If you take pictures when you are out and about in or around the village, then let us see them. If they fit and are suitable, then they could be on the front cover one day. Remember portrait not landscape.



News From Holy Trinity Church Bottisham

As I write this, we are in the middle of all our happy preparations and celebrations for Christmas and the New Year. However, these happy thoughts are somewhat tempered by the not unexpected results of our recent Quinquennial Survey and Report. This is a mandatory requirement by the Diocese (and funded by them) to ensure that the church is in the best possible state of repair to go into the future. A list of required improvements indicated by the architect is divided into yearly timescales. A rotten step leading up



to the gallery was deemed urgent and this has already been repaired by our amazing local craftsman Steve Allen. Within two years we need to find around £167,000 for several projects, the most urgent of which is to repair the crumbling clunch on the south side of the church mainly affecting the south clerestory and window frames. Within 5 years we need to raise another £376,000 for further repairs to the stonework and replacing the whole of the roof to the nave which we already know is badly affected by breakdown and corrosion of the existing lead covering and which has required several emergency repairs recently. In total around £894,000 needs to be spent in bringing our lovely Grade 1 list church up to scratch. The preliminary task will be to set up a working party, then going out to tender for an architect to give a detailed estimate of the most urgent work to be done and finally approaching grant giving bodies for funding. However, all of these will require a significant amount of money to be raised locally.

The need for our large and lovely church was highlighted not only when it was packed for the Primary School carol concert but also for the memorial service for the late Elizabeth (Beth) Wombwell when nearly 250 persons were present. Our own anticipated Carol and Christmas Holy Communion Services, too, always see significant numbers of local people and their families attending.

you can interact personally and informally with the members of the working group on the range of different areas we are working on.

The Poppy Room at the Sports & Social Club has been booked for the consultation on 1st March between 14.00-19.00. Please could I ask you to put this in your diary and endeavour to join us to have your say?

RIDGE CLEAN ENERGY – SIX OAKS SOLAR PARK - After many months of negotiations between the various parties and their lawyers, I am delighted to report that we have finally agreed (and signed) a robust legal agreement that will govern the Community Benefit flowing from the scheme to the Parishes impacted by the solar park. Once power production commences, Ridge Clean Energy will commence distributing the "Benefit" across the three Parishes of Bottisham, Great Wilbraham and Little Wilbraham & Six Mile Bottom. At this time the connection to the grid has still to be agreed and we do not expect the funds to arrive before 2017. However, the conclusion of the agreement safeguards what will be a very welcome contribution towards the three communities during the 40 years of planned operation. Bottisham will receive £15,000/annum during the first two years of operation and then £20910/annum for the projected remaining 38 years.

As well as the planned Community Benefit, Ridge Clean have made several awards to local organisations within the three Parishes. This includes a Winter Fuel Scheme this year to support individuals and families who are struggling to afford their heating and energy bills, whether due to low income, reliance on the benefit system, disability or other hardships. This is administered by Ely Food Bank, who have reached out to local charities and organisations in touch with those in financial need. The Food Bank informs us they have received a number of nominations from the Village College and Bottisham Local Charities and we would like to express our gratitude to Ridge Clean that Bottisham residents will benefit from their generosity.

Many of you may have noted the recent invitation from Kingsway Solar to a consultation about another solar park planned east of the A11 and south of Newmarket. The solar park itself will be outside of our Parish boundary and may not impinge too directly on the village it would appear. Albeit one of the two potential connection corridors to the substation at Burwell would cross the southeastern part of our Parish. The Parish Council will keep a close eye on this development as matters proceed.

PLAY AREAS & ALLOTMENTS - The new Bottisham Meadows development off Bell Rd is drawing towards completion. Over the last weeks the Parish Council liaised with an officer from ECDC, as he approved the transfer of the new Copse Close play area and allotments to the District Council. We now await the legal transfer. Once this has taken place the play area will remain the property of and be maintained by ECDC (and then be opened to the public). The allotments and adjacent parking will be transferred from ECDC to become the property of the Parish Council.

