News From Holy Trinity Church Bottisham

As I write, we have entered the Christian period of Lent. During this time Christians remember the 40 days and nights that Jesus spent in the wilderness fasting and being tempted by the devil. Lent started on Ash Wednesday 5th March and ends on Maundy Thursday when we remember the Last Supper when Jesus shared bread and wine with his disciples. Many give up some luxuries during Lent, such as alcohol or chocolate and donate the money saved to worthy causes. Widely publicised however is Shrove Tuesday, the day prior



to Lent when many eat pancakes in abundance, (often associated with pancake races), prior to the fasting of Lent.

Also, at this time of year we have to re-elect our Churchwardens and Parochial Church Council (PCC) members. PCC's under the chairmanship of the Vicar or Churchwardens are the bodies responsible for running the Anglican Parish Churches throughout the world and it is no different in Bottisham! Our churchwardens will be elected at the service on Sunday 6th April while the PCC will be elected at the Annual Parochial Church meeting, which will take place at Swaffham Prior Primary School on April 9th at 7.30pm.

By the time you read this we will have had our first Coffee and Cake concert when Sarah Maxwell with her beautiful soprano voice, entertained us with her singing accompanied by John Marsh. The second will take place on Saturday 10th May at 10.30am when Dr Christopher Robinson CVO CBE former organist and choirmaster at Worcester Cathedral, St George's Chapel, Windsor Castle and St John's College Cambridge, will play a variety of pieces on the organ including arrangements of Handel's Water Music, Walton's Crown Imperial and finishing with Widor's Toccata. It is suggested that a £5 donation would be appropriate for adults. There will be no charge for children. The concert will last for about 45 minutes. Do come at 10.30 am and enjoy a coffee (or tea or juice) and some cake before the music begins.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN ENGAGEMENT EVENT

I am pleased to report that the Neighbourhood Plan Engagement Event held on 1st March 2025 was well attended by residents and that the working group have received some useful feedback and praise for the presentation. The Parish Council wishes to thank all those involved with the preparation of the Draft Neighbourhood Plan and to those who gave up their free time to present the information on the day and answer any questions that residents had. The Working Group will be using the feedback in finalising the draft document to be presented to the Parish Council for approval, prior to submission of the Regulation 14 agreement consultation later this year.

The chair of the working group, Tony Jolley, has given a more detailed report on the event elsewhere in this magazine - so please look out for it.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

A reminder that the Annual Parish Meeting is being held on 29th April 2025 at the Sports and Social Club. This is an important opportunity for the Parish Council to understand what residents think. To that end we are changing the format this year to increase opportunity for residents to have their say in smaller groups based around the topics of Highways & Transport, Planning & Development and Community & Communications. Your County & District Cllrs, plus representatives from the police and our local schools will join in the discussions.

We would love to hear from as many individuals as possible at this annual residents meeting. I would also like to remind residents that at each Parish Council meeting, the public are permitted to attend and there is an open forum at the start of every meeting where matters can be raised to the Council. So, if there is something that you wish for the Council to consider please do come along or, if you would rather not attend a meeting in person, you can send me an email to clerk@bottisham-pc.gov.uk and I will raise this will the Council.

ENGLISH DEVOLUTION WHITE PAPER

There has been much publicity about the Government's move to Unitary Councils of late. Essentially what this means is that the County Council and the District Councils will be abolished, and a new Unitary Council will take over the responsibilities of both the Councils as a singular organisation. We currently fall under East Cambridgeshire District Council (ECDC) who serve a population of around 90000 and Cambridgeshire County Council - who are the upper tier of local government and undertake services for five district councils. But the move to a unitary authority will see the overall functions for approximately 500,000 residents being controlled by one Council.

Early indications are that the whole of Cambridgeshire is likely to have two mayor-led Unitary Councils - either North/South or East/West. We already have a mayor who is responsible for the Cambridgeshire/Peterborough area and will not be in the first round of the process (our changes are likely to come into effect during 2028). Both the County Council and District Councils are currently being asked to submit responses to the government by by 21st March. ECDC has raised concern about merging, as they have been debt free for a number of years and the move to a singular Council could see them placed with Councils who are not in the same fortunate position. ECDC has been consulting with residents to aid them in their response on the 21st. The Parish Council is also submitting a response to ECDC. We will keep residents updated on any developments via Facebook, website and of course though the Cresset.

