'Iron' Mike Tyson join the long list boxers who attempted to defy Father Time by returning to the ring after years of retirement. Admittedly it was only an exhibition bout for the 54-year-old, against Roy Jones Jr, 51, and it was described in the press as an "engaging draw". However, one really has to doubt the sanity of the two pugilists taking such risks with their health and, equally, doubt the integrity of the authorities who sanctioned this folly. You don't suppose this was all about the dirty Dollar, do you? Fortunately, no apparent damage was suffered by either party and I must say I chuckled at the comment of Rap artist Snoop Dog who, in his capacity of celebrity ringside commentator, observed "It was like two of my uncles fighting at a barbecue"!

However, it would be churlish not to recognise the immense talents and achievements of this extraordinary man – a flawed genius if ever there was one. His legacy, surely though, is a clear illustration that a very clever footballer is not necessarily the same thing as a great sportsman!

“Protected land will be just that...” - but can we count on it?

Firstly welcome to 2021 and may we see a noticeable recovery in all aspects of our personal and national life. And let's not forget several lovely characters from our village sadly no longer with us.

And so to the main topic: ...“pleasant open countryside being of ‘high’ landscape value.” This is how a Government Inspector described the meadow and the countryside beyond at the eastern end of the village at the time it was given the protection of Green Belt status. Much of our village countryside also sits within the Village Conservation Area and outside of the Development Envelope or Settlement Boundary, all of which may well become potential profit for predatory land owners if our planning officers cave in.

I wonder then how many of you know of or have even heard of the Green Belt, the Development Envelope or even the Conservation Area? Maybe many of you have, but are you familiar with the limitations they impose on what you can or cannot do on or to your property? All of these planning designations offer protection status to certain areas of land in the village and to the properties built thereon and or therein. The aim is to curb both property and land owners from inappropriate development or alteration, including even replacement windows, without formal planning approval. Moreover the objective is to ensure that these heritage and countryside assets are preserved and remain permanently open for future generations to enjoy; after all hasn't the openness and accessibility to our surrounding countryside been an absolute godsend to us over recent months. Unlike some villages roundabout we are fortunate to have three levels of protection we can count on – or can we?

If you happen to notice the Planning applications that appear in the Cresset you may have observed some applications seeking retrospective planning approval for development and or change of land use already carried out in one or more of these protected areas. In some cases transformations have taken place under perceived Permitted Development Rights known as PDR. Outside of protected areas the first you get to know about PDR development is when or after it has happened. And with PDR you have no right to prior planning consultation consequently; you could be subjected to a loss of amenity due to the dominance of a new building or the loss of an outlook (not view) as well as a number of statutory nuisances. Should there be a change of land use you might well be subjected to statutory nuisances such as noise, unsociable working hours, fires, parking issues and such like. But in a protected area any structural or land alteration, including PDR, must seek formal planning approval first!

So what defines these three levels of protection and what can or can't you do on or to your property?

Let's first look at the Development Envelope: DE's essentially protect the open countryside and agricultural land resources beyond from development, and conserve the

character and landscape setting and promote sustainability.

Conservation Areas are defined as “areas of special architectural or historic interest, the character or appearance of which it is desirable to preserve and enhance”. Bottisham’s CA extends circa fifty meters along either side of the High Street from First Copy in the east to Holly Cottage (opposite Rank’s Garage) in the west. Crucially it removes owners’ rights to do works to their properties and or land without first obtaining planning permission. Owners must also give notice of their intention to carry out works to, amongst other things, trees and hedges.

Green Belt land takes the form of a protected ring of countryside around villages, towns and cities. The fundamental aim of the GB is to prevent urban sprawl by keeping GB land permanently open. Development is not approved except in ‘very special circumstances’.

A recent example of a ‘grab’ on the village’s protected areas is the proposed ‘Retirement Village with Affordable Homes’ - purported by the applicant to be a ‘very special circumstance’. If the planners support this and go against Local Plan policies then very little will be left of the working meadows and open countryside adorning this village, along with the loss of a biodiversity and the natural habitats it supports and protects.

“Preserve and enhance” is the conservation ethos. I am therefore somewhat bewildered that the East Cambs Conservation Officer does not consider the preservation and safeguarding of landscapes and green open spaces in protected areas part of his ‘Conservation’ remit – to quote; “I am a building conservationist, and I largely confine my observations to the physical impacts of proposals”. So having no objection to creating gaping great holes in ancient hedgerow in the High Street and allowing access and service roads across ‘high landscape value’ open countryside has no adverse conservation impact as long as buildings aren’t affected - really?

Hopefully you can appreciate just how important it is to get to know where these protected areas are and how their protection status can help you contest wrongful and or inappropriate expansion. As guardians of our heritage, perhaps we should take on a collective responsibility to ensure we protect these special areas for future generations rather than be guided by apathy!