The Parish Council is in the process of planning the administration of the allotments and the fair selection of allotment holders. There are only 10 allotments, and we know

competition will be fierce!! More on this in due course, but we do not expect to be opening the allotments up until the spring when the seeded pathways are fit to use. So please be patient with us.

To the east of Bottisham Meadows is Jubilee Wood, that contains the remains of a fishpond originally connected to the mediaeval Bendish farm (whose foundations are under the ancient monument). The wood also be transferred to ECDC by the developers, along with a large area of newly seeded grass located between the wood and Bottisham Meadows. Aware of the need for open space in the village, ECDC plan to develop Jubilee Wood as a woodland play area, perhaps also making a feature of the fishpond remains. They will also support the Parish Council as we look to place some additional play equipment on the grass area, to complement what is available at the smaller Copse Close and Bendish play areas. For the time being we will call it the "Jubilee Play Area" (unless/until another name is selected).

A resident's "Project Play" working group will be meeting in the new year to commence discussions about how to develop the Jubilee Play Area. If you would like to be part of this group please let me know.

NEW DEFIBRILLATOR - Finally, I must mention a new village defibrillator that should be installed by the time this is published – an addition to the one located at the Sports & Social Club. We would like to express our gratitude to Justin Moore, site manager for Lindum Homes, the builders of Bottisham Meadows. Justin raised money by running a marathon to enable the donation of the device to the village entirely free of charge.

The defibrillator will be located on the side wall of Bottisham Pharmacy. We are grateful to the Pharmacy for allowing the location of the device on their wall and supplying the power for it. To make space for the defibrillator, the old white notice board has been removed and a new village notice board will shortly be installed on the Triangle, located where the ageing village map was previously located. Thank you Justin for making this all happen – and potentially saving the life of future residents.

District Councillors' Report

OPERATIONAL SERVICES COMMITTEE 18 NOVEMBER

- 1. The collection of waste and re-cycling is improving, but still not quite on target.
- 2. Street cleansing is efficient, but there was no data on how many streets have been cleaned.
- 3. An operating deficit of approximately £325,000 partly due to lower numbers of planning applications and building inspections.
- 4. The Air Quality Strategy plan for the District was presented; mostly aspirational, and few concrete strategies for improving air quality. Perhaps the new Local Plan can incorporate some measures (e.g. no chimneys in new buildings) to improve air quality.

FINANCE & ASSETS COMMITTEE 28 NOVEMBER

- 1. The annual review of the Local Council Tax Reduction Scheme (LCTRS) for the 2025/26 year is to be unchanged for next year. LCTRS is for those residents who are on Universal Credit and Council Tax support. John argued that the Local Council Tax should be reduced to zero and not 8.5% as it is now, to help households struggling with the cost-of-living crisis, but the Administration thought that all households should pay even a minimum sum.
- Changes to the exemption from Council Tax for second houses that are empty and for sale or under probate was extended from one to two years which seemed to favour those who had second dwellings or were landlords.
- 3. That this Committee has a projected year-end underspend of £746,000 when compared to its approved revenue budget of £7,016,768. Some of this underspend occurs because vacant posts are not filled quickly.

EXTRAORDINARY COUNCIL ON 11 DECEMBER

The Independents on the Council has formed a group with the Lib Dems, so that this new group and the Conservative group have an equal number of members. According to the Local Government and Housing Act 1989, there needs to be equal representation on each of the committees, and this will be resolved at this Council meeting.

As I write, it has been a season of celebration and hard work, with a busy schedule in Westminster and across our constituency.

One recent highlight was visiting the Repair Café at Littleport Village Hall. This inspiring initiative brings people together to fix household items, share skills, and reduce waste. It was heartening to see the dedication of volunteers who give their time and expertise to support others. Projects like this not only foster community spirit but also champion sustainability, reminding us of the practical ways we can care for our environment while connecting with one another.