VE DAY – 80TH YEAR CELEBRATION

Plans for the 80th year celebration for VE Day are well underway. The event has been arranged for 10th May, 2-5pm on the Triangle. We are looking forward to welcoming as many of you as possible to come along and celebrate this event with us. If you are able to help in any way, then please do reach out to myself or Cllr Cundell. We would welcome any support that anyone is able to provide, as these events to not organise themselves.

ADMINISTRATION ASSISTANT

The Parish Council have recently interviewed for a new Administration Assistant to assist the Clerk in carrying out some of the functions of the Parish Council. At the time of writing no announcement on the appointment has been made, but we hope the new Assistant can join the Council on 7th April. Details of how to communicate with the new Assistant will be published in the next edition of the Cresset.

BOTTISHAM MEADOWS ALLOTMENTS & PLAY AREA

I regret that the legal process of transferring the green space surrounding Bottisham Meadows from the developers to ECDC is still delayed. So the Copse Close Play Area remains "closed" and the allotments can still not be used. We are all set and ready to go once the transfer has finally been made. On the positive side a Project Play resident's working party is moving forwards on investigating how to develop further play provision for the village on the grassland beside Jubilee Wood.

PARISH COUNCIL VACANCY

Please don't forget we still have a vacant seat on the Parish Council. I would love to have a full council, as it has been many years since this has happened. Throw out any misconceptions about us sitting in a cold drafty room, discussing boring matters. The Parish Council is very diverse, and we have lots of exciting projects that we are currently undertaking. So, if you would like to get involved with shaping your Parish and ensuring that we retain our identity then please do reach out.

County Councillors' Report

COUNCIL REORGANISATION

Residents will have seen in the news, that Government have announced a change to local government. I will not use the word reform, because that is a positive move, but this is an imposition with no ability for residents to be able to comment or influence the outcome.

All Councils have received communication from Government requiring a response to the formation of successor unitary authorities by 21st March 2025.

East Cambs District Council has called a special meeting to be held on 20th March to discuss and agree the Council's response.

That meeting will receive a draft holding response agreed by all leaders of Councils across Cambridgeshire and Peterborough excluding Fenland.

If agreed by Council, this will enable further discussions to take place, with Government requiring a final response by 28th November.

I will update in future months but welcome any comments from residents around this.

BUDGET

The Council voted for an increase of 4.99% for their portion of the Council Tax, which is the maximum allowed without an election.

Our group put in 11 amendments to the ruling Lib Dem/ Labour administration's budget covering different spending on highways repairs. These were all rejected by the ruling administration.

The Police & Crime Panel met on 5th February to decide on the Police & Crime Commissioner's precept proposals and agreed an increase of 4.8% on their portion of the Council Tax.

BUSWAYS

At the full County Council on 11th February, Council voted to proceed with the Transport and Works Orders for the Camborne to Coton Busway and the CSET Busway to the Addenbrookes campus. It is still likely that both of these routes will be the subject of a public inquiry, and I voted against both of them, as there is, in my opinion, a suitable on road alternative at a fraction of the cost, which avoids digging up large areas of farmland.

Additionally, there was a vote to proceed with the Transport and Works Order for a busway from the new development at Waterbeach, which will take a short journey across the A10 and open land to avoid the Milton Road roundabout. I supported that proposal, as it seems to be a sensible solution to solve congestion at the Milton Road/A14 roundabout.

BUSES

As residents will be aware, the promised new routes called Tiger 4 and Tiger 5 are being retendered, due to the Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Combined Authority being unable to resolve contractual issues with the preferred bidder.

