



CLERK AND RESPONSIBLE FINANCIAL OFFICER TO BOTTISHAM PARISH COUNCIL

Applications are invited for the above position in a village of 1750 electors. This is a home-based permanent position for an average of 12 hours/week (work-load will vary over the year, so flexibility will be required). Equipment is provided and a home working allowance.

The salary is aligned with national pay scales and pro-rata ranges from £6997-£8706/annum, dependent on experience and qualifications. However there may be flexibility beyond this for the right person.

Key features of the role are:

- Preparation of agendas for Parish Council meetings in conjunction with the Chair and taking of
 minutes, together with comprehensive administrative support. Meetings are held on the first
 Monday evening of each month (excluding August and on bank holidays when the meeting is
 held on a Tuesday).
- Attendance and provision of administrative support to Parish Council Committees/work-groups and the Annual Parish Meeting.
- Responsibility for making all payments, the financial records of the Council and the careful administration of its finances, including audit. You will be required to store Parish Council records and documents securely.
- 4. Managing the cemeteries and grass-cutting around the village.
- Advising the Parish Council on observance of good practice, Council standing orders and legal requirements.
- The primary administrative point of contact and correspondent with residents and external bodies.

The candidate will be expected to work towards the CILCA qualification for Parish Clerks (if not already qualified), for which the Council will provide support. You will need to be personally approachable with strong communication and organisational skills and be self-motivated. A working knowledge of local government procedures is desirable, although not essential.

The successful candidate will commence employment on 1st December 2022 and work alongside the current Clerk for 2 weeks.

The PC however can take no credit or blame for the weather recently! At the time of writing the ground is scorched, we have had grass fires and more, very close to our houses. The conflagration immediately behind our house was frighteningly fierce. Fortunately, a North wind and the quick response from three fire engines got it under control very quickly. Thank goodness for our fire brigade. Another unsung group of heroes.

The rainfall has been virtually nil over July and August and I can only hope that by the time you read this, we have had something to dampen down the fire threat and to bring the ground back to life, to say nothing of the need to refill our empty reservoirs threatening the supply of water to our houses.

The problem is further exacerbated by the fact that when it does rain the ground will be unable to soak it up and so we will have flash floods.

This summer has really brought to mind the things that we just take for granted. Like turning on the tap in the kitchen and getting pure clear water. To date we are not yet in the situation of having standpipes in the street, but unless we get a lot of rain over this winter, not only for immediate supply, but to refill those reservoirs, we may be in a worse situation next summer.

The reality is that we take things for granted so much. There are many parts of the world where drought and lack of what we regard as basic necessities is the norm. We immediately think of Africa, but parts of every continent from Asia to South America and Australia can go for months without a single drop of rain and many without the power of electricity to pump water out of the ground. Yet they survive. It is just that we have not yet come to accept any lowering of our 'standards'. We, or more realistically, the future generations that follow will one day need to.

If that situation had been mooted 300 years ago, it would have had the same response as if it was 3,000, or 30,000 years ago. "What's the problem". It is only since the industrial revolution in that brief history of man, have we brought about what may surely one day be our downfall.

UNLESS, and this is the positive note I end on like so many others, WE ACT NOW. Not only reduce our carbon footprint, but eliminate it, and it can be done, but it will need 'painful' changes.

The family would like to thank everyone who came to Dorothy York's funeral at Lode Church on 9th August and who came afterwards to Bottisham Sports and Social club. We were all very touched to see so many people there and by the many lovely messages of condolence that we have received. I would also like to thank Mum and Dad's friends and neighbours for the friendship and help that they have given to me, especially over the last couple of years.

Mum was born in Worthing and moved to Portsmouth when she was 4. She met my father, Ken, at a New Year's Eve dance and married him 7 months later, in August 1948. However, in their case it wasn't a case of "marry in haste, repent at leisure" as they went on to have 71 happy years together until my father died in April 2020. They celebrated milestone anniversaries with at least one party or lunch, the most recent of which was their 70th anniversary in 2018 which was celebrated with an afternoon tea for 70 people in Bottisham Sports and Social club.

When our family moved to Bottisham in 1964 Mum and Dad found life in a village was rather different from the one that they had left behind in Portsmouth. Over the years Mum took part in classes at Bottisham Village College including flower arranging, basket making and needlework. Mum continued with her needlework classes until she was well into her 80s and she was very proud to tell people that she had made most of the clothes in her wardrobe.