Amid these uplifting moments, my work continues to focus on issues affecting our area. Rising employer National Insurance contributions have been a recurring theme in discussions with local businesses. I recently met GPs at Staploe Medical Centre to hear how these costs are straining surgeries, and I welcomed East Cambridgeshire farmers to Parliament to discuss their impact on agriculture. Supporting those who provide healthcare and food is vital for our community's future.

Agriculture, the backbone of our local economy, has been a focus. Joining the 'Traditional Fenland Celery' harvest near Ely and visiting a sugar beet farm in Stetchworth underscored the dedication of our farmers. They face mounting challenges, and I remain committed to advocating for the support they need to thrive.

Infrastructure is another priority. The Ely Area Capacity Enhancement scheme (the proposal to upgrade the railway to allow more trains to run through Ely) is crucial for our region's future, promising growth and improved connectivity. Its omission from the Autumn Budget was disappointing, but I've raised the issue directly with the Secretary of State for Transport and will continue to push for action.

In Parliament, I faced one of my most difficult decisions: how to vote on the Assisted Dying Bill. After listening to all sides and reflecting deeply, I chose to support it at its second reading. This decision was not taken lightly, and I will continue to engage with constituents and experts as the bill progresses.

Closer to home, concerns about shoplifting have been prominent in conversations with shopworkers across East Cambridgeshire. I've urged the government to provide our overstretched police with the resources they need. Meanwhile, the ever-present flood risk in our region requires urgent, long-term planning, which I emphasised in a recent parliamentary debate.

It's been a pleasure meeting so many local residents. Opening The Edmund Trust's new respite service in Milton was a particularly meaningful moment, and thanking our hardworking posties at the Royal Mail delivery office in Ely was another highlight.

Education is the foundation of a healthy democracy, and my visits to Bottisham Village College and Robert Arkenstall Primary School in Haddenham offered an inspiring glimpse of the creativity and ambition shaping our future.

Bottisham Bird Brain

Happy New Year everybody.

Has anybody seen a particular bird for the first time recently? I noted that there was a Ring-necked Parakeet seen in Bottisham in late November. It could conceivably have been an 'escape' but more likely to have been one of the everincreasing populations from London or the home counties, blown north on the winds of Storm Bert. Anyway, I digress...

As we're into the holiday season with, hopefully, a little time on our hands to take a few walks into the countryside and enjoy the cool, crisp beauty of our surroundings, I thought we might venture out of our gardens to go a little further afield for my next bird.

Writing about the Magpie (December issue), with its subtle, coloured sheens reminded me of another bird that is not as black and white as it first appears; a bird once among the commonest waders in the UK, especially in East Anglia but, whilst still regular, encountered now in worryingly decreasing numbers.

A bird of uplands, wetlands, grasslands, farmlands and estuarine shore, the Lapwing (Vanellus vanellus), is now 'red-listed' in the UK at c. 98,000 resident pairs, which is down by over 60% over a 50 year period. It is also listed as 'vulnerable' in Europe, and 'near-threatened' globally. British birdwatchers will have noticed the smaller flock sizes these days, despite our winter population, swollen by migrants from Northern Europe, reaching some 600,000. That sounds like a lot of birds, but it's still 46% fewer than in the 1990s! So, what is thought to be going on?

Whilst the winter visitors are widely distributed in most lowland areas, the breeding population has become more localised, due largely to increased intensity in farming and land management methods. The conversion of grassland to arable land, the drainage and improvement of marginal land, and the widespread use of fertilisers and pest controls have all played a part in driving Lapwings towards coastal mudflats, particularly for their winter sustenance. Diet comprises mainly insects and larvae (which are also in decline) and earthworms which the birds often bring to the surface by stamping their feet. Predation is also being cited as a threat to the Lapwing, as several species of birds of prey continue to thrive. They've all got to eat, right?

Often known as Peewit due to its call, or even Green Plover, the Lapwing has many distinctive features, ... indeed, all three of its names are descriptive. From its 'pied' appearance, slightly plump body, proud stance and long crest, to its broad, rounded wings and flappy flight, the Lapwing is pretty much unmistakable in the field, but a closer look reveals the 'black' as a dark green with hints of purple, and the white underparts giving way to an orange under-tail.