The Tiger 4 would have come into Bottisham and head through the Wilbrahams, to Hills Road and Long Road colleges and end up at Addenbrookes

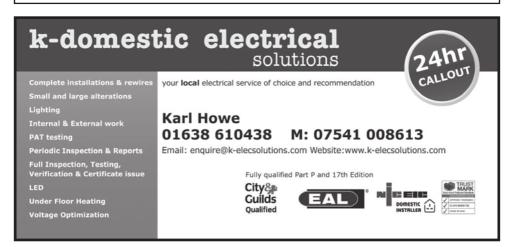

At our February meeting Angie Stewart from Cambridge Women's Aid came to talk to us about the history of the Refuge and the work undertaken there. Since it first opened in the 1970s the Refuge has occupied a number of different premises in Cambridge. It now has a purpose-built facility which houses 11 women with their children. Staff are on-site during office hours but on call out of hours to ensure that the women feel that this is their home. Although much has changed since the Refuge first opened its objectives remain broadly similar in providing a safe refuge for women who are at risk of homicide and abuse. Offers of help, both practical and financial are always welcome.

At the end of February, on a glorious sunny morning, a group of us were guests of Jill and Roger Jenyns at Bottisham Hall. After coffee and biscuits several of us ventured out into the sunshine with Jill to walk through the gardens and woods. The snowdrops were still in bloom with the daffodils starting to come through. Jill's little Griffon dog, Betsy, accompanied us on our walk and kept us entertained as we enjoyed the tour. Donations for Jill's chosen charity of Addenbrooke's Hospital were collected.

Our next meeting will be on Tuesday 15th April at 7.30pm.

The speaker will be Neil Callan with a talk entitled Crowbar to Crocosmia. Do come and join us if you'd like to know more!

We usually meet on the third Tuesday of every month at the Bottisham Community Sports and Social Club in the Poppy Room at 7.30pm. A Neighbourhood Plan for Bottisham

Dear Resident,

March 2025

We last updated you with progress on the Bottisham Neighbourhood Plan in the January 2025 edition of The Cresset. These updates are also available on the Bottisham Parish Council Website and can also be found on the various local media platforms.

The Bottisham Neighbourhood Plan Working Group was pleasantly surprised with the turnout on Saturday 1st March for the Neighbourhood Plan Community Engagement Day. Your comments have been read and we should like to highlight that the NP will be reviewed and updated to reflect the feedback that was received. Once this has been done the updated NP with be available at various locations in the village for six (6) weeks for further scrutiny and comment.

In preparing the Plan the NP Working Group has consulted local people and businesses over the past eighteen (18) months and invited schools and minority groups to contribute while developing this plan. In addition to the focus on retaining the character of the village, people have expressed great concern about the ability of local infrastructure to absorb a larger population. Whilst the Plan cannot address these issues directly, they are recognised and will be put forward as weaknesses in our infrastructure.

The feedback is predominantly positive, with strong support for maintaining village identity, protecting green spaces, and ensuring responsible development. Residents emphasise preserving the Conservation Area, enforcing design codes, and limiting expansion, particularly on Greenfield and Green Belt sites.

Infrastructure concerns include the need for improved public transport, better waste management, and sufficient medical and school provisions before further development. These are not matters that the Plan can address directly but can be used to inform and determine proportionate development.

Sustainability is a key priority, with calls for biodiversity protection around the settlement area of the village, solar panels on new homes, and eco-friendly building materials. Green and open spaces are highly valued for recreation and wildlife, with suggestions to expand and formally protect them where possible. Non-Heritage assets, including the Library and Sports Centre, are recognised as vital to the community.

Although the Community Engagement Event was well-received, outreach to younger residents and wider community involvement could be improved.

THE NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN VISION FOR BOTTISHAM - 2025 TO 2031:

- a) Protect and enrich the rural character and identity of the village and to ensure any development opportunities are proportionate and respect heritage, community, agricultural and rural aesthetic whilst also being sustainable and appropriate to the scale and nature of the Parish. We want Bottisham to remain a village.
- b) To be an attractive and desirable place to live; with strong community cohesion where all our residents will feel valued and connected. Our existing open and green spaces, along with biodiversity corridors, community facilities and services, will be protected and enhanced to ensure that these valuable assets continue to support our community.
- c) Levels of future growth must reflect the sustainability of already overstretched services whilst welcoming the use of new technology in order to minimise the adverse impact on the climate and to enable residents to change how they live and work.

Overall, the Community Engagement feedback supports the vision but urges caution in development. Residents advocate for balanced, proportionate and sustainable growth that protects and enhances village life and the village's character and heritage without compromising its rural aesthetic.