In their later years the Bottisham Gardening Club was an important part of Mum and Dad's social life. Not only the meetings, shows and day trips but also the many happy holidays that they spent with their friends from Bottisham, Lode and the surrounding area. The annual garden show was quite an event and even into old age both Mum and Dad would try to enter as many categories as possible.

Mum spent the last couple of years of her life in Queens Court in Bottisham and the COVID restrictions made this a particularly difficult time. However, we were able to take her out to some village activities – the last of these was to celebrate the Queens Jubilee in June. She is now at rest and is buried with Dad in Bottisham churchyard as she wished.

Parish Council Report

I trust you will have managed to find some enjoyment in the warm and desert like conditions that are currently prevailing as I write these notes in early August. Our family holiday end of July in Northumberland and Scotland was wonderful. However, the weather was rather mixed and the temperature rarely went above 20 degrees Centigrade!! So we watched with some delight as the temperature steadily climbed on the drive back south albeit we arrived home to a very brown lawn. It may be that we have had a hose-pipe ban imposed by the time you read this.

We are informed that these unusual weather conditions are very likely a consequence of human activities. Trees play a vital role in combating climate change and, in recognition of this, the Council is supporting the Queen's Platinum Jubilee Green Canopy initiative https://queensgreencanopy.org - which encourages the planting of trees across the nation. To that end we have made enquiry of Highways as to whether we may plant a flowering cherry on the public green space in front of 76-78 High St in celebration of the Jubilee. Anglesey Abbey is appreciated and visited by many residents and we are also in discussion about sponsoring the planting of a tree on the estate there.

Another Jubilee Green Canopy project we are supporting is "Copse-in-a-Box". You may have seen a letter from Cllr van Someren in the July/August Cresset (P.23) describing how he will be receiving a box of tree seedlings that he will initially 'foster-parent' in his garden. He will then be asking residents to come and collect them to plant in their own gardens and around the village where appropriate. Please contact Cllr van Someren laurie.vansomeren@bottisham-pc.gov.uk if you are interested in learning more.

Sadly, I have to report that, having passed a certain birthday this year entitling him to a government pension, we will be losing Jonathan Giles as our Clerk at the end of this year. In the time he has been with us Jonathan has made a tremendous contribution and we will be very sorry to lose him - although we fully understand his desire to finally "hang up his boots". We are commencing seeking a replacement and you will see an advert in this magazine. Please would you consider if you, or someone you know, might be a suitable candidate. It is a very diverse and interesting role and, being part-time, many Clerks are able to fit it in with other part-time posts, including acting as Clerk for other parishes. Please contact me or the Clerk if you would like to find out more about the role.

You may be aware that we have also been seeking to fill three vacancies on the Parish Council. I am pleased to be able to report that Mark Overton joined the Council in July and I hope that by the time you read this we may have filled another vacancy. However, that still leaves us with one more vacancy to be filled. If you are reading this, please do consider if you might be able to support your community by joining the Council. We need the support of residents if we are to continue growing a great village to live in.

benefits on time and within budget will also be considered. Further information will be found on www.eastcambs.gov.uk/business/east-cambridgeshire-growth-and-infrastructure-fund

We continue to receive complaints about missed bin collections. The Chief Executive has recently updated Councillors about the bin collections. The service still remains vulnerable to short term absence of key operational staff. Work is now beginning to identify a pool of external capacity for now and in the future. More fundamentally, the team is assessing the requirement for permanent in-house additional resources.

External management consultancy is now in place, to review the reconfiguration and stabilise back-office systems, as well as long term changes to terms and conditions of staff and working arrangements.

We have made considerable progress on engaging with staff and their trade union representatives. Work will now begin on a fundamental review of the terms and conditions of staff and working arrangements, together with the appropriate consultation. It is expected that this will be concluded by autumn this year.

A report prepared in October 2021 for local planning authorities in Cambridgeshire and West Suffolk says that from 2020 to 2040, 215 more East Cambridgeshire households each year will need affordable housing to rent. Of these homes, 75% should be social rent and 25% affordable rent. This compares to a need for 39 additional properties for affordable home ownership each year.