At c. 30cms in length, the Lapwing is medium-sized for a wader and is probably best enjoyed in the spring when its courtship display can be mesmerizing. With outstanding agility, the male will fly high over its territory, then plunge downwards, twisting, rolling and tumbling, apparently out of control until it swoops back up for a repeat performance. He will also make a hollow on the ground, line it with dry grass and invite the female to call it 'home' by rocking forward onto his breast towards her. He may have to make a number of these scrapes, and once she has chosen her preferred site, his efforts are largely complete! She takes almost all the responsibility for laying eggs – usually four – incubating them and tending the chicks until they fly around five weeks later.

You may have noticed by now that I have a fascination with the place of birds in history, folklore and the arts. And I'm happy to say the Lapwing has a rich antecedence in this regard! From metamorphosis in Greek mythology, to the bringer of good rains in India, Lapwing superstition ranges far and wide. But most elaborate of all is the 19th Century 'Legend of the Seven Whistlers' in British & Irish folklore! Other species have been associated with this tale, including Curlews and Swifts, but it is most likely that the birds were Lapwings, with their cries being interpreted as "bewitched, bewitched", warning seamen and miners of impending danger. In one version of the tale, the whistling birds numbered only six, flying around at night looking for the seventh and, if they succeeded, the world would end!

By the way, the collective noun for Lapwings is a 'deceit'. Make of that what you will, but it may be a reference to its instinct (in common with other plovers) to employ diversionary tactics – e.g. feigning injury to precipitate a chase – when its young are threatened. How clever is that?

Our speaker at the meeting in November was Rob Needle, who is the Ely Diocesan Ambassador for the Children's Society. Rob also manages the Children Society Bookshop in Sawston.

Rob spoke movingly of the current day work of the Children's Society and how they aim to be there for all children in need of help and support. Did you know over 2,700 children will have run away from home over the Christmas period? A sobering thought.

The Children's Society was started by Edward Rudolf, a Sunday School Teacher, in 1881, when he found some of his pupils begging cold and hungry in the street. He set up children's homes based on a family model, where there were 'parents' who would care for a small group of children. When Local Authorities took over the running of children's homes in the 1970's, the Children Society could see that their work was not finished, and today they work to support those who are vulnerable and at risk, those living in Child Poverty and by offering services to ensure Child Wellbeing. 30% of children in the UK are living in Child Poverty, and many children report to be unhappy in school. They also work with Young Carers to provide some time for them to be just children. They run drop-in centres where children and young people can just turn up, referrals for services are also made by teachers, police and health services.

Rob also mentioned that they are always pleased to receive books, DVDs, CDs and records at the Sawston shop if any readers are having a New Year clear out!

Our meeting ended with refreshments whilst Rob answered many questions – it was an excellent meeting, and an opportunity to find out so much more about the important work that goes on behind one of our well-known charities.

Our next meeting will be on Thursday 20th February at 2.30pm, when Simon Gale will be talking to us about Supporting an African community; we meet at the Fassage Hall in Lode, and visitors are welcome to join us.

HRH the Duke of Edinburgh Helps Cambridge Charity, Cambridge Past, Present & Future Celebrate Wandlebury's 70th Anniversary

On Tues 5 November HRH the Duke of Edinburgh visited Wandlebury Country Park to help mark the occasion of 70 years since the charity acquired Wandlebury and turned it into Cambridge's first country park.

The Duke's visit began by meeting the charity's staff, volunteers and apprentices from the National Stud at the Godolphin Stallion Memorial located inside Wandlebury ring. The Duke met Wandlebury's extremely popular weekly healthy walking group along the way, and stopped for a flat white with one sugar at the park's pop up café The Coffee Station.

The Duke then visited Wandlebury's Education Centre where he was introduced to volunteers from the Charity's wider projects, including Hinxton Watermill, Bourn Windmill, Coton Nature Reserve and the Blue Plaque scheme who spoke about these heritage and nature sites and their importance to the Cambridge area. He also met children from St Luke's C of E primary school visiting as part of one of Wandlebury's Iron Age education projects who presented His Royal Highness with a thumb-print picture they made of the autumn colours of the Wandlebury trees.