Bottisham Bird Brain

Following last month's Goldfinch, we are going to stay with seed-eating Passerines for April's bird because, in the second week of February when the sun began to warm our backs for the first time this year, I heard and saw my first Corn Buntings of the year.

This might be a good opportunity to revisit the close relationship, and the differences, between the Buntings and the Finches. Both families are mainly seed-eaters, with strong stout beaks, but they are from two distinct families: Emberizidae (Buntings) and Fringillidae (Finches). Similarities may include not only diet, but also general shape and white outer-tail feathers on a cleft tail. Differences include the Buntings' slightly flatter head, their longer shape, and the fact that they tend to favour the ground for feeding where the Finches are more arboreal in their habits. But there are plenty of exceptions: e.g. one of the commonest ways to spot a Corn Bunting is to find it singing its heart out from the top of a tree or on a telegraph wire! Furthermore, the distinctions are not always obvious from the nomenclature: e.g. the

Yellowhammer being a Bunting, whilst the Linnet is a Finch! The Corn Bunting – Emberiza calandra – is a UK 'resident' (i.e. breeding and nonmigratory) but is probably overlooked quite often, with its buff-brown, speckled and striated plumage producing a rather dull, unremarkable appearance. Perhaps it is sometimes confused with the Skylark, which has comparable colouring and habitat. However, the Skylark is larger, crested, with a slimmer bill, and its distinctive song flight is completely diagnostic. Similarly, the Meadow Pipit, which is also a small, brownish bird of field and pasture, has its own characteristic song flight and usually appears significantly darker than the Corn Bunting.

The Corn Bunting suffered a steep decline in the 1970s and 1980s and so, like many ground nesters, it isn't as common as it once was. However, there is good news: the UK population seems to have stabilised at c. 11,000 territories, so the worst effects of the increase in intensive farming seem to be in the past. Furthermore, our locality appears to be something of a stronghold for this species.

The Heath Road between Swaffham Bulbeck and the A1303 is where I saw my Corn Buntings and they are present in that area, from Spring to Autumn, virtually every time I cycle that road (which is usually at least once a week). You may wonder about my road safety awareness but I assure you these delightful birds are unmissable if you keep your ears open! The males announce themselves proudly with a unique, two-second warble which is often described as 'jangling keys'. The song may be delivered invisibly from low down among the crops in a field (in which case, the satisfaction of simply knowing it's there is enough) but they seem to love the small trees on either side of the Heath Road where they find the topmost twig from which to regale their mates and prospective mates.

The other behaviour of E.calandra which is not found in any other Bunting or Finch (or, indeed, any other British bird that I know of) is its inclination to fly with its feet dangling, instead of tucked in under the belly and tail. This extraordinary sight, which is apparently very attractive to the female of the species, is commonplace on the Heath Road as the birds traverse from tree to tree. Incidentally, the fields on either side of the B1103 between Burwell and Exning are also good for Corn Bunting, as are those on the hills up to Brinkley and West Wratting.

The Corn Bunting is one of the many beneficiaries of the DEFRA's Environmental Stewardship programme (formerly Countryside Stewardship) which issues grants to farmers and landowners for habitat improvements for birds, mammals, butterflies and bees, among other things. And there may be further encouragement for Corn Bunting, particularly in this area where solar farms are an increasingly popular use of tracts of farmland.

A recent report, compiled by the RSPB and the University of Cambridge, suggests that solar farms can "provide relief from the effects of agricultural intensification". Several sites in the East Anglian Fens were found to have a greater number of species, and individual birds per hectare, than the surrounding arable land. It was noted that well-managed sites where grass and hedgerows were preserved contained three times the number of birds compared with arable land nearby. The report also concluded that solar farms did not pose a threat to national food security, especially when built on low- or moderate-grade agricultural land. This, of course, is great news for species like the Skylark, Yellowhammer, Linnet and other finches as well as our precious Corn Bunting.



Letter to the Editor

Dear Peter

In issue No. 535 of the Cresset, Mr Robert Stevens wrote about PARKING of motor vehicles on the roads. While I agree entirely with his advice, there is a lot of dangerous parking in this village,

Just to refresh drivers on the law,

- Motor vehicles must not be parked within 10 metres of a road junction.
- Not on any bend
- Not on foot or cycle paths
- · Not on double yellow lines.
- Not on zig zags outside schools.
- · Not double park.
- Not at bus stops
- Not against a dropped kerb or other entrance.