Over the last ten years, East Cambridgeshire has seen an increase in median house prices of 55.4% compared to 27.6% nationally, and 42.5% regionally. Median rental prices in the private rented sector across East Cambridgeshire were £795 per calendar month at the time of the report. This was higher than the national equivalent of £695 and the same as the regional equivalent.

The median house price in East Cambridgeshire was £290,998. This was 27% above the national average and 3% above the regional average.

The report noted that there was a current (282) and projected (697) need for about 979 wheelchair user dwellings to 2040 across East Cambridgeshire.

The Council underspent its £14.3M budget by £2.4M in 2021/22. A large proportion of the underspend was due to receipt of COVID-related government grants.

The Council spent only around 10% of its capital budget—just £480,750 which is an underspend of £4,279,694. Some of the key components of this underspend are


- Waste vehicles—delayed while we await Government's Waste Strategy.
- Depot—refurbishment delayed to re-assess proposals.
- Disability Facilities Grant—reduced spending due to COVID restrictions.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Peter,

Thank you for all you do each month in editing and publishing The Cresset - it is so appreciated by residents and the Parish Council.

I am writing, though, because the Council were a little surprised by the comment in your last month's editorial that implied there was "no involvement" by the Parish Council in the organisation of the Platinum Jubilee events - which I recognise could be simply a misunderstanding. While it is not the direct responsibility of the Council to run events like these, we did in fact make a not insignificant contribution to the celebrations and am writing to clarify these.

If we take a step back just for clarity. When the question of the Jubilee came up, we were short of three councillors and were facing two major projects this spring i.e., the retirement village appeal and the run-up to the planning application for the new cemetery. We discussed and agreed that, given it was not specifically within our direct remit to organise the Jubilee events, the best way to use our stretched resources was to encourage and support residents' own initiatives. In January 2022 we reached out to all residents, inviting them to help organise/support the running of street parties etc. Posters were placed in the CO-OP, Pharmacy and the Doctors Surgery and also on the Bottisham Community Facebook page. We were grateful that the Parochial Church Council "took up the baton" to organise a community event and Cllr Cundell met with their organising committee on behalf of the Council. She was able to support the day with publicity, including encouraging residents to bake a cake and bring village-life photographs for the exhibition. Her time was also given up gathering raffle donations from the likes of the CO-OP and Classic Spice and from other residents.

The bunting which residents would have seen around the triangle, along the shop fronts, and on all entrances into Bottisham was purchased by the Parish Council and Cllr Cundell, along with a couple of other volunteers, put it all up. The Parish Council also purchased banners promoting the Jubilee Celebrations that you may have seen on the triangle and outside the Church and my wife contributed hand-made bunting to the garden party. It was great to see, on social media, all the pictures from the weekend but, just as importantly, the comments on how lovely Bottisham looked.

The Council also investigated various options around tree planting in support of the Platinum Jubilee Queens Green Canopy initiative (https://queensgreencanopy.org). We agreed to purchase a Royal Burgundy (flowering cherry) tree and are awaiting consent from Highways to plant it this autumn on the green space in front of 76-78 High Street. We felt this was a good way to mark this very special once-in-a-lifetime event and have a plaque to commemorate the occasion. It would be good, when planting happens, to promote it in The Cresset and generate some interest for people to come along and see.

The Council is also in touch with Anglesey Abbey, with a view to sponsoring the planting of a tree there and a few locations are in discussion along with the type of tree. Cllr van Someren is also pursuing the "Copse-in a Box" initiative in support of the Platinum Jubilee appeal that he advertised in last month's Cresset.

You will see me commenting on these "tree" initiatives in my Cresset Notes for this next edition.

Given the above, I would be grateful if you could correct the perhaps rather negative impression you gave of the Parish Council when writing this next month's editorial.



In June, on a hot afternoon in the cool of Lode Church members enjoyed a social afternoon of flower arranging with summer flowers. Members brought along flowers and foliage from their gardens and everyone used their artistic skill to make up their arrangement. Some stories were exchanged of where their flower container/vase had originated from: purchased at a holiday destination: passed down from a relative: a favourite container of sentimental value.

At our July meeting two new members, Carol Kitson and Marion Jackaman were enrolled by Jo Wibberly, MU Archdeaconry Vice President, Cambridge.