The Duke then met a large crowd of Wandlebury's members, visitors, supporters, corporate partners who had gathered or the finale of the visit, to plant a tree as part of a new copse of three trees - a new project to transform farmland into wildlife habitat.

Public Transport Matters

A couple of national news items relating to public transport will be of interest to readers as we start off the New Year. Firstly, the government announced recently that rail franchises will be taken back into public ownership as they expire, and for us in Cambridgeshire that's certainly of interest as one of the first franchises to move back into the public sector is the Greater Anglia franchise from Autumn 2025. Greater Anglia operates services from King's Lynn, Ely, Cambridge North and Cambridge into London Liverpool Street, as well as Cambridge to Stansted Airport, Cambridge to Norwich, Cambridge to Ipswich, and, indeed, services over the whole of East Anglia. Originally called 'One' (when it started in the private sector in 2004) and then National Express East Anglia, Greater Anglia is now run by a joint venture of Transport UK Group (a management buyout from the former Dutch Railways-owned Abellio UK company) and Japanese-owned Mitsui & Co.

Will the change back to public ownership make a lot of difference? It could do in practice, if it's accompanied by other changes. However, a very sharp and experienced commentator on UK railways, Thomas Ableman, thinks that public / private ownership of train operations in the UK doesn't really make much difference in principle, irrespective of what some politicians say. What's important, he says, is whether there is a locally focussed rail management that's responsive to local needs, and he believes that there is some connection between that and the size of the organisation (the smaller the organisation then generally the better). But he also stresses that quality of leadership, decentralisation of control, customer focus, and the agility of management to both innovate and react quickly are also important. Read Thomas's articles on the Internet at www.freewheeling.info/blog.

We shall see what happens come the Autumn. What's important to passengers is that our trains run reliably and that when things go wrong (as, inevitably, they will sometimes do) they are put right as quickly as possible and, most importantly, train travellers and those waiting for them are told what's going on.

The other big news recently is that the government's Minster of Transport, Louise Haigh, has resigned. Personally, I'm a bit saddened as she was a strong advocate of buses as an efficient contributor to a better transport system, and she was pushing for some stability of funding from the Treasury, which is what local authorities need. However, her replacement, Heidi Alexander, has some experience as Deputy Mayor of London for Transport, so will perhaps carry on what Louise Haigh started.

At our November meeting Jackie Lince of Mill Blossom Flowers in Lode made a return visit to talk to us about Christmas Table Decorations.

Most of us were expecting lots of red, green and gold. However, Jackie demonstrated how to create a variety of arrangements using a more subtle colour palette. The first used a small hat box concealing three jam jars lined with moss to retain moisture. Simply using a little greenery and five large dusky pink chrysanthemum flowers a very attractive table centre was quickly completed. A large moss-covered wreath complete with its own mini forest, a re-used pot with seasonal fresh greenery foraged from the garden and a single candle and finally a small silver pot of home-grown dried flowers completed the range.

As Jackie was constructing her arrangements she gave interesting insights into her first career as an accountant, her change of career just as the pandemic was starting and her current life as a florist. She included many useful tips on making quick and easy seasonal arrangements, such as the traditional method of using chicken wire to anchor stems to avoid using Oasis. She loves experimenting with flowers and doesn't always follow conventional rules. Jackie enjoys producing many of her own flowers, such as tulips from bulbs and summer flowers for drying grown from seed. However, this can entail a lot of extra work as the plants and blooms have to be protected from pests and sadly harvests are not always reliable.

Four lucky members each won one of the arrangements in the raffle at the end of the meeting. A vast array of donations for the Salvation Army Christmas Appeal had been collected and were displayed at the meeting. Donations included a wide variety of toys, colouring sets, small games, books and toiletries together with wrapping paper and cash donations.