 Motorists who have to park on the road, must make sure they are parked close to and parallel to the kerb. In addition, when parked on the road in a 30 MPH area during the hours of darkness, the vehicle must comply to all the above and also be parked with the nearside of the vehicle next and close to the kerb.

It is also an offence when driving a motor vehicle on the road,

- With dirty windows, lights or number plates.
- Using a mobile phone while driving
- Leaving the engine running while parked.
- Deliberately driving into puddles splashing pedestrians.
- To drive while under the influence of drink and or drugs. This also includes sitting in the car while the vehicle is stationary.
- Flashing head lamps to warn other motorists of a speed check
- A new rule states Dogs carried in vehicles must be suitably restrained to avoid distraction or injury, this carries a fine up to £5,000 plus up to 9 penalty points on your driving licence
- Finally make sure you are a named driver on the policy of insurance, and all other documents for the vehicle are in order and remember to keep the vehicle road worthy.





Bottisham and District Gardening Club

Perhaps the Perils of Poisonous Plants was not the best choice of subject with the advent of Spring and gardeners looking forward to being able to get out to tend their patches. Nigel Start opened his talk by telling us about the deadly properties of hemlock which hopefully none of us will be unfortunate enough to encounter. However, he was also full of good advice such as wearing gloves and always washing your hands after gardening. He explained that toxins are widespread in the natural world and act as a deterrent to stop them being eaten by birds, insects and animals.

All plants produce toxins in some form or other and many have been used in medicines. Willow has anti-inflammatory properties and is an ingredient in aspirin. Yews were almost eradicated from the countryside because of their toxicity to animals and their only sanctuaries were churchyards, until it was found that they could be used to produce the cancer drug Tamoxifen. Foxgloves also have many uses in medicine and are often an ingredient in heart-related medication.

Some plants just produce irritants, either stinging, as nettles, or exuding sap, which when cut, can irritate the skin. The opium poppy oozes sap when the seed head is cut and has many medicinal uses, good and bad. The solanacaea family includes potatoes and aubergines as well as many pretty flowering varieties such as deadly nightshade, which is not to be messed with. But a warning too, not to eat any green parts of potatoes. Many of the legume family are toxic too and dried pulses should always be well cooked, but if in doubt, let someone else do the hard work and use the tinned ones. The list goes on and on and many are surprising, but don't have nightmares, just take care.

Our next meeting is 22nd April when Gwenda Kydd will be talking about Twelve Tremendous Trees. Please join us in the Poppy Room at the Bottisham Community Sports and Social Club at 7.30 p.m. Visitors are very welcome for a small charge.



Physiotherapists at Bottisham Medical Practice

We are lucky to have Charlotte (Tuesday) and Dominic (Thursdays) each week at the surgery. They are called "First contact physios". They are trained to assess any injury or joint pain, give advice and decide on the next best course of action. You do not need to see a GP beforehand and in fact if you see the physio you are freeing up GP appointments for those that need it. We are sadly frequently having patients insist on seeing a GP rather than a physio who do not need to, and are just referred to the physio from the GP which is a waste of an appointment. It would really help if you have the following symptoms that you request to see the physiotherapist. If they do feel you need a GP appointment this will be arranged swiftly.

First contact physios: Who see patients with the following symptoms (no need to see a GP first)

- All soft tissue injuries
- Sports injuries / Arthritis any joint / Carpal tunnel syndrome / Post orthopaedic surgery
- Neck pain / Back pain / Hip pain / Knee pain / Ankle pain
- Wrist pain / Shoulder pain / Foot pain / Elbow pain

Patients wishing and able to see medical students

- We are always looking out for patients with a "chronic health condition" to be willing to see our medical students. They are required to see patients in the surgery and on home visits for various projects. If you have a long term illness or condition which you believe may be of interest to a medical student please let reception know and Dr Keith will add you to the list if willing participants.
- **Easter:** With the surgery closed over the Easter weekend and the bank holidays please remember to order your medication to cover this 4 day period in good time leaving at least one full week for it to be dispensed.