Our guest speaker Stuart Field gave us a very interesting presentation 'From a mining village to Buckingham Palace – A medical journey'. Stuart, a Consultant Radiologist,

retired in 2004, thinking he would be taking things easy, but soon became Chairperson for the League of Friends Kent & Canterbury Hospital. Having moved to Bottisham in 2020 he has recently taken on the busy role of Church Warden at Holy Trinity Church.

Stuart led us through his journey from place of birth in the small village or Ashby de la Zouch to Buckingham Palace with accompanying powerpoint presentation. His birthplace being in the centre of Leicestershire, Derbyshire and Staffordshire coal mines. In 1947 the family moved to Bushy with his father's job, but Stuart continued to visit relatives in Moira only 2.5 miles from his birthplace. His mother was one of 11 children, all boys were miners and girls married miners except of Stuart's mother who married an RAF serviceman. Stuart had recently visited his 92year-old Aunt in Moira, and showed us photographs to compare the Canal and Furnace as it was in 1947 and how it looks today restored to a museum. Having worked hard at school he progressed to Gramma School and becoming an accomplished violin player. Stuart was awarded a Royal Academy of Music Junior exhibition, and travelling by cycle, bus and train each Saturday to the Academy. In 1956 the family moved to Watford which made it easier for his journey to school and the Academy. Stuart attended Gonville & Caius College Cambridge, and went on to study medicine at Kings College Hospital Medical School qualifying in 1969. Here he met his wife, Maggie and they married in his final year. Stuart decided to specialise in Radiotherapy, and was appointed Consultant Radiologist at Canterbury and Thanet Health District in 1974. Having completed special studies on Plain Abdominal X-ray, Stuart was asked to write chapters on the subject in various medical books. By this time Stuart had become well



In July we had an interesting talk on the history of salt by Helen Green. She had lived in Northwich for most of her life and had been a volunteer with the salt museum there. She explained that there had been an inland sea over Cheshire which had evaporated leaving a very thick layer of rock salt. The industry grew originally from salt being extracted from the underground springs, the brine was boiled and left to dry and the crystals were then used for the preservation of food, tanning of hides and glaze for pottery. There were many family businesses, but with coal being used for the fires and the industry expanding, the brine pits were exhausted and collapsed into the ground taking the houses with them. Because of this there is very little archeological evidence left. Fortunately, there is an extremely thick layer of rock salt underground which is extensively mined and has resulted in the many chemical industries in the North West around Runcorn.


Salt is used for textile dyes, ceramics, caustic soda and in the pharmaceutical industry and during cold snaps (do you remember them!) for de-icing our roads.

Community Herb Beds

With the drought and hot weather that we have had in July and August, keeping regular watering of our annual and tender young herbs was an important challenge, especially as some of us had family events and holidays during this period. My thanks go to all of our volunteers for their help this past several weeks. Hopefully by the time

you read this, we may have received some much needed rain. I hope that you will look to see what we have growing by the village sign and take a snip for your meals if you would like to.

OUR HERB OF THE MONTH FOR SEPTEMBER IS BASIL.

Basil is another member of the mint family and is a tender herb, native to tropical regions from central Africa to southeast. In temperate countries, it is treated as an annual.

Growing - Basil is easy to grow from seed, indoors in spring. you can also grow it from young plants bought in supermarkets. This will give you harvests through the summer months. There are various varieties of Basil, including a rather lovely purple basil. We have been gifted some seedlings by a local resident, so when they are ready, we will add some to the herb beds.

Storage - Once picked, use the leaves straight away, alternatively try placing a bunch into a small jar or vase of water that will fit into the fridge. Cover the top of the basil with a plastic bag and keep it up to a week, by freshening the water. Otherwise try treating the leaves like salad greens. Pick them and they them on layers of kitchen towel.

Roll up the paper towel and put it into a plastic bag, which should keep the basil fresh, but won't wet it.

Lastly, you could try freezing basil, by laying clean, dry leaves on a baking tray. Freeze them until frozen, then transfer the frozen leaves into a freezer bag or tub.

Recipe. Jan recommends this delicious sounding soup, that I intend to try.