We're continuing to collect used postage stamps to raise funds for Medical Detection Dogs. We're hoping for a bumper collection of stamps from Christmas cards even though so many of us are posting far fewer cards these days. If you have any used stamps please do drop them in to us to help raise funds for this important charity.

Members of the craft group have recently made découpage pots while those in a separate knitting group have been making twiddle muffs for local dementia patients.

If you're interested in joining the WI or would simply like to know more about our activities then please do come along to our next meeting. All are welcome.

Whether its misty, frosty or beneath a fiery sky, the calls of ducks, geese and wild swans carry on the breeze. So why not wrap up warm and head out along one of the many trails across the wider nature reserve.

The Docky Hut Café has a selection of warming comfort food, hot drinks and tasty treats including midweek chilli, nachos and rice and weekend pies. In the visitor centre, dogs receive a warm welcome and a stamp in their National Trust Pooch Passport. While you can browse our selection of festive goodies in the gift shop, perfect for a bit of yuletide shopping. And don't miss the secondhand book stall, which also stocks a collection of jigsaw puzzles. Both the café and visitor centre/ gift shop are open 10am – 4.30pm daily.

A new winter trail, around the boardwalk, will be open daily until 13th January, where families can help lost Highland calf Parsnip find her way back to the herd, meeting resident and visiting animals along the way. Normal admission applies, but the trail is free.

For nature lovers, it's well worth standing by the visitor centre at dusk to look out for roosting hen harriers, Wicken's Sedge Fen is a renowned wintering ground for this rare bird of prey.

PEAT PROJECT

Our exciting Peatland Restoration Project is well underway, with works taking place on Burwell Fen, Verrall's Fen and Tubney Fen. Contractors have been constructing clay banks (known as buds) around areas of deep peat on Burwell and Tubney Fens to wet them up. This locks in carbon, therefore helping mitigate climate change, and creates important habitat for both wintering and breeding birds. The footpath through the middle of Burwell Fen will be closed until March 2025, but there is access via the National Cycleway Route 11 and along the Burwell and Reach Lode-banks.

Excavation works along Spinney Bank, on the far west side of the Fen, uncovered the foundations of an historic old drainage windpump and also a glass bottle (possibly an old lemonade bottle) made in Burwell at the old Guyatt and Droford Mineral Works, which closed in the 20th century.

The £2million project is predominately funded through the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (DEFRA) 'Nature for Climate' Peatland Grant Scheme (NCPGS) managed by Fens East Peatland Partnership (FEPP), with funding from corporate partners including Starling Bank and Anglian Water.



A Neighbourhood Plan for Bottisham



Dear Resident,

Firstly, a happy and prosperous 2025 to all.

We last updated you with progress on the Bottisham Neighbourhood Plan in the September edition of The Cresset. These updates are also available on the Bottisham Parish Council Website and can also be found on the various local media platforms. In this month's Cresset you will possibly come across a few references to the Bottisham Neighbourhood Plan. These are coordinated through the Bottisham Working Group (BWG) and with Parish Council.

The BWG comprises fourteen members made up of both residents and Parish Councillors, all of whom give of their time freely. Some excellent progress has been made since September in gathering the evidence required to support the primary objectives residents say they would like the Bottisham Neighbourhood Plan to deliver. These objectives are derived from the 2023 village consultation which has been collated and built in to a Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats table – otherwise known as a SWOT analysis. These results are being used to steer and guide the objectives, vision and policies of the Neighbourhood Plan.

The objective overview of the Plan states: "the Bottisham Neighbourhood Plan reflects the desire of our community for future development that, as far as is possible, meets the needs and aspirations of those who live and work here, now and in the decades to come. The community accepts the need for housing development as the population expands, but wishes to see this take place in a way that maintains and enhances the character and vibrancy of our village."

The objectives have led to the following vision:

- a) Protection and enrichment for the character and identity of the village to ensure any development opportunities respect heritage, community, agricultural and the rural aesthetic whilst also being sustainable and appropriate to the scale and nature of the Parish.
- b) An attractive and desirable place to live; with strong community cohesion where all our residents will feel valued and connected. Our existing open and