GREEN PEA, BASIL AND COCONUT SOUP

a bunch of spring onions 1kg frozen peas

1/2 vegetable stock cube

1 lemon

1 teaspoon coconut oil

1 x 400ml tin coconut milk

a bunch of basil

- 1. Chop the spring onions finely and put into a pan which has a lid, along with the coconut oil. Cook for 2 mins until softened.
- 2. Add the peas to the pan with the coconut milk, stock cube and 750ml of boiling water. Put the lid on and bring to the boil.

 Simmer for 2-3 mins.
- Take off the heat and add the basil, stalks and all and the juice of the lemon.
- 4. Use a stick blender to blitz the soup until super smooth.

Public Transport Matters

Stagecoach have now put a very basic version of the local timetable at the bus stops. It just gives departure times and the final destination but as most people probably use it to go to Newmarket not Bury it is not so useful. Stagecoach just say that it is all on the web and at least it has departure times. The many local government plans for various schemes are still ongoing as I said last month. Again, it is all on the web - the Local plan.

Developments at the local Marshalls site are raising concerns. It is not thought that the local transport can cope with the increased pressure. There are various plans but nothing positive. These things seem to take so long as various people have to be consulted and agree.

There are plans for an extended bus service to go out of the city and perhaps towards Newmarket as do the 11 and 12. The Greater Cambridgeshire Partnership has plans as I have mentioned over the past months. The Mill Road bridge closure has also gone back for discussion again.

Stagecoach report increased numbers on the buses as hopefully Covid has lessened.

There is also now the LTCP - The Local Transport and Connectivity Plan.

Cambridge is lagging behind on electric buses.

There are objections to the proposed Cambourne and Bourn busway plan particularly from local farmers. The guided busway is being reviewed after a tragic death on the section between the Cambridge railway station and Long Road.

Cambridge has missed out on some national funding for bus transport, but it is hoped local transport can be improved.

The railway workers strikes made things difficult for people trying to get to work. The various rail links are all still under review. Train line is back on track as bookings and tourism surge.

A call has been made to reopen the rail line between Cambridge and Haverhill which was closed in the Beeching times. Our local MPs are supporting it.

There are some anti HS2 protesters living in a tunnel near the Bluebell woods by Swynnerton in Staffordshire.

The Ely junction is under consideration for improvement but that there are worries that the plan could be scrapped by the Government. It links 5 lines - Norwich, Ipswich, Cambridge, Peterborough and King's Lynn. Waterbeach residents do not want their station to be moved because of the proposed new development.

Channel tunnel traffic is nearly back to pre-pandemic levels.

Heritage steam trains say they never go on strike and encourage us to use them.


As a rule, these articles comprise information, appeals and 'thank yous' - not in any particular order! - this is no different.

Thoughts of a Sports Nut

Well, Football finally 'came home' on 31st July when the magnificent Lionesses, led by outstanding Dutch manager Sarina Wiegman, defeated Germany 2-1 in the Women's Euro 2022 Championship Final. Or did it? I dare say the women players may be as fed up as I am over the continual media comparisons with men's football! There is no doubt that, on this occasion, the England team was the most skillful, most cohesive, best prepared, and most determined in the Tournament and deserve all the accolades – not to mention financial rewards and the opening up of a world of opportunities for women and girls – that come their way. However, no-one has broken goalscoring records in men's football and this victory, historic though it is, does NOT end the so-called '56 years of hurt' that applies to men's national team! This kind of comparative rivalry does not gain any traction in other sports, so please everyone, let us accept that Women's football is a different sport that has arrived at the 'big time' and embrace it for its own special sake. And, yes, it would be great if football could be accessible to all girls in school in future, but let's remember that football is not the only sport!

The other major sporting events and stories of the early summer seem so long ago, now, but I would like to share with you a few moments that stuck in my Nutty mind...

Fresh from a ripping 3-0 series win over New Zealand, the new-look England cricket team took on India on 1st July in the outstanding Test match that was postponed last year (when the Indians suddenly decided that they would be safer from Covid if they played in the Indian Premier League instead!). 2-1 up in the series, India expected their first innings lead of 132 to put the series safely beyond doubt, as they set England a nigh-on impossible fourth innings target of 378. Enter, Messrs Root and Bairstow, continuing their destructive form from the annihilation of the Kiwis... a truly amazing fourth wicket stand of 269 was all it took to give England a 7-wicket victory. The win was all the more satisfying for the pictures of exskipper Virat Kohli smiling through gritted teeth at the end, having waged a nasty war of words on the English players throughout the game. By contrast, the gracious attitude of the Kiwis had already reminded us that sport doesn't have to be that way, and I think Kohli has probably played his last Test for India now, having failed to score a century for three years!

Joe Root, incidentally, has scored 12 hundreds in that time, and he gave a lovely self-effacing interview after the match, in which he declared, "We were ruthless... something that we might have lacked in recent times, especially under my leadership. Now we've got someone who knows what they're doing it's way better innit?" And Ben Stokes – now with four wins out of four under his leadership – underlined his take on things: "Sometimes teams will be better than us, but no-one will be braver than us."

I have to admit to finding this year's Wimbledon somewhat overshadowed by some irritations... Semi-finalist Simona Halep's grunting on every stroke became ultra-tedious and Rafa Nadal's fidgeting before every serve was so distracting, I actually switched channel to watch the test card! (Joke – obviously – but who remembers that?!) Then there was the disgraceful behaviour of men's finalist Nick Kyrgios, described by former champion Pat Cash: "He's brought tennis to the lowest level I can see as far as gamesmanship, cheating, manipulation, abuse, aggressive behaviour... something's got to be done." I'm no fan of Djokovic, but thank goodness he put the Australian in his place in the final. The

tournament's highlight, of course, was Cameron Norrie, now World No.10, progressing to the semi-final, but our delight is matched by the disappointment of another early (second round) exit by Emma Raducanu, who currently seems a shadow of the player who won the US Open last year. 'Too much too young', perhaps..?

Unsurprisingly there were plenty of highlights for the 'home' nations in the Commonwealth Games, not least Laura Kenny's unexpected gold medal in the Scratch Race after a difficult year on and off the bike. But THE moment, has to be Eilish McColgan emulating her mother by taking the 10,000 metres title after overtaking Kenyan Irine Cheptai on sheer will power in the final straight. Please find it online if you haven't seen it. Watch in awe and think of Rudyard Kipling's words below!

I must admit another, unexpected, highlight for me was the diving competition. Even though I am baffled by the scoring system, I'm sure we can all happily observe the size of the splash, which seems to have the major bearing on the points awarded. And the jubilant England team rounded off my new favourite event nicely when they all belly-flopped into the pool to celebrate their 15 medals (including six gold)! And watch out for double gold medalist Andrea Spendolini-Sirieix (daughter of the famous Fred) in future... a certainty for stardom with a name like that!

While we were awaiting the Games, there was a lovely moment in British athletics in June (also involving a proud, famous father) when 29-year-old Elliot Thompson, son of Francis Morgan Ayodélé Thompson CBE, won the National Decathlon title in his last competition as a professional before taking a new job in IT. He laughed off any suggestion of a coaching relationship with his father though, in his words, "...an awful coach because everything came naturally to him"!

There were other touching moments in the Tour de France this year. Slovenian Tadej Pogačar came into the race as reigning champion and hot favourite to retain his yellow jersey, but the Dane, Jonas Vingegaard, who finished second in 2021, nicked a couple of minutes when Pogačar had a bad day in the mountains on Stage 11 and used his Jumbo Visma team - including the super-strong-man Wout Van Aert – to protect his lead all the way to Paris. Vingegaard was undoubtedly the best rider, overall, and he won two mountain stages himself to cement his overall lead; but what stood out in sporting terms was the enormous respect between the top two in three weeks of epic competition. When Pogačar crashed on a tricky descent on Stage 18, Vingegaard even sat up and waited so they could have a 'fair' race to the finish (which the Dane won). And Pogačar was 'graciousness' personified at the end of each day's racing as he congratulated his opponent with smiles and man-hugs. Shouldn't all sport be like this?

2022 was a notable year for the Tour de France Femme, too... an eight-day stage race for the first time. 39-year-old Dutch veteran, Annemiek van Vleuten, proved herself the strongest in this historic Tour to crown a glittering career on the road, including numerous National and World Road Race and Time Trial championships, three Giro d'Italia Donne titles, and several of the one-day 'Monuments'. I wonder what she will add to her palmarès before her farewell next year? Good luck to a great champion.

Final Curtain!

Bottisham Players has officially been wound down after a considerable period of inactivity, and a Final Curtain party was held on 16th July in the Poppy Room. A number of past members attended and shared memories, photos and programmes, as well as refreshments and cake.

Sadly, several key Players have died in the past 10 years or so and were fondly remembered by those who were able to be at the Final Curtain party.

There is a considerable history of local entertainment taking place in Bottisham. The earliest I am aware of is the Village College Dramatic Society which began in the 1940s performing Gilbert and Sullivan musicals with members of the College and local community, and I have photos of some of these productions handed on to me by the late Sylvia Bedford. Amongst other productions, Arms and the Man was performed in March 1950, and the cast were mostly members of staff at the College. The Bottisham Operatic Group continued with musical productions and opera whilst the drama group subsequently became The Playmakers. I have a programme (priced 2/6d!) for Doctor in the House performed in 1961. Performances were done in the Main Hall, now our community Library.

In 1975 a new Drama Studio was added to the College, providing a different shape of performance space for theatre 'in the round', a balcony, and more modern lighting facilities.

Bottisham Players was formed in 1977 and performed a play or pantomime annually to start with. David Coles directed successful pantomimes attracting about 800 audience members across the several production nights, and there was demand to increase the activity of the group by adding another production later in the year. From 1988 the Players then continued from strength to strength, offering a diverse style of entertainment including period drama, comedy, farce, pantomimes, and revues of sketches and musical items. The most prolific period was between 1989 and 2013 when 3 or 4 productions a year were performed. The Drama Studio was more suited to intimate productions with a capacity of up to about 100 audience, whereas the pantomimes were performed using the Main Hall stage, and offered space for audiences of over 200.

In 1994 a youth section of Bottisham Players was started which later became an independent group called the Bike Sheds, led by Bob Newman. They performed mostly original material, often musical.

The backstage team, initially led by David Coles and subsequently Ted Southcombe, was crucial to all the productions, although they were rarely seen or heard. However, occasionally the excited cast waiting in the wings were warned to heed the Stage Manager's cry of "silence in the wings"! Magnificent sets were constructed, mainly during the weekend preceding the production week (due to the need to share school facilities). Lighting was positioned using the tower, for which certain people undertook training, and sound effects integrated to the running of the show.

Two wooden garage sized buildings were constructed and maintained by the Players on the Village College site to house the scenery, props, and costumes to avoid the necessity of hiring so much and for re-using materials. We hope the College will continue to use these as a resource for their drama activities.

Doris Walker, followed by Avis Coles, then Christine Newman were the Wardrobe Mistresses, and Chris Clarke was our magical make-up and wig artist, as well as a talented actress. Her late husband, Lawrie led the props team for many years. Many others contributed their skills, either on the management committee or by sewing costumes, making refreshments, selling programmes, sweeping floors etc. I and several others were involved for over 36 years and held all posts on the Committee at different times, as well as acting, producing and directing.

It is sad to see the demise of what such a thriving community activity had been. The Bottisham Players had provided many happy hours of entertainment from 1977 to 2015 for both its members and audiences of all ages.

Pantomimes always attracted the largest audiences, but a variety of straight plays, farces and revue shows were also performed. Many of the children who had been a pantomime junior fairy, rat or cat or villager are now adults who might even read this article! Casts varied from around 6 for a play to about 40 for musical revues and pantomimes, as well as a live band when needed. New talent was discovered and developed as people grew in confidence. For example, in 1994 a group of ladies learned to tap dance in order to stage Stepping Out with a finale based on the famous musical 42nd Street, wearing top hats, sequinned jackets & with canes! Special revue shows were compiled for the turn of the century in 2000, and the Queens Diamond Jubilee in 2012. Many lasting friendships were formed amongst the members – and even one marriage!

Perhaps another community drama group will develop in the village sometime in the future, but it needs people willing to commit to organise material, people, source talents, and practical/technical skills. Somehow we all did it as an enjoyable and rewarding hobby - on top of jobs, raising families and running a home!

In the meantime, there is now a 'playreading for fun' group for local adults who are interested, which meets most months. No previous experience or wish to perform required!


News From Holy Trinity Church

area where she lived. When she moved to Cambridge, she became involved with three operatic societies as their rehearsal accompanist. As the accompanist of the Cambridge Gilbert and Sullivan Society for many years she was also privileged to accompany many of the D'Oyly Carte principal singers when they performed in Cambridge.

Finally on December 3rd I will give a talk entitled 'The History of our Christmas Carols', play my violin and will be joined by Sarah Maxwell (soprano) and Jonathan Giles (keyboard). Put the dates in your diary now. The concerts will start at 10.30am, last just over an hour and entry will be £5 (children free), to include coffee and cake. All are welcome. Money raised will go towards the church building fund.

Following the restoration work on the North Aisle following the dry rot infestation, we are still awaiting permission for the permanent removal of most of the pews that were formerly fixed to the floor in that area of the church.

As part of our diversification of church activities our toddler group, continued to meet over the summer and will continue into the autumn, on a Tuesday morning at 9am. New members are warmly welcome.

Like everyone we are having to review our heating/lighting management in view of the huge increase in electricity prices. To this end we have already reduced the outside floodlighting schedule for the church and will probably permanently turn off some of the spotlights.

Some of the speakers on our electric organ started to malfunction over the summer but these have now been repaired Our comprehensive guide to the church has been republished and copies (£3 please) are available in the church.

Our Sunday services continue, in all the churches in the Anglesey Group and also on Zoom. You will be very welcome at any of them. They are usually two per month in Bottisham at 10.30am. Please consult the Cresset or the church notice board for details.

DISPENSARY NEWSLETTER...

WE HAVE PUT TOGETHER THIS NEWSLETTER as a way of updating patients on the latest news relating to our Dispensary Service. The combination of Brexit and COVID-19 has had a direct impact on our Dispensary and how we deliver our services and we thought it would be useful to update our patients on the latest issues and how it may affect the services we provide and what improvements we are making as a result of feedback from patients.

TURNAROUND TIMES FOR REPEAT MEDICATION

We are having ongoing problems with patients attending the Practice before 5 full working days to collect their repeat medication. Working days relate to days the Practice is open (Monday to Friday). The Practice non-working days are Saturday, Sunday and all Bank Holidays. This means if you drop your prescription off Friday afternoon you need to attend the practice the following week on Friday afternoon to pick up.

Subsequent to patient feedback, we are implementing a text message service which will confirm when your medication has been dispensed and is ready to pick up. This should resolve the frustrations of medication not being ready when attending the Practice.

MEDICATION DELIVERY SERVICE

The Practice continues to run a delivery service 5 days per week (Monday to Friday) for the delivery of

repeat medication. We deliver to over 600 patients and we have received extremely positive feedback about the service. This was introduced for the convenience of our patients and to reduce queues for collections at the Dispensary. If you would like to use this service, please do speak to one of the team in the Practice or complete an application form on our website. If you work during the day but you have a safe place to leave medication or it will fit through the letter box we can still deliver.

MEDICATION AND SUPPLY ISSUES

Due to Brexit, COVID-19 and issues with sourcing raw materials there have been delays beyond our control in sourcing some drugs. This changes daily and the practice cannot predict from one day to the next

what drugs may be out of stock. The local Clinical Commissioning Group provide regular updates regarding stock issues and the dispensary team work closely with the GPs to source suitable alternatives to ensure patients always have their medications. These supply issues are nationwide.

Suppliers are also struggling with a shortage of delivery drivers so it does mean that there are sometimes delays to deliveries to the practice.

It is for these reasons patients will find that they may not always have all of their repeat order ready when collecting and is why we are still operating a 5 working day turnaround time. This ensures that in most cases when a patient comes to pick up their medication it is all there.

Due to patient feedback, we are looking at implementing a new system on how we dispense repeat prescriptions. We will Keep patients updated on improvements being made. We will keep patients updated by informing patients via text when medication in ready to collect.

DISPENSARY STAFF

We have this month increased the number of staff in the Dispensary Team to help improve the service we

deliver to patients so you will see some new faces. They are all working very hard and we would ask that you are always polite and respectful to the Team.

VISITING THE DISPENSARY

The Infection Prevention Control Guidelines were revised two months ago which means we can have more

people in the surgery. We have reviewed these guidelines in conjunction with local risk assessments and we have taken the decision to continue to ask patients to come into dispensary one at a time. We have taken this decision in order to protect our most vulnerable patients and staff. We ask that patients continue to wear a mask when visiting the practice. The dispensary is open Monday to Friday 8.30am to 12pm and 2pm to 6pm. We are working towards trying to open again throughout the day and will update patients when we are able to do this.




